The general superintendent of the railway mail service has notified Representative Hermann that he has appointed O. W. Olney, railway mail agent on the Portland and Coburg route.

A lively traffic is being done on the Oregon Pacific railroad east of this city. The train last night from Gatesville brought 15 cars of freight and about 50 passengers.

Representative Hermann has had several interviews with the postoffice officials in behalf of increased mail facilities in Oregon, and he has secured an order for a daily mail service from Vale to Burns; also an increase of mail service from Prairie Creek to Imnaha via Joy postoffice, in Walla-walla county.

ON THE NORTH SANTIAM.

The Scenery Along the Eastward Extension of the Oregon Pacific Railroad.

Does any one realize that we have, at our very doors, some of the finest scenery to be found on this famous Pacific coast? A few hours ride from Albany upon the Oregon Pacific road, and more hours of sturdy tramping, will place the tourist who is looking for natural scenery among some of the finest that can be found and among the foot hill mountains where the bracing pure air and the ice cold and perfectly pure water will bring health and robustness as will no other tonic or medicine.

A party, consisting of homestead house builders and Eastern gentlemen taking in the health, beauty and novelty of this coast, recently made the trip of this description. The Oregon Pacific train landed them at Gates, where the services of pack horses were secured for the commissary department and tramp, tramp the boys are marching was taken up and after a few miles of "tie walking" the mountain path was taken for Mountain Home Plateau, where several of the six hundred thousand of Uncle Aoe's boys of the sixties are building "Home, sweet home." The entirety at the foot of the mountain was "How far?" and the answer, "Two miles." Ere long the enquirer, while pausing for breath, asked, "How far?" and the terse reply was, "Half way up." "Yes? well, but we have traveled four miles up already." "But only one mile on the level."

A jolly crowd gathered around the bountiful spread table in one of the mountain homes that night, although some weary limbs felt the effect of the unaccustomed climbing. A second house on an adjoining claim, one half mile farther on, was occupied by a party of Eastern gentlemen who had a strong admiration for the unrivalled Oregon tall timber that beautified the landscape and made the bright sunlight of midday a pleasant twilight.

A good night's sleep induced by the soporific tendencies of the stillness of those primeval sentinels of fir, hemlock, cedar, spruce and pine which rear their stately heads from two to three hundred feet above our comparatively pigmy but secure and comfortable quarters, rested the tired muscles, after tales of canyons and waterfalls upon Line Creek (so called from the fact that for almost its entire length it closely follows a direct south course upon the government survey section line. A trip up it was undertaken by the more venturesome of the party for the purpose of viewing the beautiful scenery.

Climbing up a stream that nature has constructed perpendicular instead of on a graded level is a feat attended with considerable fatigues and even danger, but it was accomplished in due season. Line Creek is almost one continuous series of cascades. In the first mile out party encountered two falls that required daring climbing up the sides of the enclosing precipices to pass. One was named Fan Tail Fall, from its peculiar spreading out over the face of a precipice like a partially opened fan. The other was a sheer leap of over fifty feet and was worth the climb to see. No name was given it as it presented no distinctive features. Farther up many more as interesting as those passed, if not more so, are to be seen, but the venturesome spirit of our party was satisfied in that direction.

The next day the precipitous course of Stinker Creek (shades of Noah Webster, where did those people who did the naming of these beautiful, clear mountain streams study up the appellations they used), was followed down. Near the commencement of Mountain Home Plateau the two main branches of this creek leap down sheer precipices that the survey field notes say are over 100 feet high. One of our party called it Rainbow Falls, because at the time first seen the prismatic rainbow hues filled the sprayed column of water on the rocks below; the other was christened Shower Bath Falls, because the lower half of the fall was completely broken into spray by the projecting rocks of the upper portion, and formed as perfect a shower bath in the pool below as could be asked for.

The new route opened by the construction of the Oregon Pacific presents attractions for the tourists, the pleasure and health seekers, and openings for settlers and business men that are unsurpassed in any other locality, and need but to be seen to be appreciated.

Surveying Public Lands.

Secretary Noble has granted the applications of a number of settlers on unsurveyed public lands in California, Oregon and Washington territory for a survey of the lands on which they reside. The secretary has directed that the United States surveyor-general shall invite proposals to survey this land at the rate allowed by act of October 2, 1888. There are vast tracts of timber, agricultural and fruit lands on the line of the Oregon Pacific east of this city, which should be surveyed. That portion of the country is fast settling up, and the lands should not remain longer unsurveyed.

An Old Land Mark Gone.

The old wooden building on the site of the new Masonic building on First street is being moved away. It is one of the old landmarks of the city, having been built in 1852. It has now outlived its usefulness, and like other old landmarks must give way to the march of progress and the steady growth of the city.

THE CITY'S FINANCES.

What It Costs to Run the City Government for Three Months.

From city recorder's quarterly report the following figures are obtained.

Table listing various city expenses: Mayor and council, Recorder, Marshal, Treasurer, Attorneys fees, Policemen, Electric lights, Fire department, Engineer, Quartermaster, Supplies, Street work, Bridges and crosswalks, Lumber, Gravel and dirt, Surveying, Sewer work, Hard ware, Printing, Water rent, Stationery, Smallpox patients, Physicians and nurses, Supplies, etc.

State Military Board.

The state military board met at the adjutant general's office in the capitol building Tuesday, Adjutant General J. C. Shofner, Col. Freeman and Col. Bowditch being present. After disposing of its regular routine of business, the board took up for consideration the matter of the state militia attending the centennial of Washington's inauguration, to be held at Portland, on April 30th. They will confer with the railroads for the purpose of securing free transportation. The board also had under consideration the holding of encampments by the different regiments throughout the state. The adjutant general will, in the near future, issue an order recommending such a movement. It is expected that the board will soon receive 1000 stands of arms and two Gatling guns from the government, they being entitled to this number under the Hermann bill, passed by the last congress. Col. Bowditch also drew the money to purchase uniform for a new company lately organized at Ashland.

Presbytery of Oregon.

The presbytery of Oregon convened at Lafayette Tuesday and was opened at 7:30, with a sermon by Rev. W. O. Forbes, of Albina, the retiring moderator. At the close of the sermon the presbytery was constituted with prayer. After roll call Rev. Professor E. N. Condit, of Albany, was elected moderator. Rev. George Gillespie, of Newport, was elected temporary clerk, and Rev. E. R. Pritchard, of Albany, reporting clerk. The committee on arrangements made its report, which was adopted.

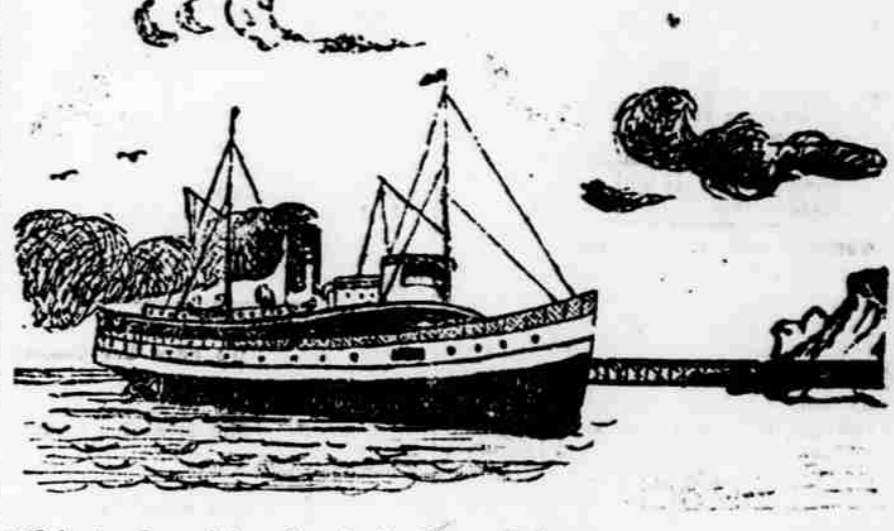

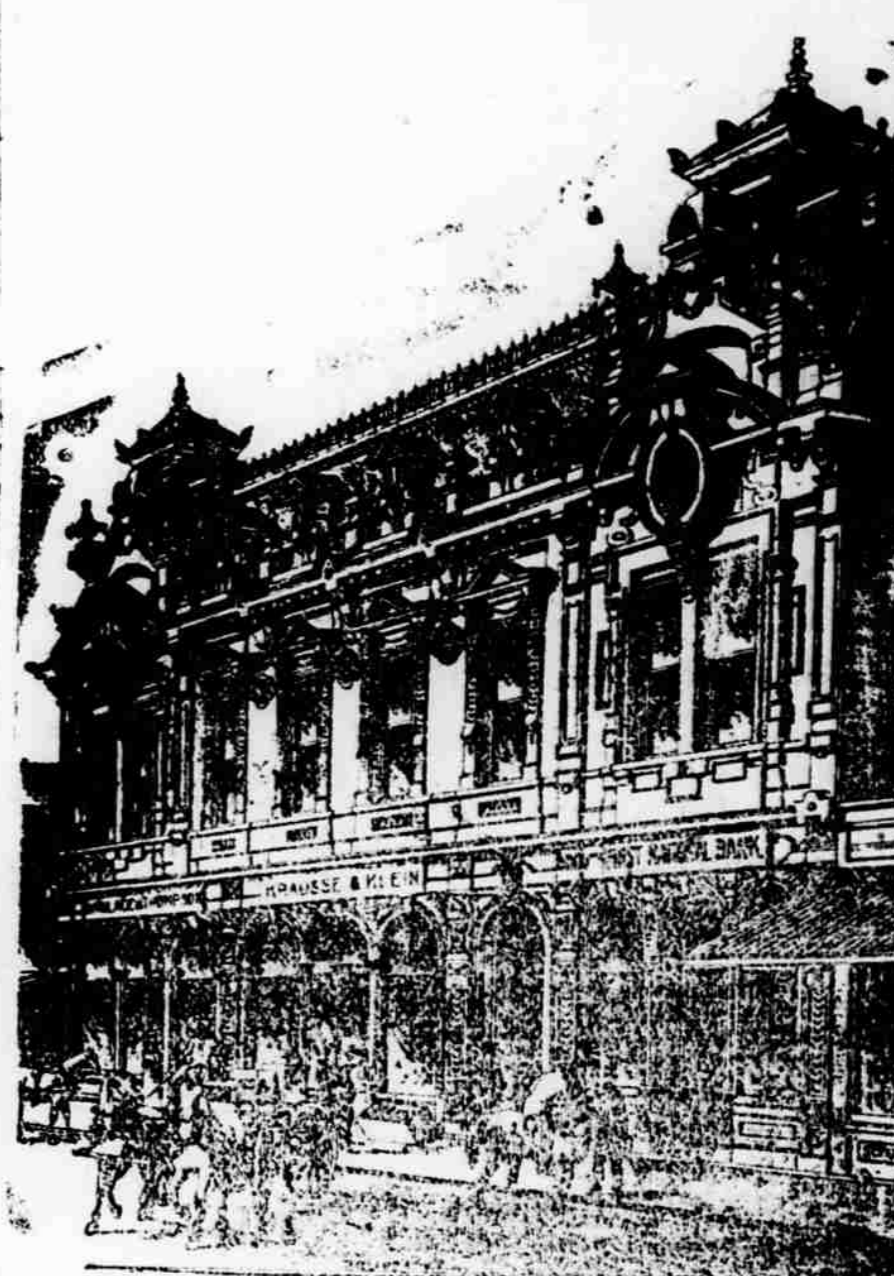

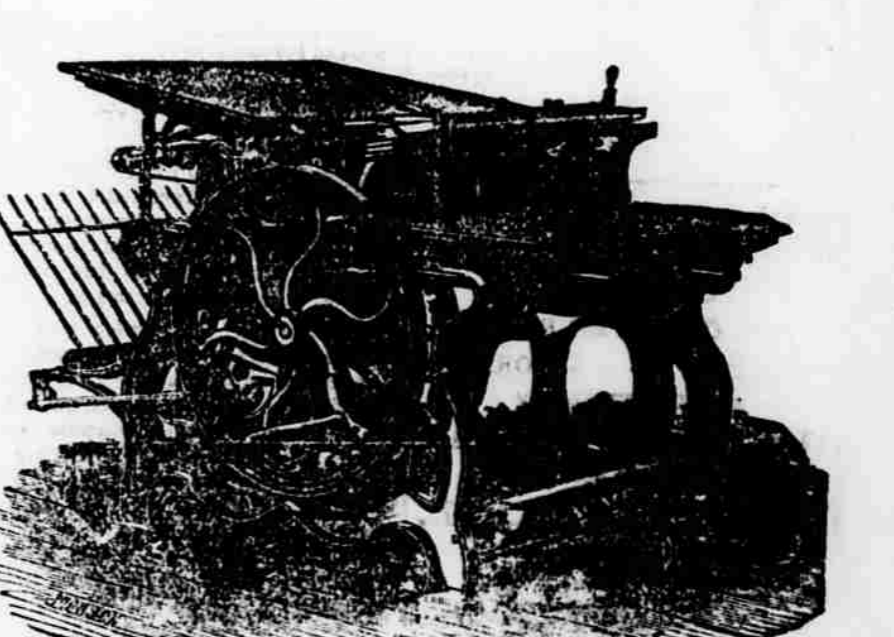
