A GHASTLY DISCOVERY.

The Supposed Remains of a Human Proves to be a Defunct Canine.

Yesterday while working on some lots recently purchased by Dr. W. C. Negus in Hackleman's fourth addition, some workmen found what was supposed to be a human body buried a short distance beneath the surface.

City Marshal Hoffman and Geo. Humphrey, justice of the peace, and ex-officio coroner, were summoned, and armed with a shovel they proceeded to the spot indicated, when they began to unearth the remains. A quantity of gray hair, looking suspiciously like that of some aged man, were found, at which juncture a first-class sensation seemed imminent.

Further investigation, however, revealed the fact that the remains were those of a quadruped, supposed to be some shaggy, defunct canine. The disgusted officials did not remain to make a scientific classification of the decaying mass of bones.

STATE DISPATCHES.

The Examination of Hawkins in Salem Postponed Neway Notes.

SPECIAL TO THE HERALD.—Salem, May 4.—At two o'clock this afternoon J. E. Hawkins, the murderer of Ogie, in charge of Sheriff Croisan and Deputy Wrightman, made his appearance before Justice Goodell for preliminary examination. As neither prosecution nor defense was ready to proceed with the examination a continuance was taken until Monday at 1:30 p. m. This trial is exciting considerable interest, and by the time court was called this afternoon, a crowd of several hundred filled the street and sidewalk in front of the justice's office.

The Hood River improvement company with a capital stock of \$100,000; principal place of business, Hood River, Wasco county; incorporators, E. L. Smith, T. J. Lynde and P. Beller.

The Oregon Baptist state convention; object, to sustain and promote Baptist religion in Oregon; cash value of property, etc., \$50,000; John Gordon, Geo. W. Hill, N. J. Blagen, D. C. Latourrette, S. P. Davis and F. C. McCann, incorporators.

The Woman's North Pacific Presbyterian board of missions. The trustees or incorporators are Caroline A. Ladd, Jennie E. Brown and Florence Landon. The objects of this association are in the interest of the foreign missions.

At the Penitentiary. The present number of prisoners confined within the penitentiary walls is 291, and of this number something near 200 of them are employed in the stove foundry. The number of sick patients is five, three of whom are very low with consumption, and will likely pass to that great beyond before the expiration of their sentences. The new cloth from the Brownsville woollen mills has arrived and is conceded to be of a better quality than that used before. The stripes are much wider, and if any change is made in the looks it is really more pleasing to the eye than the former small stripes. Howard, who chopped off his hand some time ago, is sawing wood like a tripper. He is subdued and performs his labor gracefully. —Salem Journal.

New River Boat. The new boat now being completed for the O. R. & N. at Portland, will be ready, it is thought, by the middle of this month for launching. It is possible that this part of the programme will not take place until sometime between the 20th and 25th inst. The new boat is so nearly done as to present a very neat appearance. The machinists are busily engaged in putting her machinery and boilers in order, so as to have everything in shape when she strikes water. This is of very light draught and can navigate in very low water.

YAQUINA BAY NOTES. Newport has organized a Building and Loan Association. A contract will be let on May 10 to build a Catholic church at Newport.

The 30th of May will be fully observed by the people of Newport. The old soldiers have this matter in charge.

The extension of the tramway and building of a new wharf on the south jetty is progressing finely. This work will cost about \$2,000 and is so much dead loss caused by the shifting of the tide.

The Yaquina Republican says: Drs. P. S. Byrne and C. E. Byrne of New York came in from the east on Sunday. They bought about \$3,000 worth of Newport property before they left. They say that all the talk now in the east is of Oregon and Washington territory.

ALBANY WILL BE ADVERTISED.

Some Fine Views and Descriptive Matter to Supplement the State Pamphlets.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade of this city Friday night arrangements were made to publish several thousand pamphlets descriptive of the resources and advantages of Albany and surrounding country, to be distributed at the national encampment of the G. A. R. to be held at Milwaukee in August. Since the meeting the committee has wisely decided that it would be better to publish about 20,000 extra copies of the fine birdseye view and accompanying illustrations and descriptive matter now being prepared by the Elliott Publishing Co., of San Francisco, for the HERALD and several of the real estate firms and others of this city, and distribute them instead of the proposed pamphlets. The average pamphlet has become to be somewhat stale in this age of pictures, and the fine views now contemplated by the committee, which would be accompanied by brief descriptive matter, a map showing the railroads centering here, and other information, would be the most attractive matter that could be placed in the hands of those in the East who are interested in this country.

It is also proposed to send a car load of fruit and other products of this portion of Oregon, which, together with the printed information, will be placed in charge of some representative man of this city, who will accompany the excursion in the interest of this city and surrounding country. Following the recommendations of Hon. E. B. McElroy, Mr. J. W. Cusick will probably go as such representative of Albany.

It will be a good opportunity to advertise the different portions of the state, and the manner in which those in charge of this undertaking are making arrangements will if followed out result in much direct benefit being secured by this city.

COAST NOTES.

The Oregon & Washington territory railroad is to be extended from Fulton, its present terminus, to Pendleton, a distance of seven miles. The line is now being relocated. A Pendleton gentleman in Portland says that the road will be completed and ready for operation within sixty days.

Company "I," O. N. G., of Macleay, are making a little quiet grumbling all to themselves over the way they were entertained in Portland on Centennial day. They expected food and lodging but had to pay for what they ate and lie on wool sacks in the army without covering. They can sympathize with some of the old boys of the sixties.

The faculty of the medical department of the State University were elected in Portland last Monday, and are Dr. S. E. Josephi, dean; Dr. C. C. Strong, secretary; Dr. Holt C. Wilson, treasurer. The faculty has for some time had under consideration the question of elevating the standard of medical education in this state, and at the meeting above mentioned unanimously resolved that it will hereafter require, as one of the essentials for graduation, three courses of lectures, instead of two as was heretofore the rule. The next session will commence in October.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

PORTLAND, Or., May 3. The fourth annual convention of the Oregon State Sunday School Association will be held in the Presbyterian church, Corvallis, commencing at 2 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, June 4th, and closing at 12 m. on Thursday, June 6, 1889. While this is a Mass Convention, and all interested in the work are most earnestly and cordially invited to be present, yet to insure representation, all Sunday schools in the state are requested to select two or more persons pledged to attend. Word comes to us from Corvallis that the friends of their homes and hearts and take care of all who may attend the convention. That they may know who are to be entertained, all those expecting to be present will confer a favor by sending their names to Prof. W. E. Yates, Corvallis, that places may be assigned them. Arrangements have been made with the lines of the Southern Pacific railroad in Oregon and the Oregon Pacific railroad to return at one-fifth fare all those in attendance who have paid full fare in going to the convention over these lines. Prof. Henry Sheak, of Philomath, Oregon is the Statistical secretary of the association, and he desires to secure a report from every Sunday school in Oregon. Will the proper officer of each school see that such a report is sent him in time for the convention?
