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BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.

Arrangements Made to Raise Funds to Advertise the City.

The Albany Board of Trade met at the G. A. R. hall last evening to consider the subject of raising funds to advertise the city at the National Encampment, G. A. R., to be held at Milwaukee in August.

After a full discussion of the merits of the subject, as set forth in the letter of Hon. E. B. McElroy, published in the HERALD, on motion of D. B. Monteith it was voted that a committee of three be appointed to make arrangements for issuing a descriptive pamphlet setting forth the advantages and resources of Albany and Linn county and raising sufficient funds to meet the necessary expenses of publishing the same.

J. W. Cusick, E. J. Lanning and J. O. Writman were named as such committee.

The secretary was instructed to collect all the information possible in regard to facts and data desirable to publish and report the same at a subsequent meeting.

C. E. Wolverton, T. J. Stites and C. W. Watts were appointed as a committee to compile a pamphlet for publication.

THE COUNTY JUDGE CONTEST.

The Case Decided by the Supreme Court in Favor of Judge Blackburn.

Information was received in this city last night that the Linn county judgeship contest has been decided in favor of Judge D. R. N. Blackburn.

The opinion was rendered by Justice Lord. It was held that Judge Whitney's notice of contest was not legally given, as it alleged no specific grounds upon which the contest was based.

The case came up on an appeal from the decision of Judge Boise on the same point, and now after nearly a year of labored and fruitless filibustering on the part of the contestant it has finally been decided in a manner highly satisfactory to the people of Linn county.

Good Work.

During the ten days that the steamer Wm. M. Hoag plied on the river above here, from April 17th to 26th, eight trips were made some of which were as far up as the "red warehouse," about three miles this side of Harrisburg. She has brought down 1228 tons of grain, some of the cargoes being the largest ever carried by a boat on the upper Willamette.

On Friday evening last she left Corvallis on her way to Portland having come down on that day with 156 tons of grain from the Oolie warehouse, taking on 25 tons here, making in all 180 tons. With this she began running on regular time again between here and Portland.

There are yet thousands of bushels of grain awaiting shipment at points above here, with very little prospect of another rise in the river.—Corvallis Gazette.

CAMPMEETING ASSOCIATION FORMED.

The M. E. Church to Purchase Permanent Grounds for This Purpose Near Albany.

A number of the pastors of the Eugene district of the M. E. church met in this city yesterday and formed themselves into a campmeeting association for the district, having been called to order by the presiding elder for the purpose of purchasing grounds and holding the regular campmeetings of the church.

The association was organized by electing Rev. S. P. Wilson, the presiding elder of the district, president; Rev. D. T. Summerville, of Halsey, first vice-president; Rev. F. H. Calder, of Turner, second vice-president; Rev. H. P. Webb, of Albany, secretary; J. B. Coughl, treasurer.

Rev. H. Gould, of Shedd, Rev. H. P. Webb, of Albany, J. B. Coughl, were elected an executive committee to purchase permanent grounds for the association of not less than twenty acres. Grounds were examined just across the river and looked upon favorably for purchasing. The fact of holding such a meeting annually so near to Albany will be of no little interest to the city, and it was thought that Albany, with her usual generosity, would be willing to liberally assist in the enterprise.

The association adjourned to meet at the call of the president, which will probably be early next week. Let the citizens take hold of this matter in earnest, and not let it fail for want of patronage, as quite a sum of money is needed to fit up the grounds so as to hold a campmeeting about the middle of June of this year.
