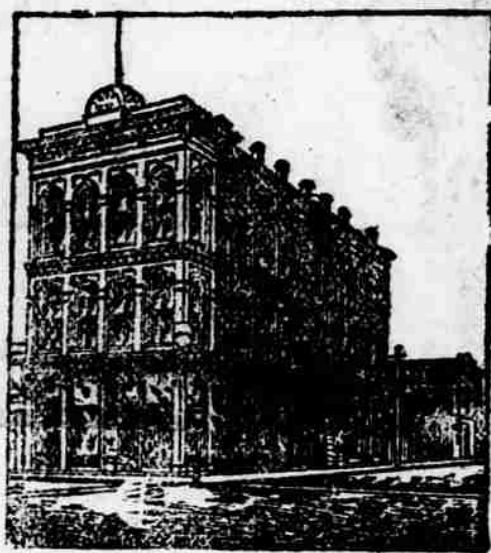

LIQUOR DEALER IN LINE.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Harvey Kyldind, claiming to be a whole-sale liquor dealer of San Francisco, was arraigned here to-day, charged with felonious assault on a Cuban with whom he had quarrelled this morning. The prisoner, who claims to be a grandson of the late General John C. Breckinridge, of Kentucky, was remanded until to-morrow for examination.

SLAVE TRADE OF AFRICA.

How the Arabs Obtain and March Them Down to the Coast.

An English missionary writes to the Newcastle, England, Chronicle concerning the slave traffic of Africa as follows: It has been estimated by competent authorities that more than 50,000 slaves are annually brought down to the coast, but this number bears only a small proportion to the number of those dragged from their homes. Fifty thousand reach the coast, but five times that number perish in the march down. Dr. Livingston confidently affirmed that only one in ten reached the coast from the Zambesi regions. The march down to the coast under ordinary circumstances, with plenty of food and water, is a severe trial; but oh! the horrors undergone by a slave gang. With their necks almost dislocated by the prong of the rough branch with which they are secured, heavily chained, backs smarting under the lash of the slave driver, bodies almost fleshless from starvation, tongues hanging out from thirst, women compelled to carry their babes on their backs and loads on their heads—no wonder that, one after another, they fall exhausted to the ground, and are left either to starve or to become the prey of leopards or hyenas. Having reached the coast, their troubles do not cease. It is probably intended to carry them to Arabia or Madagascar, in spite of all treaties. They are packed in miserable bows—packed so tight that a quarter of them die from suffocation. Should a British cruiser leave in sight the Arabs persuade the poor wretches that the fiery white man is after them, and that if he catches them they will be boiled or eaten alive. This is no fancy picture. It is a scene daily enacted on the east coast of Africa. Our settlement was founded to receive such people rescued by British cruisers, and when the poor wretches are delivered to us they present a sight that would make angels weep. The supply of slaves is kept up from the interior by warfare and

They Have Gone Too Far.

That most excellent farmers paper of Chicago the Prairie Farmer says: The people and Legislatures are taking hold of trusts. They do not seem inclined to wait to see how far the unscrupulous monopolists may go to reach the "not-too-far point." Farmers, the Grange, the Alliance, and other organizations, are combining against the under-twine trust. The State of Michigan Legislature has killed the bill introduced some time ago in the interest of the salt trust at Saginaw. That trust wanted to increase its stock to \$25,000,000. The bill was defeated by a vote of 59 to 20, every member present voting made to 100 record. Hence, the farmers of Michigan can find who were for or against their interests. It will naturally be proper to place the absent members with the monopolists, unless these gentlemen can give a valid excuse. The laws of Michigan limit the capital stock of an incorporated company doing business in the State to \$5,000,000. It so stands now. But the trust, if incorporated in other States, may do business in Michigan. Hence, only Congress, by a general law, can control these vicious monopolies.

The binder-twine trust is another monopoly that seems to have gone too far. It may not be possible for farmers to fully protect themselves against the trust, but in a proper case absolutely necessary to the proper securing of the cereal grains. Fifteen to twenty cents added per acre to the cost of harvesting seems small. The aggregate is an immense sum to go into the pockets of the twine trust, but a straw that may break the farmer's back, as it did that of the cane trust of old. The Prairie Farmer did yeoman service, many years ago, in squelching monopoly, and with telling effect in its engraving, "The Farmers Pay For All." It may be necessary again for it to take the field in a similar direction. Commencing in 1850, farmers began to organize for mutual defence against the encroachments of capital. In 1872 was the culmination. Again, capital is seeking to gnaw the bones of the producer and consumer alike. It is time to call a halt.
