EDITORIAL NOTES.

New York was swept by a \$3,000,000 fire Thursday. It was the greatest fire experienced there for years.

Portland contains more wealth for its size than any city on the Pacific Coast, and perhaps in the United States.

It has been remarked that Rider Haggard had no sooner announced that he would write another book than the announcement was made that Booth was paralyzed and Mary Anderson gone crazy.

San Francisco is to have modern appliances for coast defense in the shape of three fifteen inch dynamite guns. They will probably be located on the Marin shore and will be in position before the close of the year.

The name of the ill fated steamship on the Thingvalla line, whose 600 passengers are supposed to have perished, is Danmark instead of Denmark as at first published. Nearly all hope of the passengers and crew having been rescued has now been given up.

The situation resulting from the excitement over the opening of the Oklahoma territory is assuming a serious aspect. Trouble has already commenced. Several fights have occurred in which several men were killed. The military forces are on the ground to avoid and prevent bloodshed, but may be forced to cause some when the strife among the boomers for lands begin.

A mining company in petticoats is a new thing down in California in the Julian mining district. The first mine in the district to be located by women was recorded on Friday in the names of Mrs. W. A. Dorris, Mrs. L. S. Bowers and Mrs. M. A. Tabor. They relocated the Halliday mine, on which the assessments have not been kept up, and christened it "The Maid of Texas." The former owners had sunk a thirty-foot shaft, which is now full of water. Men will be set at work shortly to develop it. Mrs. Bowers is well known as the Washoe Secess. She was the wife of "Sandy" Bowers of Washoe, Nev., and at one time was the richest woman in the United States. Her husband was one of the original owners of the bonanza mines.

Red Cloud, the big Sioux Indian chief, called on the president the other day, accompanied by Agent Jordan of the Rosebud agency. Red Cloud was attired in civilized garb. It is his custom to make a pilgrimage to Washington on the incoming of every new president, and this is the ninth time he has paid his respects to the great father. Red Cloud is in a hurry to secure the payment of the \$28,000 appropriated by congress to pay for a lot of ponies which United States troops took away from his band in 1875, when it was feared that they were going on the warpath. One of his purposes of visiting President Harrison was to see if this money cannot be paid to him and his people at once. A big Indian chief like Red Cloud is in the zenith of his glory when he can go to the national capital to consult with the great father.

The people of Anderson, Ind., have been very successful in ridding the town of tramps. Three years ago they formed the plan of making any tramps caught in town run the gauntlet of citizens armed with barrel-staves and poles, and then leap into the river. It is needless to say that all vagabonds gave the place a wide berth. Lately the terror of the old punishment had worn off, and last week when eight tramps were found in the depot they were made to run the gauntlet. They were badly battered, and the prestige of the Hoosier town as a patent tramp bouncer was maintained. This may be very effectual, but this city has a better plan. The tramp nuisance is turned to some account by put-

ting every tramp who shows his ugly physiognomy within the city limits to work on the streets. Tramps abhor work worse than death and there are no more tramps found here than can be utilized in keeping the streets in good order.

A company of wreckers is about to engage in searching for treasures in some of the historic wrecks along the Pacific Coast. The company has been formed of practical men in San Francisco including Capt. White, who have chartered the schooner Restless, and who will sail as soon as the weather becomes settled for the northern coast. The outfit includes two divers, with all the necessary apparatus, and the purpose is to visit several of the ports on the coast north of San Francisco and if possible secure the wreckage from the numerous ships which have foundered. At Tomales Bay the wreckage of the schooner Erin Star still remains, and it is thought that enough of her remains to pay the wreckers for their venture. At Fort Ross the Windermere and at Crescent City the steamer Brother Jonathan, which in the '60's ran between that city and Portland and was wrecked with a large loss of life and much treasure, are believed to have been located, and are expected to repay the successful divers well. Then at Pillar Point there is the wreck of the Ryda! Hall, which was lost years ago and whose hulk has never been disturbed. There is scarcely a port on the coast that has not its wreck, and these will all be visited by the Restless and efforts made to recover what is left of them.

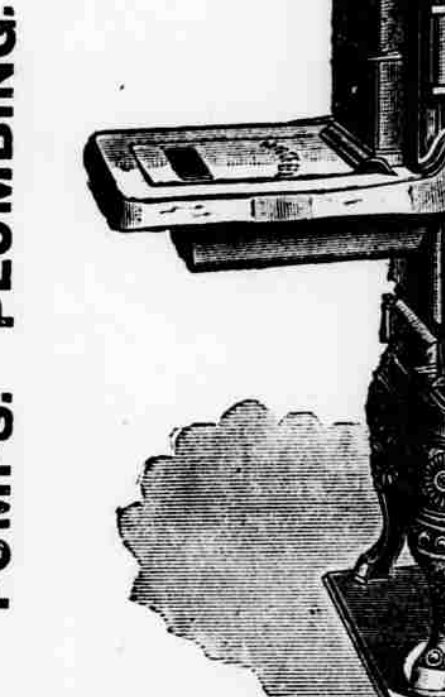
