AT WASHINGTON

A Number of Oregon Appointments Made by Pres. Harrison

CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.
The Presidential Train Leaving for West Harrison and Cabinet Will Leave for New York Monday.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—The president made the following appointments to-day:
Solon W. Hacking, of New York, to be examiner in chief in the patent office.
Harrison Kelley, of Jacksonville, Oregon, to be receiver of public moneys at Drewsey, Oregon.
James R. Hayden, of Olympia, W. T., to be receiver of public moneys at Seattle, W. T.
Jay B. Huntington, of Oregon, register of the land office at Drewsey, Grant county, Oregon.

THE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.
WASHINGTON, April 19.—According to the present arrangement for the centennial celebration the presidential train will leave Washington early Monday morning, bearing the president, cabinet and their families. Arriving at Elizabeth, N. J., they will be met by Governor Reen, of New Jersey. The party will then proceed to Elizabeth port, where they will take a boat for New York City, landing at the wharf where Washington stepped ashore. The party will then proceed to the city hall and listen to an oration to be delivered by Chauncey Depew.

THE PUBLIC PRINTER.
WASHINGTON, April 19.—Frank W. Palmer, of Illinois, has loomed up during the past few days as a dangerous competitor against Osborne, of Los Angeles, for public printer. Palmer is also a newspaper man, having edited the Des Moines, Iowa Register, before Clarkins, now assistant postmaster general, took it and subsequently the Chicago Inter-Ocean. He was in congress from Iowa when Harrison was congressman. He is said to be Harrison's personal preference. Osborne's friends are making a desperate struggle in his behalf, and Osborne himself had a close consultation with Secretary Hallford on the subject to-day.

THE NATION'S MILITIA.
WASHINGTON, April 19.—The war department is in receipt daily of requisitions for ordnance and quartermaster stores for equipment of the militia under the annual appropriation of \$400,000. In the territories particularly there are signs of activity among the militia. The old organizations are gradually changing their equipment to conform to the regular army. It is thought there will be fully 50,000 militiamen in New York on the occasion of the centennial celebration.

KILLED IN SELF-DEFENSE.
A Wife-Beater Fatally Shot by His Much-Enduring Victim.
DUTLER, Pa., April 18.—Yesterday J. E. Fields became enraged because his wife insisted on reading instead of retiring at midnight, and, arising, beat her terribly. At 1 o'clock he again arose and attempted to beat her, when she took a revolver and warned him that if he struck her she would shoot. He struck her and she fired. She turned to her little daughter and said: "I've shot your father in self-defense. Shall I kill myself?" The dying man called out, "No, you served me right. You fired in self-defense."
He made a deposition to this effect, and died two hours later.

GENERAL NEWS.

Five Mormon Missionaries Severely Whipped in Alabama.

TARRIED AND FEATHERED.
A Sensational Investigation in the Minnesota Legislature—Uneasy Beds the Head of the Czar of Russia.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.
ST. LOUIS, April 19.—In formation comes from Storm county, Alabama, that five Mormon missionaries were severely whipped and driven from the county last Monday night. These men had been holding meetings among the ignorant classes in the county and had formed a colony to go to Utah. Monday night some forty citizens of the northern part of the county, without the slightest attempt at disguise, surrounded the house of Gus Irons, a recent convert, who was entertaining five missionaries, and without delay they were brought out, stripped to the waist and tied in a row. Then each of regulators, with long switches, struck each of the prisoners a sounding blow. By the time the first blow was given two of the men had fainted and the others were wet with blood. After the whipping the Mormons were given a thick coating of tar and feathers and they were warned to leave instantly or suffer death. The left without hesitancy.

CHARGES OF BRIBERY.
A Sensational Investigation in the Minnesota Legislature.

ST. PAUL, April 19.—At various times during the present session of the legislature there have been rumors of bribery. Today an investigation committee was appointed by each house, but the proceedings did not develop anything sensational. The statement is made that warrants are soon to be issued for thirteen persons, whose names are withheld, for bribery and corruption. These are not all members.

THE BOMBS OF RUSSIA.
Another Plot to Assassinate the Czar of Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 19.—The police have discovered the existence of a club of assassins to assassinate the czar with dynamite, while attending the funeral of General Pancker, minister of roads. The czar was immediately warned to attend the funeral. A number of persons have been arrested.

A Big Failure.
New York, April 19.—The New York office of the Callender insulation and water proofing company, the failure of which was announced this morning, is closed and the place is in the hands of the sheriff. The officials deny that their suspension is due to the departure of William Callender, president and treasurer, for Europe. Nor will they admit that he is a defaulter. The creditors think the amount of the liabilities will run up to more than \$400,000.

The Street Car Strikers.
MINNEAPOLIS, April 19.—There is no chance of any consequence in street car strike. Seventy-five cowboys arrived from Kansas City this morning to take the places of the strikers, but they have not yet gone to work. Cars are running with occasional minor disturbances.

Still No Tidings.
New York, April 19.—All steamers which could have been in the neighborhood of the wrecked steamer Denmark have arrived, but no tidings of those on board have been received. The only hope is that they were picked up by a sailing vessel and taken probably to Azores.

The Whisky Trust.
CHICAGO, April 19.—George W. Kidd, a wholesale liquor dealer of New York, and many times a millionaire, has started to down the whisky trust. He has just let the contract for 5000 barrels to the distillery at Lasalle, Illinois, as a beginning.
