TO FRUIT GROWERS.

Office of Oregon State Board of Horticulture, No. 171 Second Street.

PORTLAND, Or., April 10, '89.
The necessity for immediate action in battling with the obnoxious pests that have already secured so strong a hold in many of the orchards of Oregon, prompts the "State Board of Horticulture," created by the last Legislature, and which met and organized but yesterday, to issue this bulletin, its first act toward carrying out the objects for which it has been created. The information contained in this bulletin is of necessary brief, and somewhat crude, for time will be required to enable the Board to secure that information from practical experiments that shall be of most value to the orchardist in particular, and to the horticulturist in general.

THE CODLIN MOTH.

The Codlin moth is with-out question the insect that needs to be looked after first, as it is without doubt the worst pest ever introduced into the State. It is needless to write at length about the ravages of this enemy of the pear, apple and quince; those who have suffered from his acquaintance know him well; those who have been so fortunate as to escape his acquaintance will do well to use the one ounce of preventive and keep him out, and so have no need for the prudent cure. It is only by "eternal vigilance" that Oregon's reputation for the producing the "big red apple" sound and free from worms, "can be maintained."

We therefore appeal not only to that first law of nature, "self preservation," but to that nobler one that stirs the heart and prompts to nobler deeds that the entire State may be benefitted thereby.

REMEDIES AGAINST CODLIN MOTHS.

There are two modes of fighting them generally made use of—one is to prevent the hatching of the egg, or the killing of the young worm while working into the fruit; the other is the catching of the worm in traps as it is escaping from the fruit, or by having the fruit eaten by hogs as soon as it drops from the tree and before the worm escapes. The first mode is without doubt the most successful, and is also the least expensive.

This is accomplished by spraying the trees with London purple or Paris green, using one pound of either to one hundred and fifty gallons of water. Paris green is a compound of arsenic and copper. It is a far more powerful poison than arsenic alone, and is not soluble in water, hence it will remain much longer on the trees. London purple is another arsenical compound. It is the residue from the manufacture of aniline dye, and contains lime, arsenious acid and carbonaceous matter. It is soluble, more adhesive and less poisonous than Paris green, and therefore is to be preferred. It is better to wet the powder thoroughly and make a paste before putting it into the vessel of water that it may not form lumps. The spray is caused by forcing the liquid by means of a force pump through a fine perforated nozzle, made especially for the purpose. The finer it is the less liquid will be required. The important thing is to scatter the spray on all the fruit.

WHEN TO SPRAY.

The Codlin moth soon after the fruit sets, lays her eggs upon the calyx end of the young fruit. The grub as soon as hatched eats its way into the center of the young fruit, and there growing with its growth works its mischief. In its early state the young fruit is erect, its calyx upwards, and the least particle of poisonous water falling upon it is sufficient to destroy the young worm when it attempts to eat its way into the fruit; therefore, the best and most opportune time for spraying the trees is soon after the fruit is set, and when it is about the size of a small pea. Experience teaches, however, that it is not safe to depend upon the one early spraying to accomplish the results sought for, whether coming from a second and perhaps third crop, which many affirm and others deny, or from those that from some cause have not matured as rapidly as others, still the facts remain that in many places the Codlin moth does not sting the fruit and lay the eggs until later in the season; therefore, to obtain the best results the spraying should be continued with an interval of two weeks until the first of July, and even later than this on some late varieties. Care should be observed that vegetables are not sprayed with these mixtures, and no animals be allowed to eat the grass that has been saturated with the spray.

THE GREEN APHIS.

The use of the above mentioned sprays will be of great value to the orchard in not only ridding it of the Codlin moth, but they will also be found beneficial in freeing it from many other obnoxious insects and diseases and often of great danger to the trees and fruit. There are a number of mixtures that will operate successfully in exterminating the green aphis or apple tree louse, and can be used as most convenient to be prepared:

First. Take 3 pounds borax soap, 1 pint kerosene oil; mix in 25 gallons of water.

Second. 1 pound of whale oil soap dissolved in three gallons hot water. And still a third which is easily procured:

1 pound of common laundry soap dissolved in sixteen gallons of hot water.

Apply any of these mixtures by means of a spray pump where the aphid begin to show themselves. The time has arrived when every person having an orchard should be the owner of a force pump with a spray nozzle specially adapted to the work of spraying trees. Where one person has not sufficient use for a pump to justify him in buying one for himself alone, let him join with a few neighbors and get one that will serve them all. The cost of the material and the time required in applying it is small. London purple or Paris green costs but 25 cents per pound in small quantities and pumps all complete ready for use can be had from \$14 to \$34 each, according to size and capacity for work.

It is the desire of the board to do all they can in accomplishing the results sought in the enactment of the law creating them, and to this end they bespeak the co-operation of every person interested in horticulture in Oregon. The secretary desires to secure the name of every fruit grower in Oregon, and to this end requests that every one to whom this knowledge shall come, will send him his name and postoffice address. He also desires that all shall write him freely relative to their experience in combating these common enemies of the orchardist, for it is only by an interchange of experiences that the best results can be obtained. The board will issue other bulletins relative to the treatment of the woolly aphis and other important matters of interest to all at an early day.

San Francisco Markets.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23.—Produce receipt past 24 hours included 105,500 cts wheat, 92,500 lbs flour, 2400 sks potatoes, 2500 sks wheat.

Wheat.—The spot market exhibits a dull and weak tone with a tendency to lower prices. Buyers bid \$132 1/2 for No. 1 shipping. Operations are quiet. The only sale of No. 1 white at morning call, buyer year was 1000 tons at \$139; buyer season closed \$133 1/2; seller year (new) 125. Afternoon session buyer year closed 136 1/2; seller year (new) \$125 1/2.

Barley.—The market is dull and weak owing to a poor demand and liberal receipts. Holders are inclined to share rates. Quote: choice 67 1/2; options are quiet; buyer year \$11 1/2; buyer season 66 1/2; Afternoon session buyer year \$14.

Oats.—The market is very dull and weaker. Choice feed is quoted at \$1 00 @ 1 02 1/2; No. 1 feed 97 1/2 @ \$1 00; poorer grades 90 @ 95c.

Millstuffs.—The movement is light but prices rule steadily; bran, Oregon, \$11 00 @ 11 50 per ton; middlings \$13 00 per ton.

Potatoes.—The market continues firm owing to light receipts, and an improved demand. Stocks are quickly being worked down and prices are tending up. Burbank seedlings are quoted at \$1 00 @ 1 05; Garnet, Chili and Peerless, 50 @ 75c.

Wool.—Very quiet, but firmly held. Hops.—Inactive, nominal 10 @ 15c.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Troops Are No Longer Needed at Oklahoma.

\$100,000,000 IN SEAL SKINS.

Hon. Oliver Mowatt, Premier of Ontario, Excluded from the New York Legislature—Old World Notes.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The Adjutant General has received the following telegram from General Crook dated Chicago, April 23d: "In a telegram dated at Oklahoma yesterday, General Merritt states that he anticipates no trouble, which will require active interference of troops. Their presence has undoubtedly exercised a salutary influence. There are no reports of trouble elsewhere, which is an indication that peace prevails."

GEO. FRANCES TRAIN.

He is Crankier than Ever and is Now Fasting.

NEW YORK, April 24.—George Francis Train is indulging in a fast. It is now six days since he has eaten anything. He says he cannot tell how long the fast will last, as he will be wholly controlled by "Psyche." He drinks one glass of water each day and spends an hour in the bath. He says he thinks "Psyche" is making him reduced in flesh.

BRITISHERS NOT WANTED.

Hon. Oliver Mowatt Excluded from the New York Senate.

ALBANY, (N. Y.), April 24.—In the senate this morning Pierce asked for the privileges of the floor for Hon. Oliver Mowatt, premier of Ontario, but Murphy objected, saying that under the rules a friend of his had been refused an address and aside from that he objected to any courtesy being extended toward a defendant of the British crown. Mowatt was excluded.

SUNDAY FREIGHT TRAINS.

They Will Be Stopped on all of Vanderbilt's Lines.

NEW YORK, April 24.—Not only on the Michigan Central but on all of Vanderbilt's roads the freight trains will be stopped on Sunday after May 1st. The experiment was urged by Cornelius Vanderbilt.

The Parnell Suit.

DUBLIN, April 24.—The case of Parnell against the London Times for libel has been expunged from the court. The case was awaiting trial before the high court of justice in Ireland. The Times has deposited \$5000 into the court in order to settle the case.

A Ten Round Fight.

NEW YORK, April 24.—In a ten-round fight near here yesterday Pat Gleason, of Belleville, knocked out Joe Wooltraven, of Hakenack. Gleason is the light weight champion of the state. The fight was heated.

The Emperor of China.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The state department informed Minister Denby at Peking that the emperor had assumed the reins of government on the 4th of March.

ST. JOHNS, (N. S.) April 24.—The shipment of seals by the hunters from this port within the last six weeks is worth a \$1,000,000. This is unprecedented.
