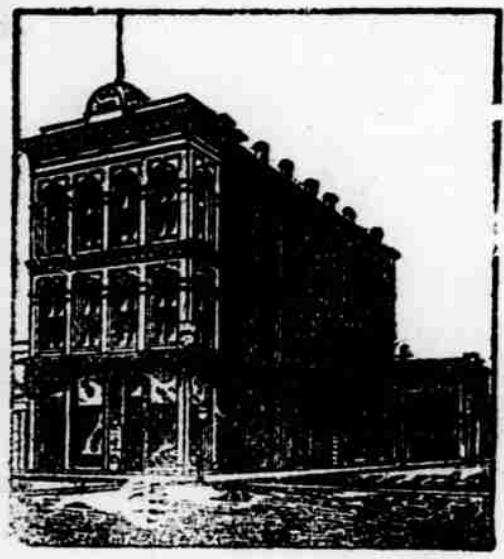

GENERAL NEWS.

Three Men Murdered by Oklahoma Claim Jumpers.

A CONFLICT AMONG WORKMEN. Negro Iron Workers Driven from Work by Strikers—The New York Telegraph Wire War.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] KANSAS CITY, (Mo.), April 23.—A special from Guthrie this morning says that three men who took up claims yesterday in Oklahoma were foully murdered by claim jumpers at 5 o'clock this morning. The names of the assailants and murdered men are not known. A vigilance committee is scouring the territory in search of the murderers, who will be summarily dealt with if caught.

POLES AND WIRES.

They are Still Being Ordered Down in New York City. NEW YORK, April 23.—Mayor Grant this morning ordered the removal of all the telephone and telegraph wires on Broadway from the City Hall to Fourteenth street and from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street. This will include all the series of wires except those of the fire department. This will create havoc as telegraph companies, especially the Western Union, have important offices along the route. It is believed that the down town business district will be attacked next and Wall street is beginning to be scared at the prospect of being cut off.

NOTES FROM VICTORIA.

Two Men Drowned—The Biggest Seal Catch of the Year. VICTORIA, B. C., April 23.—While two miners were out sailing in Nanaima harbor on Sunday afternoon their boat capsized and both were drowned. The sealing schooner Viva returned to-day with 587 skins, the largest catch of this season. Seventy miles of telegraph wire arrived last night, to be used in the construction of the Bonilla Point signal service station.

CONFLICT AMONG WORKMEN.

Colored Steel Workers Driven Out With Revolvers. PITTSBURG, April 23.—Twenty colored men arrived at the Allegheny and Bessmer steel works this morning to take the place of the strikers, but the latter drew their revolvers and scared the men off.

The Tables Turned.

CAIRO, April 23.—The battalion of Egyptian troops under the command of the governor of Suakin and some of the gunboats that started for Port Haliah, for the purpose of recapturing that place, were recently captured by the Sudanese.

Governor Hill's Veto.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 23.—Gov. Hill has vetoed the bill preventing the cutting of the streets for polo grounds in New York, so the Giants are, without any place to play ball.

No Sunday Freight Trains.

DETROIT, April 23.—The Michigan Central will hereafter run no freight trains on Sunday except when actually necessary for the convenience of perishable goods and live stock.

FOR THE COMING CENTENNIAL.

General Butterfield Promises a Procession Thirteen Miles Long. NEW YORK, April 23.—General Butterfield, marshal of the civic and industrial parade of the Washington centennial, sent a letter to Mayor Grant to day, in which he announces that the parade will probably be thirteen miles long. It is absolutely necessary, he says, that the streets be cleared of all obstructions. Mayor Grant is asked to cooperate with the police to effect this result.

THE NEGRO PROBLEM.

President Harrison's Solution is Approved in the South. WASHINGTON, April 23.—President Harrison yesterday received a delegation of Southern republicans, among the number being several well-known colored men. The delegation expressed entire approval of the president's solution of the Southern problem, and told him that his policy of appointing white men to fill offices in white districts, recognizing colored voters as far as possible through the North and those located in the South by getting them positions in executive departments here, instead of placing them where they would be thrown in contact with those who hate them in Southern sections, was the only true solution there was of the race problem. The president intends to give the colored voters their full measure of recognition in the distribution of

OFFICES, BUT IT IS PROPOSED TO AVOID friction in the sections of the South where there has been trouble on account of colored Federal officers, by putting white men in their places. In the heavy black districts of the South, where there are competent and popular colored men who are interested for appointment, there will be recognition of the colored race. Colored men find no cause for complaint, while all classes of whites are loud in their praise of the new departure.

ELECTRICITY IN BATTLE.

Important Part Played by the Electric Current on War Ships. NEW YORK Times. "The countless devices by which electricity is made applicable aboard the new war vessels are simply marvelous," remarked a naval officer recently. "What with furnishing the lights to the vessels, electricity has also been made to serve as the motive power for a lead of small hoisting machines about the decks and below, and now it is to be used aboard the Chicago for training some of the heavy main battery guns. It may surprise some persons to know, too, that nearly all these applications of electricity aboard ship have had their origin from the brains of naval officers."

FOLLOWED LIKE A SHADOW.

Romantic Story of a Prince Servant. London World. Now that Prince Alexander of Battenberg has accepted the consequences of his marriage and retired into comparative obscurity for the moment, all the story of his short though brilliant career will be forgotten; but no one's life has been more full of accidents of romance. He was adorned by his army, who would have followed him to the death, and by his own immediate followers, to whom he was a real hero in every sense of the word. Through his Serbian career he was attended by a tall and handsome jager, who never left him for a moment, and who on many occasions ran great risk of losing his own life in his determination not to lose sight of his master. At night he slept on a couch in the ante-room outside his bedroom, at least one plot to assassinate Prince Alexander was frustrated by his vigilance. After Prince Alexander left Bulgaria the servant who followed his master disappeared, and the solution of the mystery for mystery it always was to those who knew the Prince—was then discovered in the fact that the handsome jager was a woman in disguise, who being madly in love with Prince Alexander, determined to devote her life to guard him from danger during his stormy reign in his Bulgarian kingdom. What became of her is not known, but she was no sea again with the Prince after he left Sofia.

Boring For Gas.

The Benton Leader says: Rip Van Winkle has got his eyes open. A year ago Mr. John Wyatt near this city began digging a well on his place. When down about thirty feet he found several small seams of what appeared to be a good quality of coal, and immediately the diggers were run out of the well by a flow of some kind of gas. The possibility of finding coal or gas has been talked of ever since. Now a company has been organized and incorporated here to sink a well on the spot and find the true inwardness of that hole. The incorporators are Messrs. Z. H. Davis, T. H. Cooper, J. W. Kayburn, W. A. Wells and T. E. Cantorn, all respectable citizens of this city and vicinity. The capital stock is put at two thousand dollars, being put low so as to perfect organization without delay, as the law does not permit issuance of stock until half of the capital stock is subscribed. The shares are put at ten dollars a share. The design is to sink that much in the hole and find out what is there. No experiment of that kind has ever been tried in this valley and it will be an interesting experiment. The well will be sunk deep enough to get an artesian well if it be there. More enterprise is being exhibited in Corvallis than has been exhibited here since it has been a railroad town.

Teachers Institute.

As this district includes Linn county, it is expected that a number of teachers from this county will be present.
