The cross tract, about two miles south of the city had been surveyed and they looked it over thoroughly. The asylum will no doubt be located upon this tract. A final decision will be rendered in the premises to-day.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Discharged from the Asylum - Lunatics at the Circus - Notaries Public.

Special to the Herald.] SALEM, April 15.—Willis A. Fisher who has been in the asylum from Portland about four months, was to-day released, fully cured. The cause of his insanity was typhoid fever. His mother, Mrs. C. A. Clark, came here and accompanied him home on the 1 o'clock train.

THREE HUNDRED AT THE CIRCUS. Three hundred asylum inmates were admitted free to the circus to-day, by invitation of the manager, and laughed as heartily as anybody.

APPOINTMENT OF NOTARIES. Jno. J. Smith, Sisters P. O.; W. H. Adams, Portland, and John G. Webber, Near City, were appointed notaries public to-day.

MORE STREET RAILWAY. Iron arrived to-day for the street railway extension, and the work of building over a mile of the new track will be commenced forthwith.

Santiam Mines. E. L. Wheeler arrived in this city yesterday from Rock Creek, Linn county. He gives very encouraging reports of the development being made in the silver mines in that section. He says that the Clarren Bros., of the reduction works at Portland, are pushing the work in the Galena tunnel, having now reached 275 feet, and are now running three shafts, and that they are also at work on the Brightenbush mine, in Marion county. He also states that the Canal Fork Mining company, of Portland, will soon resume work in the Canal Fork mine, in the White Bull district, in which they have already invested about \$50,000. Mr. Wheeler says there are a number of undeveloped leads in that vicinity, which have shown indications of richness, and will no doubt be found, in the near future, to be of great value.—Salem Statesman.

Improvements General. The Oregonian, noting the amount of improving going on in this valley, says: There is no denying that a great improvement in feeling has taken place through the Willamette valley, and all property is held for better prices. At the state capital property is selling for double what it would have brought two years ago; but two or three years ago Salem property would not have sold for over one-half what it was actually worth—or what it would cost to buy the lots and improve them. Prices now are not fully up to original cost, except in favored localities. It sounds queer to talk of a "boom" in real estate when it only brings first cost, but that would be good prices in all our Oregon towns.

Reform School. The question is being asked does reform schools prove a success? And the answer is given that in California it has proven an entire failure. This is a pertinent question just now as the late legislature created an institution of that nature and the commission are already looking around for its location. Of course it will have to go, but perhaps its speed in going can be retarded instead of a accelerated, until future legislation can investigate further into the question.

Astoria Health Officer. The Statesman says: Dr. O. B. Estes, the health officer for the port of Astoria, in his quarterly official report sent to Governor Penneyer Saturday, reports eighty vessels having entered that port during the quarter ending March 31st, all given clean bills of health, except the steamer Oregon, which was placed in quarantine on Feb. 5th, but through the wise and timely precautions taken the spread of disease was prevented and the safety of the community secured.

Almost a Fire. About six o'clock last evening the fire alarm called the engines out, but before they could get in any work the fire which had caught in the roof of R. Fox's residence was extinguished with no harm done but a few burnt shingles. Dick, who was preparing his bachelor supper, had built up too hot a fire.
