The slow course and devious ways which a case in court can be meandered by the wiles of opposing counsel, is pretty well illustrated in the celebrated Myra Gains case of New Orleans, which was finally settled one day this week, by the decision of the United States supreme court awarding the heirs of Mrs. Gains \$567,000, Justice Bradley giving the opinion.

THE PRESIDENT HAS RECEIVED some severe castigation from political opponents because he appointed his brother Carter Harrison to the marshalship of Middle Tennessee. On this appointment S. A. Cunningham, of the Nashville American, an ex-confederate and a strong democrat wrote a letter of recommendation to the president, and says: "I know Carter Harrison well. He is a worthy, good man, and very poor. I know that he could not be induced to make a plea for an appointment, although

he well deserved it from a personal standpoint. An additional motive in writing to the president was to let him know of a confederate soldier's kindly sentiment towards those who fought for the union. I was a prisoner for six months in General Harrison's city, Indianapolis. I confronted his brother in battle, and said in my letter that I believe those who were acquainted with Carter Harrison in Tennessee, regardless of party, would be gratified if he would give him a good appointment."

THE BRITISH MINISTRY are seriously considering the question of sending the Prince of Wales to act as Viceroy of Ireland. Probably that would be the greatest strike of political finesse that they could possibly attempt. The Prince would do more towards capturing the hearts and allegiance of the Irish people than any other person could. But even that would not quench the home rule spirit that is abroad in the Emerald Isle and which will eventually gain the day.

It is asserted that the royal family of England are sadly worried over the prospects of the eldest son of the Prince of Wales, who is of course the heir to the throne. He is 25 years old and unmarried, and it is said that the family conclave have decided that he must have an American wife, all of which is simply unreliable snobbish rumor.

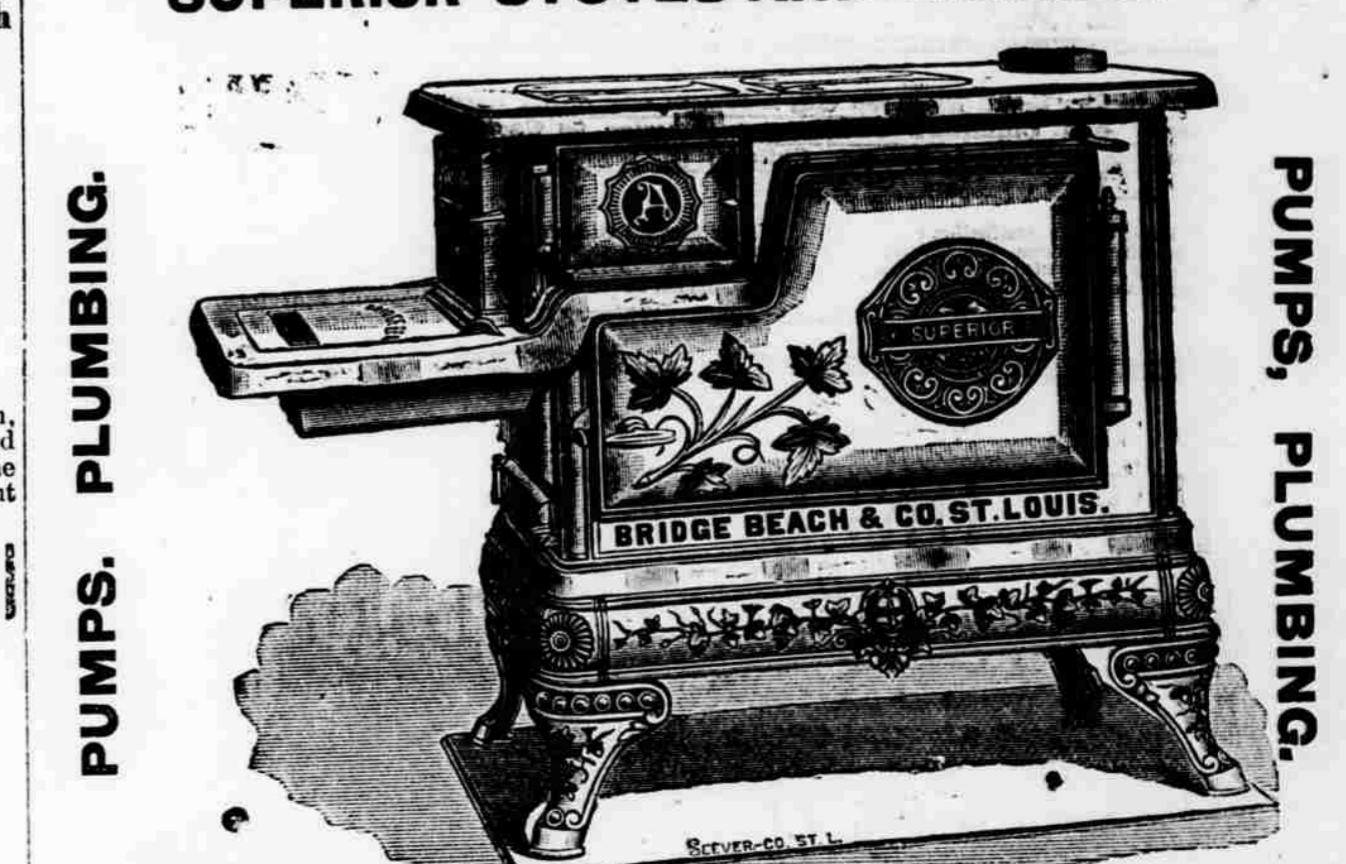
