ANOTHER BIG SUIT.

Messrs. Searle & Deane Bring Suit Against the Oregon Pacific for Over \$100,000. It is learned that Messrs. J. J. Searle and E. B. Deane, of this city, contractors under the firm name of Searle & Deane, have commenced suit in the United States circuit court in Portland against the Oregon Pacific railroad company to recover the sum of \$111,293.62, with interest from January 15, 1889, and costs and disbursements.

A BIG TRAIN.

The Oregonian says: The big train which has been coming over the Northern Pacific in two sections, was consolidated at Tacoma Wednesday, and arrived at the Northern Pacific freight depot in Portland at about 8 o'clock Thursday. Although the train on its long journey from Missillon, O., to Portland, has been run on schedule passenger time, the delays caused by the long stops along the line to enable the large crowds gathered at the principal points to see it, and from the fact that it has only been kept moving during daylight, has kept it ten days on the road.

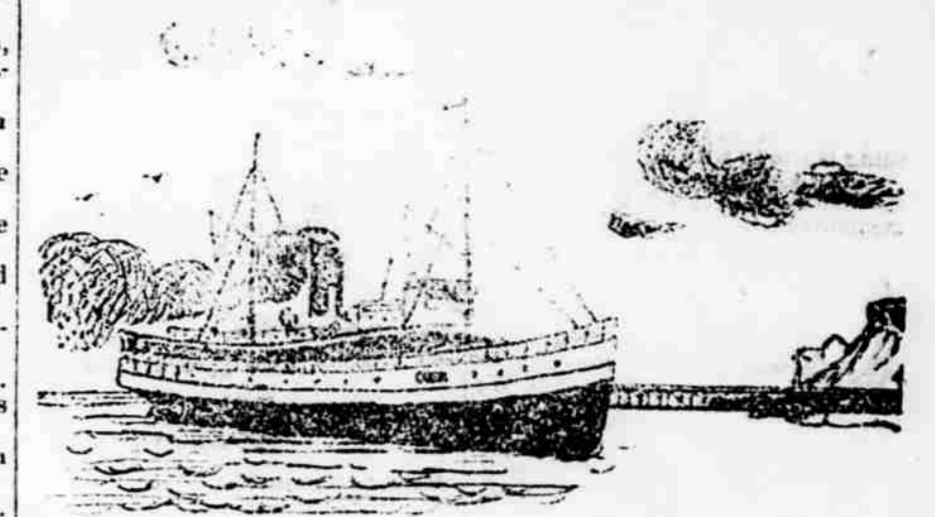

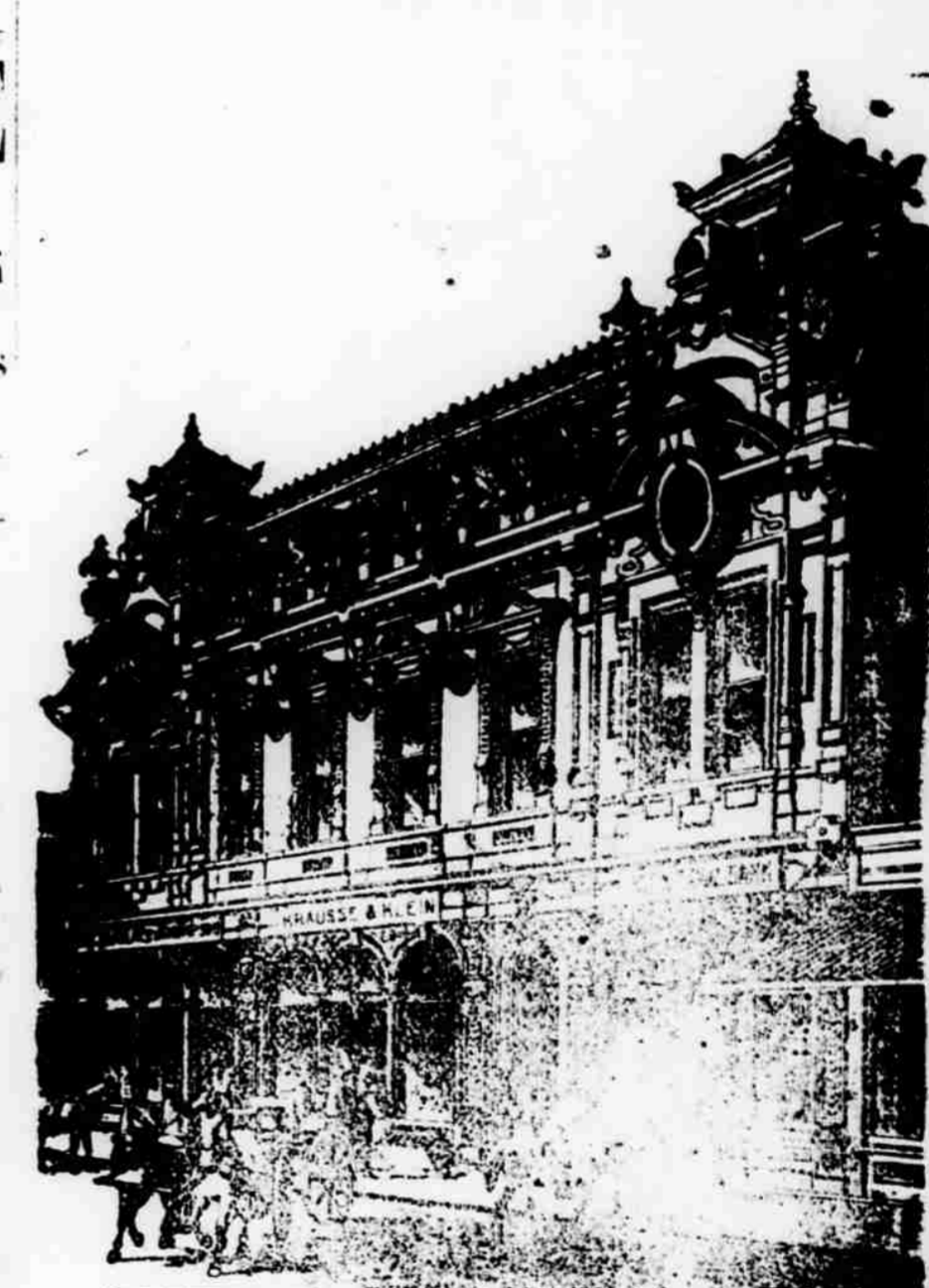

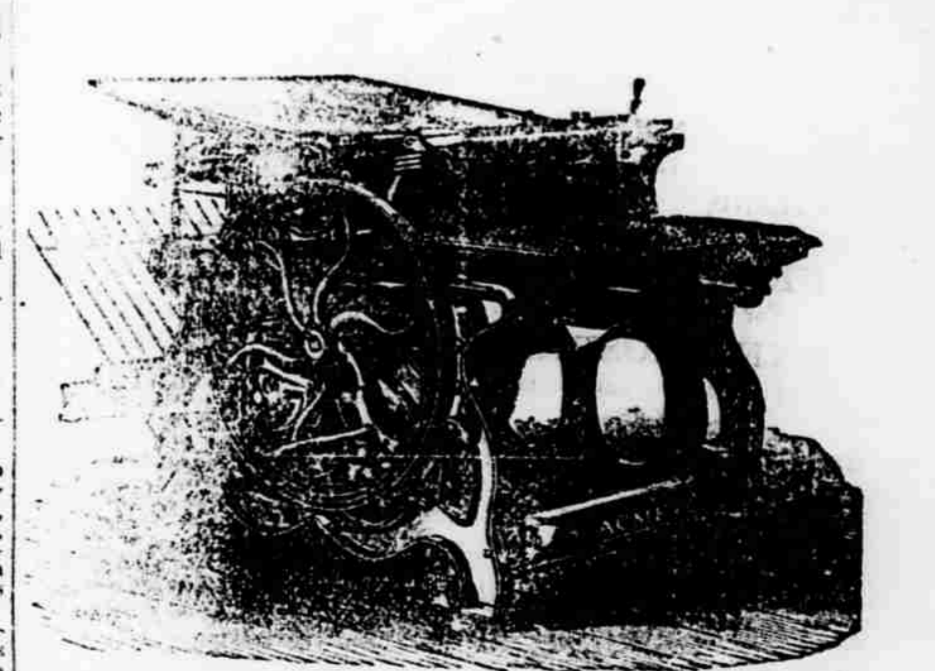
