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ONE HUNDRED YEARS HENCE

In the light of the grand civic and military displays in the different towns and cities of the United States in the celebration of the centennial anniversary of Washington's inauguration it might not be unprofitable to advert to some of the factors which have brought about the wonderful progress of the country during the past century, and which during the next one hundred years must achieve even grander results.

The pioneers, whose camp fires from Massachusetts harbor through successive stages westward have marked the advance line of civilization, have been for the most part men imbued with the spirit of true religion, men who, opposed to the supremacy of the church, still recognized it as a necessary factor in the up-building of a successful commonwealth, and who provided generously for its growth and conservation.

Our national idea is centered in the schools in a no small degree. Of the West it may be said that whatever of its prosperity may be due to its boundless resources and other causes, a large measure of it is due to the church and school, which, established in the early pioneer days, have steadily widened in influence with the transition of the country from the rugged environments of all new communities to a condition to-day as exalted, refined and pure as the civilization of those contiguous to the hallowed spot where the Mayflower landed on Plymouth Rock.

Much as has been accomplished in the nineteenth century, its grandeur must pale before that to be accomplished in the next one hundred years, if Americans continue to advance in the lines laid down and established by their sires and grandsires. The principle of self government adopted a century ago, has been successfully applied and adhered to by over sixty millions of people, and the possibilities of the nation a hundred years hence cannot be estimated. What will our population be? Who shall say? The increase of the sixty million population of the United States is about twenty-five per cent every decade, so that at the close of the next century the increment will have run up to a total of not less than four hundred million souls, and the population of all the other states and countries likely to come under our sway will safely add another four hundred million. At the end of that period the United States will not be of North America alone, but of North, Central and South America, and the president will issue the annual thanksgiving day proclamation to nearly a thousand million people. The mind fails to grasp our industrial and commercial expanse at that day, the wonderful progress in art and science the tremendous energy with which enterprise after enterprise will be conceived and made a reality.

It takes thirteen cabinet officers, with an aggregate annual pay of \$105,000, to carry on the government of Canada. The United States manages very well with eight cabinet officers, who cost every year \$64,000.

The next census will include a list of the names, organization and length of service of surviving soldiers, sailors and marines, and of the widows of soldiers, sailors and marines. It will form an interesting part of the country's statistics.

The total production of coal in the world during the year 1888 is put by a high authority at 430,000,000 tons, of which the United States produced 130,000,000. Of the home product Pennsylvania is credited with 71,000,000 or more than one-half. Little coal is exported from the United States except to Canada, which took from us last year 3,250,000 tons. The Dominion levies a tax of sixty cents per ton on bituminous coal, while anthracite, under a new regulation, is admitted free. Imports of coal from Canada last year amounted to 750,000 tons, most of which went to points on the Pacific coast.

SECRETARY PROCTOR, being in favor of Sunday rest, and being deluged with appeals urging him thereto, has approved an order abolishing all military duty on Sunday. Inspections throughout the army are to be held Saturday morning, and the soldiers are to have their own time from Saturday noon till Monday morning.

If such a calamity as the death of President Harrison and of Vice President Morton should occur, Mr. Blaine would be president.

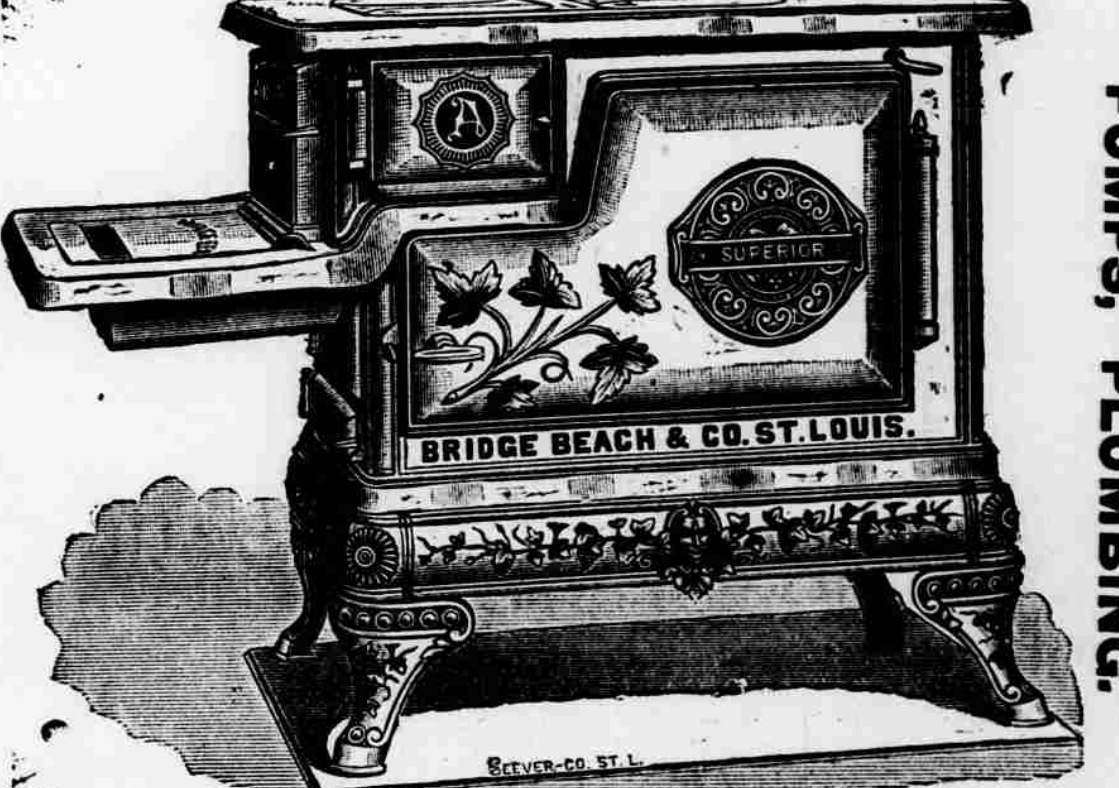
