THE FUTURE OF ALASKA. The Sitka Alaskan contains a very interesting account of the discovery of a vein of coal on the shore of Yukutat bay, about two miles from the beach.

The gold mines of Alaska are yielding excellent returns. Very little is said about them, for very little is known, as the mines are actual business propositions and not merely stock-jobbing schemes.

Frequent allusion has been made to the salmon fisheries of Alaska, and it is enough to say that canneries are being and have been established at different places, and that their business compares very favorably with that done anywhere on the coast.

Taking these matters into consideration, together with the other resources of the territory, it will be seen that the Seward purchase was not a mistake, and that Alaska bids fair to become a very valuable piece of property.

Lacey, Springfield, Clackamas county, Mrs. B. Schofield, Cornelius, Washington county, Mrs. N. A. Hemphill, McMinnville, Yamhill county, Mrs. J. C. White, Crowley, Polk county, Mrs. Mary J. Harris, Corvallis, Benton county, Mrs. E. E. Blackman, Hardman, Morrow county, Mrs. E. Russell, Washougal, Washington territory, Mrs. S. E. Shelton, Jordan, Linn county.

Much and lasting good will result from the work proposed, and the undoubted energy of Mrs. Hayes in pushing it forward cannot but result in its success. Among the many suggestions that she makes to the ladies for work is to enter into the discussion, making motions and introducing questions, suggestive questions for discussion like these are given by her for consideration of the ladies:

How shall we make home and its surroundings pleasant? What influence has the family conversation and reading upon the

members which compose it? Persons and events connected with the settlement of different sections of Oregon?

What position does the grange hold in the opinion of the public? What position and influence might the farmers wield if all belonged to the grange? What is the income from my farm?

These are given only as suggestive and as leading to others fully and more important. The main thing is to bring out thought, action, communication and consultation together, and the course taken is sure to lead to that result.

The senate committee on Indian affairs, under the supervision of Senator Dawes, have arranged for a trip this summer through the Northwest for the purpose of investigating the condition of Indians. The committee will leave Chicago July 1 and proceed to Portland, thence to Tacoma, W. T., and to Sitka, Alaska. Returning they will go over the Northern Pacific to St. Paul.

The news of the rescue of the entire crew and passengers of the wrecked Denmark with but the loss of a single life will be hailed with joy throughout the country. That 700 souls, who were supposed to have met their death in mid ocean should at last arrive safely in port is indeed good news.

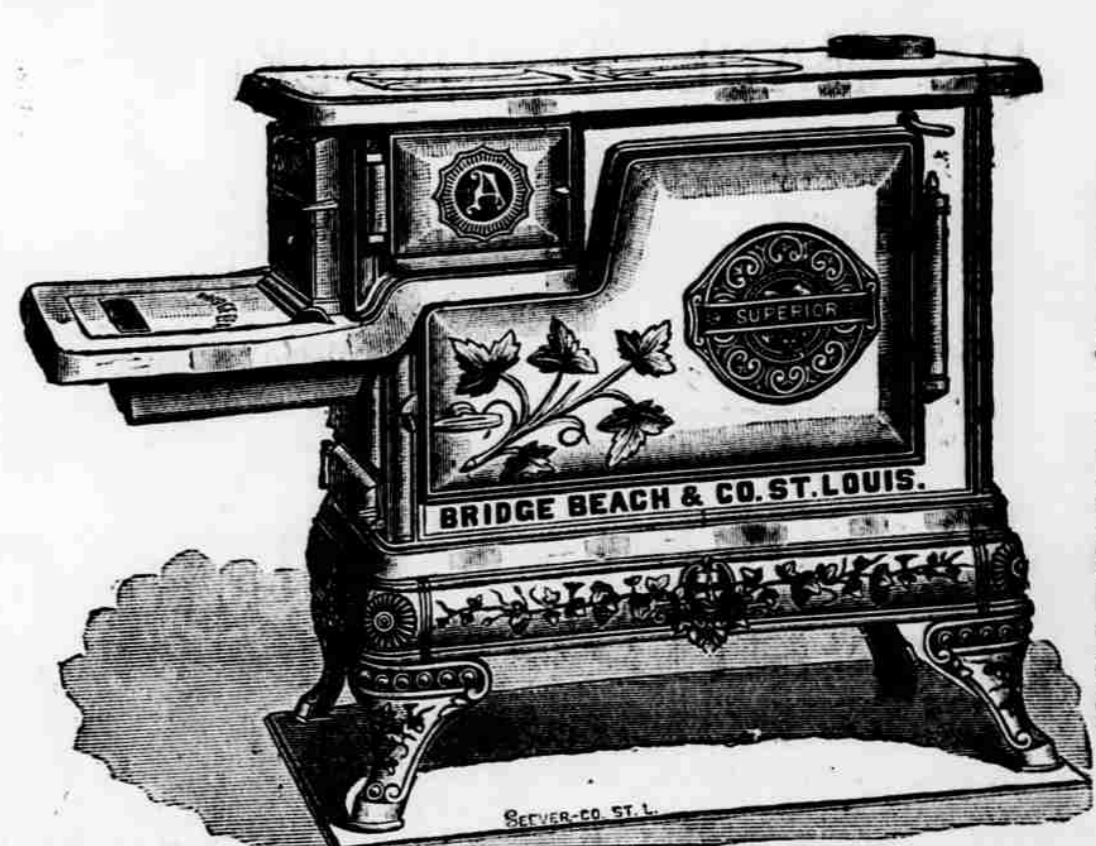
