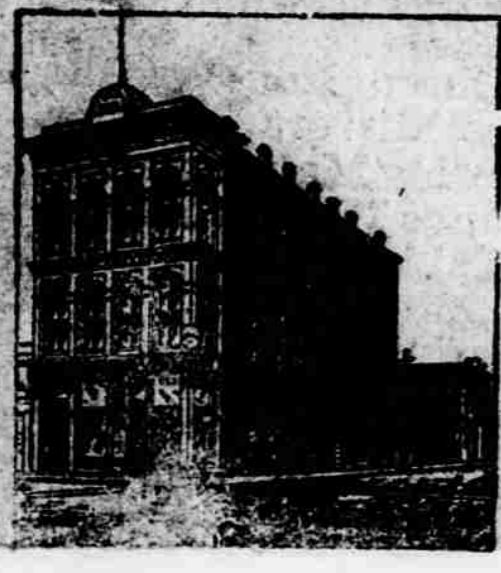

IN PORTLAND.

How the Centennial was Ob-
served in the Metropolis.

GREAT CROWDS OF PEOPLE.
The City in Holiday Attire—The Parade
The Speeches—Beautiful Day and
Successful Celebration.

PORTLAND, April 30.—The large
numbers which participated in the city
yesterday to participate in the cere-
monies today were immensely
swollen by every train which ar-
rived with its overcrowded load of
humanity. Especially was the
excursion train running from
Eugene City loaded down to the
fullest extent. The militia com-
panies of Eugene, Albany and
Salem were on the train as well as
large numbers of citizens from all
along the route, and the streets of
Portland were one continuous
throng.

At 1:30 p. m. began the grand
parade headed by the 14th regi-
ment U. S. army band, followed
by troop F, regular cavalry, Grand
Army of the Republic and old
soldiers, regular army troops,
Bishop Scott school boys, O. N. G.
militia, Portland artillery, officers of
the day, Chemawa Indian
students and band, Portland pub-
lic school, Mt. Angel college cadets,
civic societies, firemen and citi-
zens and a small boy and small
wagon drawn by a small dog.

The line reached through the
principal streets of the city, and
passed the reviewing stand on the
east side of Fifth street opposite
the postoffice building, from which
point the column was reviewed by
his excellency, Sylvester Pen-
noyer, governor of Oregon. The
line of march was continued to the
tabernacle, at which place the pub-
lic exercises were held as follows:
Music by the First Regiment band.
Gov. Pennoyer, president of the
day, called the meeting to order.
Prayer by the chaplain.
Song by the Arion society—"Hail
Columbia."
Opening address by Hon. M. P.
Deady.
Song by the Arion society—
"American Hymn."
Reading of the first inaugural of
President George Washington by
Col. John McCracken.
Song by the Arion society—
"America."
Oration by Hon. Geo. H. Wil-
liams.
Music by the First Regiment band.
Doxology by the audience.
Benediction by the chaplain.

This evening occurred the grand
opening of the exposition building
of the North Pacific Industrial
Association, consisting of military
drills and movements, followed
by a grand ball.

The city is profusely adorned
with flags, bunting and banners,
and every effort was made to ac-
commodate the thousands of visi-
tors. The occasion was a grand
gala day and the celebration has
proved a most complete success.

AT WASHINGTON.

Notes and Comments From the
National Capitol.

SOME NEW RULES ADOPTED.
Charges Against Ex-Congressman Small-
The New Caucus—Appoint-
ments Etc.

JAY GOULD'S PROJECT.
He Will Erect the Finest Union De-
pot in the World at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, April 29.—Jay Gould
has decided to have erected the
finest union depot building in the
world. The Grand Central station
at New York is not over 600 feet
long. The new station in St. Louis
is to be 1200 feet front on Poplar
street.

Gould's evident intention is to
capitalize his stock and transfer it
to several railroad companies that
have terminals in St. Louis. Not
only the depot site, but three other
properties are to be brought under
the same management, the bridge
and tunnel property and all of
which Gould has got hold of.
These are to be capitalized at
figures such that Gould will make
upwards of \$20,000,000.

The roads presented in the new
company are the Missouri Pacific
and Iron Mountain roads. Work
is to begin on the new structure at
once and the cost is estimated at
\$5,000,000.

The President is a believer in the
benefits to be derived from doing
business in a thoroughly systematic
manner. For instance, he assigned
one day of each week for the con-
sideration of business pertaining to
one of the executive Departments of
the Government, and unless the
business is unusually important it
will not be considered on any
other day than that assigned to the
Department under which it
properly comes. This rule will
work advantageously all around;
it will enable the Cabinet officer to
so arrange the work of his Depart-
ment that on the day assigned to it
he can have all matters requiring
the attention of the President
ready for presentation to him, and
it will enable the President to
rapidly dispose of the business thus
brought before him.

The Department of Agriculture
and the Department of Justice
having very little business requir-
ing the attention of the President,
have no particular time assigned
them. The days of the week are
assigned as follows: Monday—
Navy Department. Tuesday—Post
Office Department. Wednesday—
Treasury Department. Thursday—
Interior Department. Friday—
State Department. Saturday—
War Department. This rule will
also give the President some relief
from the office seekers. For in-
stance, if a man is seeking an ap-
pointment under the Post-Office
Department he will know that
Tuesday is the only day upon
which the President considers busi-
ness relating to that Department,
and will not, as he has been doing,
make daily visits to the White
House. In fact it is a good rule
anyway, and one wonders why it,
or a similar one had not been
adopted long ago.

Attorney General Miller has
been called upon to decide the
much discussed question as to
whether the four years commission
of Federal officers shall be dated
from the appointment or from the
time of confirmation by the Senate.
The date of confirmation has gener-
ally been taken, but many people
believe that the time of the original
appointment is the proper date. It
will make quite a difference to a
large number of Democratic offi-
cials, as there is in many cases a
difference of a year between the
date of appointment and that of
confirmation.

The President has appointed
Henry M. Dixon, of Mississippi a
cadet at-large to West Point. The
father of this young man was killed
by a mob at his home in Yazoo
City, Mississippi, in 1879 for the
heinous crime of having opposed
the Democratic ticket.

The beginning of the taking of
new census has been inaugurated
by the opening of the census
bureau in this city, which is in
charge of Mr. Robert Porter, the
newly appointed Superintendent.
