A Double-Toothed Skeleton. Florence (A. T.) Enterprise. While wandering in the neighborhood of Poston Butte, northwest of town, a few days ago, Charles P. Mason observed some irregularly laid stones in an elliptical form in one place, and prompted by curiosity, he excavated its interior. At a depth of several feet he uncovered the skeleton of one of the prehistoric dwellers of this valley. In one hand were evidences of a bunch of arrows, the stones of which he gathered as curiosities. The skeleton was that of a person nearly six feet in height, but the body had evidently been crowded into a grave too small and was doubled up in a cramped position. Mr. Mason took the jaw-bone, showing a full set of good, sound teeth, every one of which was a double tooth. It is barely possible that the skeleton was that of one of the more recent occupants of the valley—a Yaqui, Pima or Papago—but the evident care taken in its interment suggests the likelihood of its prehistoric origin.

LeCaron believes that Dr. Cronin has been killed and that the friendship between himself and the murdered man may account for his removal.

Three of Them Meet their Punishment on the Scaffold. OZARK, (Mo.) May 10.—Three Bald Knobbers, Dave Walker, chief of the Bald Knobbers, his son Wm. Walker, and John Matthews, were hanged at 10 o'clock this morning, for the murder of Charles Green and Williams Edens on March 11, 1887. The ropes broke and the three men fell to the ground struggling. It was a horrible butchery. The condemned men were carried back on the scaffold and again dropped, but it was again a bungler, and the men hung by their necks, struggling and wriggling, until finally they were wrangled to death. Dave Walker died in fifteen minutes, John Matthews in thirty minutes and Bill Walker in fourteen minutes.

May 10.—At the annual meeting of the bureau of information and distribution of the Delaware fruit exchange, ex-Congressman Martin said the pear and peach crop, if all reports are true, would be so large as to require the assistance of all the agencies of the exchange to enable the growers to realize any profit.

A QUIET WEDDING. Marriage of a Burlesque Actress to a Wealthy Man.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—An interesting little romance came to light recently in this city. Frank G. Pakenham of this city and Miss May Russell of the London Gaiety Burlesque Company were quietly married at Detroit, Mich. So quietly was the wedding ceremony conducted that few of Mr. Pakenham's most intimate friends have heard of the affair. And with this wedding, too, the climax in a romantic little drama seems to have been reached. Mr. Pakenham, as his name suggests, is an Englishman born and bred. His family is among the most wealthy and aristocratic in England. About five years ago he met Miss Russell in London. It was a case of love on both sides. Pakenham Sr. opposed the match, and Frank was sent off to America with plenty of money in his pocket. He came to Minneapolis about three years ago, and is now a member of a firm of dealers in crockery and glassware. During the engagement of the Gaiety company in Chicago Miss Russell secured a vacation and came to Minneapolis. The length of her visit is unknown, but it is sufficient to say that Mr. Pakenham accompanied her on her return East, and a wedding at Detroit was the result. It is said that Miss Russell will leave the stage as soon as her American engagements are completed.

MULDOON'S LATEST IDEA. He Would Like to Wrestle With John L. Sullivan.

New York, May 10.—Billy Muldoon, the wrestler, thinks that John L. Sullivan could make quite a nice sum of money before going into training by giving wrestling expeditions with him in this city, Philadelphia and Boston. He said yesterday: "The practice in wrestling Sullivan would get would be of great benefit to him, especially as I understand that Kilrain has taken wrestling lessons in England and places a great deal of dependence on his wrestling powers to enable him to defeat Sullivan when they meet to battle for the championship of the world and \$20,000 in July."

A BOY MAIL ROBBER. He Wants His Young Wife to go to Prison With Him.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 10.—Elijay Snyder is the name of a boy 17 years old, and small of his age, who is in jail here convicted of robbing the mails in Macon county. The little fellow was a mail rider and purloined a few dollars from the mail pouch, but when caught he was sorry and gave the money up. Tamasese Refuses to Make Peace Unless He is Recognized as King. SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 9.—Dr. Knuppe, late German consul to Samoa, has arrived here. Advice from Samoa to April 30 state that natives are quiet, and the position of the hostilities unchanged. Admiral Kimberly, of the United States navy, on the suggestion of Mataafa, tried through Dr. Knuppe, to persuade Tamasese to agree to peace. Tamasese declined unless he was recognized as king. Admiral Kimberly thereupon issued a proclamation urging the natives to maintain peace.

The steamer Reckton, which will convey 450 men belonging to the wrecked American war ships, to San Francisco, was ready to leave, and was expected to sail on May 1 from Apia. Eighty men will remain with Admiral Kimberly at Apia. The Nipsic has been fitted with a new rudder, and was about ready to start for Auckland. Herr Stufel, the newly appointed German consul, has arrived at Apia. The commander of the British cruiser Rapid has hoisted the British flag over the Suwarrow Islands, in the Southern Pacific ocean, northwest of Cook island. In their discussion on the government of Samoa to day, they showed a wide divergence of views and but little progress was made.

COMPLETE RENUNCIATION. A Young Lady Worth \$6,000,000 Joins the Sisters of Mercy.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—Miss Kate Drexel, second daughter of the late Francis Drexel, who left \$6,000,000 to each of his three daughters, has practically renounced the world. The young lady has entered as a postulant of the order of sisters of mercy in the mother house of the sisters of Pittsburg. This is not exactly equivalent to entering the order, but those who know Miss Drexel know that this act amounts to a complete renunciation of her family and her great wealth. Miss Drexel has meditated this step for some time, although the fact has been kept quiet.

Miss Drexel attended mass at St. John's Roman Catholic church in this city Monday morning, and it was there that she elected to part from a few of her most intimate friends who knew of her purpose. After finishing her devotions she kissed all her relatives, and took the train to Pittsburg, where she entered formally upon her new life.

Judge Lawrence still retains his mental vigor and his hearing and sight are as good as they were fifty years ago. He is a little man, dwarfed by his age.
