GENERAL NEWS.

The Rush Across the Oklahoma Borders Commenced. THOUSANDS OF EXCITED MEN.

Excited Passengers of the Danmark Arriving in New York—All Are Well—G at Rejoicing.

The Herald's Special Dispatches. ST. LOUIS, April 22.—Special dispatches from Oklahoma say that everybody is on the cut-throat. A grand run across the line was made at noon. Large sums are being paid for the swiftest horses that the purchasers may reach the choice land first. There is as much if not more struggling for townships as for sections.

A MIGHTY CARAVAN. WICHITA, (Kan.), April 22.—Three train loads of boomers, numbering 1500, left for Oklahoma this morning over the Santa Fe. A large number also left by the Rock Island and another train has been wired for. Every passenger car on the Santa Fe is in use. An extra will be made up of cattle cars. It will be night before the last train can reach Guthrie. The number going from all the towns of Southern Kansas is far greater than was anticipated. Many hundreds go down merely to see the scene along the route. It is believed the stage line at Pond Creek, on the Rock Island, will be totally unable to accommodate the crowds.

CAPITALISTS RUSHING IN. NEWTON, (Kan.) April 22.—Three train loads for Oklahoma left here this morning, including capitalists who will open a bank and stores in Guthrie.

DANGER OF A CONFLICT. NEW YORK, April 22.—General McCook says the danger in Oklahoma is not that there will be a conflict between the troops and boomers but between the boomers and the Indians.

THE DANMARK'S PASSENGERS They Arrive in New York—Great Rejoicing.

NEW YORK, April 22.—It is likely that some of the passengers of the steamer Danmark who were received by the steamer Missouri will be in New York to-night. A dispatch was received by the agents of the Danmark from Wright & Son at Philadelphia, agents of the Missouri, that the latter had left the Delaware breakwater and would be in Philadelphia between 2 and 3 o'clock.

This afternoon Captain Murrell, of the Missouri, telegraphed: "The Missouri arrived all safe with 365 passengers of the steamer Danmark, abandoned April 6th. The rest of the passengers and crew, 340, were landed at St. Michaels. All are well. Please see the Telegraphia line agents and make all arrangements to forward these people to New York to-night."

There is great rejoicing over the safety crew and passengers.

SAVED FROM THE SEA. The Steamer Danmark's Passengers Are All Rescued.

COPENHAGEN, April 21.—A telegram from Lisbon to the United Steamship Company announces the safety of the crew and passengers of the steamer Danmark. The good tidings reached Lisbon from the Azores. It is stated that every one who was on the Danmark is safe, and only an engineer was injured. Some of the passengers arrived at Lisbon to-day. A number are on their way to New York and the remainder are still at the Azores.

HOW THEY WERE SAVED. LISBON, April 21.—Forty two sailors and all of the passengers of the steamer Danmark, left at the Azores by the Missouri, came to Lisbon on the steamship Acer. Raben, first officer, who is among them, reports that April 4th the Danmark's shaft was broken. On the next day the disabled steamer met the steamship Missouri, from London March 28 for Philadelphia and Baltimore. The Missouri towed the Danmark until the 6th, when the latter seemed about to sink. At first the Missouri was only able to take aboard twenty of the Danmark's passengers, but after having jettisoned a portion of her cargo she found accommodations for all the crew and passengers of the Danmark.

The Missouri then proceeded to the Azores and left there the captain, first and second officers, and 320 passengers. She then continued her journey to Philadelphia with 340 passengers and the remainder of the crew.

The captain and three engineers of the Danmark left the Azores on the 14th for London. The Danmark was about 800 miles from Newfoundland when the accident happened. Some say that the engines broke down. Engineer Kaas was found dead in the engine-room after the accident. The captain and three engineers proceeded to London on board the steamer Denmarca.

The death of the engineer was due to the bursting of an engine pipe. The engineer was killed on the spot, and the ship was badly damaged. In consequence of this damage, together with the breaking of the shaft, the vessel was helpless in the heavy seas that prevailed.

AT WASHINGTON

A Ruling In Favor of American Manufacturers.

THE SILVER QUESTION AGAIN. An Order Issued by Commissioner of Pensions Tames—The Department of Agriculture.

Washington, April 22.—Secretary Rusk has been giving the Department of Agriculture a vigorous shaking up, the first result of which is a long list of new appointments and a long list of discharges, called through courtesy "resignations".

Secretary Blaine has received notifications from a number of the Central and South American Governments that they will send the delegates to the "Three America's Congress", which is to be held in this city next October. It is now almost certain that every American Government will be represented. Much benefit to us and a large increase in trade with those countries is expected to follow the conference. Secretary Proctor has issued an order to the effect that when suitable supplies of domestic manufacture or production cannot be obtained for the War Department, and it becomes necessary to purchase articles of foreign manufacture or production, authority for such purchase must first be obtained from the Secretary of War. This means that no more contracts are to be made with English manufacturers, as was done by the Cleveland administration, to supply the U. S. Army with blankets, because by admitting them free of duty the Government saved a few cents on each blanket. Secretary Proctor thinks American manufacturers should be given the contracts.

Mr. Thomas B. Coulter, of Ohio, who was backed by Senator Sherman, has been appointed Auditor of the Treasury for the Post Office Department. This is regarded by the Ohio people as quite a victory, owing to the fact that several other States were pressing candidates for this very important position.

Senator Spooner, whose smiling visage has been seen at the White House almost daily since the inauguration, has gone home. He proposes taking his wife and boy to Europe the latter part of this month. After telling the President "goodbye", he remarked to a friend standing by: "I feel as though I deserved a rest. Since a year ago last November I have been busily engaged in attending strictly to senatorial duties. The only break in that period was during the campaign, when I delivered on an average three speeches a day."

It is thought the silver question will be the cause of considerable discussion in the near future. Senator Stewart recently called on Secretary Windom in order to endeavor to influence him to increase the monthly purchase of silver bullion. He argued that it was an excellent way to reduce the surplus. But the Secretary was not convinced. He said he had twenty millions of silver dollars now in the vaults of the Treasury which he would be very glad to part with. To purchase more silver would be, in his opinion, simply changing the surplus from gold and paper to silver. The Secretary finally told the Senator that he could not decide the question until it had been carefully weighed and considered by the President, and discussed by the Cabinet. In the meantime Senator Stewart is vigorously advocating his proposition.

Assistant Secretary Bussey, of the Department of the Interior, is the official who has to finally pass judgment on all cases of appeal from the decision of the Commissioner of Pensions. He has already proven himself qualified for the difficult duties of the position. He has reversed a number of decisions of the late Commissioner of Pensions, and the grounds of reversal have been such that no unprejudiced man could object to them, while they will give justice to many needy old soldiers who have been unjustly kept out of the pensions they should have long ago had.

Commissioner of the pensioning Tanager has issued the following order: "Whenever a pensioner is disabled in a hand or foot in a degree entitling him to \$24 per month under the act of March 3d, 1883, such pensioner, shall by the act of fact, be entitled to the rate of \$30 per month under the act of August 4th, 1886.
