GENERAL NEWS.

A Samoan Correspondent in Washington to Testify.

AN OPINION BY BISMARCK.
The Chicago Election—Sentenced for Smuggling Opium—Sluggers Still at the Old Game—Naval Vessels.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.]
WASHINGTON, April 2.—J. C. Klein, correspondent at Samoa, visited Washington twice last week, having been summoned by the state department for the purpose of testifying in relation to the outrages committed by the Germans while he was there. He also explained his connection with the events leading up to the battle of Cogali. His testimony completely refuted the charges made by the Germans against him of having fired upon their sailors and ordered the soldiers of Mataafa to do so. Affidavits of Klein and three of Mataafa's soldiers, who were with him at the battle, made before United States Vice-Consul Blalock at Apia, will be taken by the commissioners appointed by the United States to Berlin. Klein has had three private interviews with Blaine. The correspondent will not go to Berlin at least for the present.

THE GERMAN DIPLOMAT.
He Talks to the Central Manufacturers' Association.

BERLIN, April 2.—Bismarck, in replying to the congratulations of the central manufacturers' association, said that he looked forward to the continued maintenance of peace. This he believed would lend an additional impetus to bringing gratifying developments of Germany's interests. In his opinion a guarantee of peace was not only to be found in the monarchical ancestors of the country, but also in a special degree in the monarchical sentiments of the German people.

PREPARING WAR VESSELS.
They Will Soon Be Ready for Active Service.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Orders have been given to the navy department to work extra hours in preparing the Adams, Iroquois and Pensacola for sea. The Iroquois is at Mare Island, California, and can be ready in six weeks. The Pensacola is at Norfolk and one month's work will make her ready. The department has not yet decided where the vessels will be sent, but they will be available for service in Samoa if it should become necessary for their presence there.

CHICAGO ELECTION.
A Very Heavy Vote and Much Scratching.

CHICAGO, April 2.—A very heavy vote is being polled in the municipal election. Both sides claim to be ahead. Much scratching is being done and an unusual number of votes are being cast.

A STORM AT SEATTLE.
A Youth Drowned, a House Wrecked and Other Damage Done.

SEATTLE, April 1.—At an early hour this morning the wind began to blow strongly from the northwest, and increased to a gale. At 10:30 Jesse Finch, a lad aged 18, started in a fishing boat to sail to Eagle harbor. When opposite Duwamish head, two and a half miles away, his boat was capsized and Finch drowned.

At 11:30 the Mechanics' mill, sash and door building, in course of erection, which is located on piling, was struck by a squall. The building, two stories high, and 150x90 feet, was flattened out like a house of cards. The wind entered the side of the structure, which was open, and fairly lifted it from the foundation. The roof and one side were dumped into the water. The machinery, which was in the building, was broken and crushed to a considerable extent. The loss will foot up several thousand dollars.

The steamer Glide started for Skagit river, and was compelled to put into West Seattle in a sinking condition.

Chimneys were blown down and windows smashed by the gale, which subsided at 2 P. M.

AT WASHINGTON.

The Opening of 2,000,000 Acres of Oklahoma Territory.

PRES. HARRISON'S APPOINTMENTS.
Noted and Comments from the National Capital—An Important Decision by Secretary of the Navy.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The President has issued a proclamation opening to settlement all that portion of the Oklahoma Territory covered by the bill passed during the last hours of the Fiftieth Congress. The land thus opened to settlement embraces nearly 2,000,000 acres. The proclamation has been nearly ready for a week or ten days but the pressure of other matters prevented its completion.

The nomination of "Corporal" James Tanner, of New York, to be Commissioner of Pensions, is enthusiastically received by the old soldiers, particularly those who carried muskets in the ranks. They regard the appointment as a special recognition of themselves. The sentiments expressed by ex soldiers, from a large number of States, temporarily in Washington, are a fair sample of those existing throughout the country, this appointment bids fair to be one of the most popular ever made by any President.

The only objection raised to the appointment of "Corporal" Tanner was that he was too friendly to the old soldiers. Gen. Harrison quickly told the parties who had the bad taste to make such an objection, that it was for that very reason that he proposed to make him Commissioner of Pensions. No man should ever fill the position who is not friendly to the old soldiers, and it would be difficult for him to be too friendly towards them.

The important appointments are being slowly and carefully made and now that the President has had time to show the politicians that he does not propose to do anything hurriedly, there has been a perceptible "let up" in the pressure upon him. He hears the claims of all patiently, and after careful consideration, appoints the one who, all things considered, he thinks will fill the position.

Secretary Tracy has made a decision as to appointments and discharges in the Navy Department that has created much interest here. A clerk who was dismissed for inefficiency appealed to the Secretary for reinstatement on the ground that he was an old soldier. The Secretary concludes his refusal to reinstate the man who follows: "While the fact of a person having a good record as a soldier will be considered among the best of recommendations for retention in or appointment to a position under the Navy Department, ability to perform satisfactorily the duties of the position which he holds, or which he aspires to, is a condition precedent to favorable consideration of an application for retention or appointment."

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The Extent of Our Rainless Lands.
The vast region in the United States, where the rainfall is insufficient for successful agriculture, comprises about two-fifths of our entire area (exclusive of Alaska). It aggregates about 1,200,000 square miles, and is about equal to the combined areas of Great Britain and Ireland, Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Italy, Sweden, Norway, Holland, and Austria-Hungary. This arid region embraces nearly all the public domain, and capable of supporting a population of at least 200,000,000. It is a third larger than British India, a country having many similar physical characteristics, and supporting over 200,000,000 inhabitants largely by irrigation. In solving the problem how to utilize this vast arid region so as to make homes for the people, we have the experience of thousands of years to guide us. The most populous nation of ancient times occupied the arid regions of Asia, Africa, and Europe, and subsisted by agriculture prosecuted by irrigation. It is estimated that there are 6,500,000 acres of land now cultivated by irrigation in the United States, varying in value from \$40 to 1,000 per acre, and yielding a net income equal to the interest on a much larger sum than this valuation.—Senator Stewart of Nevada, in the April Forum.
