GENERAL NEWS.

The Rights of the Settlers in Oklahoma Zealously Guarded.

A FATAL DRUNKEN ROW.
Wine Growers in Council—London on Boulogne—A Future King—Elaime's Health—Yacht Trip.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Immediately upon receipt of press reports that government officials and employes in Oklahoma had used their authority to secure prior rights in the lands, the president and Secretary Noble telegraphed to special agents now in the territory to make a thorough and prompt investigation and immediately notify the secretary of their findings. Their report is expected during this week. Secretary Noble said that not the least shadow of injustice to settlers would be tolerated for a moment. As soon as the facts could be ascertained if any official were implicated in any wrong doing the action of the government will be very prompt.

CALIFORNIA WINE GROWERS Take Action Towards Protecting Their Interests.

NEW YORK, April 25.—It is announced to-day that the long continued efforts to bring California wine growers together has at last taken definite shape. The workings of the great wine growers and handlers' trust, will be given out. John P. Porter, representing the viticultural commission of California at the Paris exposition, took steps before his departure on Saturday to perfect an organization for the combination of both the vineyard and wine interests of California. He has the support of large capitalists and co-operation of additional support and assistance from France.

EX-CONVICT SHOT.
Fatal Ending of a Drunken Spree in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—John Whalen, an ex-convict, was shot and killed early this morning by his cousin, James Wilkinson, alias Tug Wilson, on Market street, near Fourth. Wilson claims that Whalen struck him with a loaded cane, and that he shot in self-defense. Whalen's wife was present when the shooting occurred. All three were under the influence of liquor, Wilson and Whalen having been on a spree together for several days. Wilson was arrested, as were also Mrs. Whalen and Max Hurschmidt, who were detained as witnesses.

Boulogne Lined in London.
LONDON, April 25.—In an interview Boulanger denied the report that he would immediately issue a manifesto explaining his intentions. As yet he had not thought of doing so. He is being lined.

Heir to the Roumanian Throne.
BUCHAREST, April 25.—King Charles received the municipal authorities to-day. It is officially announced that his nephew, Prince Ferdinand, has been selected as heir to the throne of Roumania.

Railroad Collision.
GLENMARY, (Tenn.) April 25.—By a collision between two freight trains yesterday Conductor Hines and brakeman Taylor were killed. Engineer Kusak was fatally and two others slightly hurt.

NEW YORK, April 25.—The yacht Coronet, which has sailed around the world, returned in good condition. All are well. R. T. Bush, the owner, and family are on board.

Nobody is able to look on Cox as anything but a youngster, because his wit and the variety and vivacity of his humor never grow old, but he is past threescore now. While a young man Cox had died the present Mrs. W. C. Whitney on his knee.
"I have had a narrow escape from being President of the United States," said Sunset the other day, stopping on the avenue to talk with a group of his friends. "If my mother hadn't refused the proffered hand of General William Henry Harrison I suppose I should be in the White House now. General Harrison asked my mother to marry him, and though he had won some fame at that time she gave him the mitten, and stuck to and finally married the printer boy to whom she was engaged. See what a narrow escape I have had from being a great man."

An Artistic Watch-Dial.
The changes which the flight of time brings upon humanity afford an inexhaustible subject for the poet and the artist. As a notable specimen of emblematic and felicitous kind, a watch-dial now in process of construction at Waltham Mass., is described by the American Jeweler. It contains, instead of the usual numerals, twelve small but distinct silhouette figures, beginning with a woman with a very young child in her arms. At one o'clock the lady and her little baby are clearly depicted, the infant being in long clothes. At two o'clock the same figures appear, but the child is a little larger. At three three o'clock mamma is still there, but the infant is in short clothes. At four o'clock he again appears, and so on up to eight o'clock, when he goes to school for the first time. At nine o'clock he may be seen with his college gown and mortar board and the pleased smile of the now elderly but happy mother. At ten o'clock the death-bed scene is presented, where he parts with his beloved mother. At eleven o'clock he is a middle-aged man, over whom the snows of many winters have passed. At twelve o'clock he makes his final appearance as an old and decrepit specimen of humanity praying for a better land.

SCRAPS OF NEWS.
Union county had a heavy frost on the night of the 15th that will cut the fruit yield short this season.

Half bushels are being enlarged by the farmers in expectation of the biggest yield of grain ever had in Oregon.—Silverton Appeal.

The O. R. & N. Co. have put an ocean steamer on the route between Portland and Seattle to compete with the Northern Pacific railroad.

One hundred and fifty South Carolina negroes have applied for work in the Fresno, Cal., vineyards, agreeing to work out their fare from South Carolina to that place at \$15 per month.

Senator Vance, of North Carolina, has a son, a mere youth of 22, who has been appointed receiver of the North Yakima land office. Cleveland appointed him, and he was confirmed the day before Harrison's inauguration. He takes Col. L. S. Howlett's place as soon as his commission arrives.

The authorities at Washington have had their attention directed to the loose manner in which the land office has been conducted by Register Beard and Shields, the receiver. Beard is in the East, and many are the complaints from homesteaders about getting no vouchers for money paid.

At Jacksonville, May 13th, a hand contest will be held under the auspices of the Imp'd O. R. M. The bands of Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Douglas counties, Oregon and Siskiyou county, Cal., are invited to participate. \$150 in cash prizes will be awarded as follows: First prize of \$85; second prize \$50, and a prize of \$15 to the man executing the finest cornet solo.

The Union Pacific railroad company have purchased 17,000 tons of rails, which indicates that a new road is soon to be built from Ogden to San Francisco via Eastern Oregon and northwestern California, to obviate the necessity of dependence on the Central Pacific for connection with this coast. It is thought the road will tap the great sugar pine belt of Fall river valley, skirting the Sierra Nevada foothills to Oroville, thence crossing Colusa and Lake counties, to a junction with the Donohue road.

SALEM, April 25.—There were filed in the secretary of state's office articles of incorporation of the Oak Grove and Juniper Flat Ditch Co.; object, to convey water from White river through the lands and grazing lands of Oak Grove and Juniper Flat; capital stock, \$15,000, shares \$25 each, with J. L. Strein, Hampton Kelly, Wm. McDev. Lewis, Henry Durshick and Basil DeLove, incorporators.

PRESSED BRICK.
A mill for the manufacture of pressed brick is to be started to-morrow north of Salem near the fair grounds. They will have about 100,000 brick on hand in 30 days. It is expected to turn out 200,000 brick per month.

BLACKSMITH SHOTS HIMSELF.
PORTLAND, April 25.—John Dungan, aged 29 years, married, and a blacksmith, employed with the North Pacific lumber mills, shot himself through the left side this morning with a 44-caliber Winchester rifle, and the wound is almost certain to prove fatal.
