## GENERAL NEWS.

**Veterans of 1840 Call Upon President Harrison.**

**THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH.**  
Minister Grant Arrives at Vienna—Appointment by the President—Oklahoma Act.

**WASHINGTON, May 9.**—The Association of Veterans of 1840, composed of the members of the Tippecanoe Club, who assisted in the election of President William Henry Harrison, called at the White House in a body to the number of seventy to pay their respects to the president. They were accompanied by Ex-Minister Schenk, Ex-Senator Pomeroy and Ex-Public Printer Clapp. The latter acted as spokesman and made the address to the president explaining the object of the visit. The president responded as follows: "I beg to assure you I appreciate very highly this evidence of your respect and confidence. If I were to set before me an ambition which would insure success to my administration it would be that I might continue to hold fast the respect and confidence of such men as yourselves—matured of mind and unbiased of judgment. I thank you for your coming and for your kindly words." The president has appointed Frank C. Loveland pension agent at New York, vice Franz Siegle, resigned.

Secretary Noble will take action on the cases of crooked government of affairs in Oklahoma in a few days.

**HYDROPHOBIA FACTS.**  
WALTON, Lane county, Or. In reading the HERALD of May 1st I find an editorial on imaginary diseases, in which the opinion is expressed that hydrophobia is of that class. Said opinion is backed by the eminent physicians Hamilton and Spitzka. I remember somewhere between thirty-five and forty years ago a neighbor of ours in Illinois had a dog go mad, as we call it, and where his children were playing and bit four of them, and passed on, making a tour of about thirty-five miles before he was run down and killed. During that time he bit quite a number of people, dogs and other stock. All the dogs thus bitten that were not killed right away were tied up, and invariably went mad in a short time. Among the people bitten was an Uncle of mine, by the name of Elijah Clark, of Belle Air, Crawford county, Illinois, and four children by the name of Burke, who sent over to Terre Haute, Indiana, for an old lady who had a mad stone. She applied the stone to the wound and they all got well without any of the patients having hydrophobia. Another lady, who had just had her cloak bitten went home and sewed up the rent made by the dog and bit off the thread with her teeth, not having any idea that by so doing she had received some of the poison, consequently her imagination could have nothing to do in the case. In a few days she went into spasms, from which she never recovered, and it was pronounced by the physicians a genuine case of hydrophobia.

I saw Chas. Burke as late as 1876, and although he was but a small child when bitten, and now a man with a family, he told me he was in constant dread of going mad, and had ropes and chains prepared and his wife instructed that if at any time she should see anything unnatural about his conduct to him up instantly until she could find out what was wrong. Were it possible for imagination to drive him mad he would have been dead years ago. He was then, and I suppose is yet, living near Casey, Clark county, Illinois, where if any one doubts my statement they can write.

The above facts will rather explode the imagination theory. Rev. Marks passed through our settlement at Florence and return, preaching at Walton school house, at the Head of Tide, and at Florence. He has taken a claim on Wolf Creek. He informs me that

Daily Oregonian April 27.—BATTLE CREEK, Mich., April 27.—A heavy train of probably thirty carloads of threshing machines from the Advance Thresher Company, consigned to Z. T. Wright, Portland, Or., left this city early this morning via the Burington route, C. B. & Q. R. R. and will be run through special to destination, stopping only at important points en route for exhibition. The rapid time and numerous decorations will doubtless cause this train as it speeds across the country to attract the attention of the entire farming community of the whole Pacific Northwest.

**Morphine Habit.**  
The morphine habit has become so prevalent in Berlin that it has become necessary for the Government to adopt preventive measures. It is said that women are particularly addicted to the use of the drug and that is no uncommon sight to see one of them produce a syringe in public and take a hypodermic injection. A law has recently been passed regulating the sale of morphine, by which druggists are forbidden to sell the drug except on the prescription of a doctor residing in the district. The prescription is not returned to the purchaser, who must procure a new one upon every occasion. Wholesale druggists can only sell to doctors and chemists, and in all cases great care must be taken as to the identity of the purchaser.

**A Desirable Locality.**

## SOUTHERN OUTRAGES.

**Four Hundred Armed Men Take Possession of a Town.**  
NEW ORLEANS, May 7.—The Times-Democrat's Lafayette special says: Four hundred armed men, under General Alexander Declatue, of St. Martin's parish, rode into Lafayette this morning, took possession of the town, and demanded the resignation of a negro justice of the peace and negro constables. The latter had disappeared, but the former complied with their demand.

The regulators, pretending to have heard that Vignaux, a prominent republican who had been suggested by Congressman Coleman, as United States marshal of the western district of Louisiana, had furnished arms to the negroes, called on that gentleman, who is now town marshal of Lafayette, discussed with him the matter of his having attempted to vote negroes at the election last Monday.

They informed him that their purpose was to prevent the negroes from voting, and they intended to enforce their views on the subject, intimating that the best thing that Vignaux could do was to desist from any further efforts on behalf of negro suffrage. Vignaux stated that he was at the polls Monday, performing his duty under the law.

This statement being satisfactory, the regulators concluded to allow Vignaux to live awhile longer. He exists by probation, so to speak. The regulators and authorities finally agreed that an election should be held next Monday for municipal officers of Lafayette, at which only white men shall vote. As this election will not be legal, the names of those receiving a majority of the votes cast will be sent to the governor for appointment.

## GRANGE NOTES.

Jordan Valley Grange has recently made their fine commodious hall more attractive and homelike by supplying a new carpet for the floor. They look after the comfort of their members in that grange, as well as the welfare of their domestic animals, having built a large and commodious shed under which to place their teams during meetings.

Willamette Grange, of Benton county, has a class of four ladies for initiation at the next meeting, and several applications for membership on file.
