**THE SAMOAN CONFERENCE.**

Germany Refuses to Accede to the Demands of the United States—Exception to American Minister to France.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The president made the following appointments to-day: John W. Mel drum, of Laramie, Wyoming, secretary of Wyoming; James C. Luckey, of Oregon, agent of the Warm Spring Indians in Oregon.

**THE NEW MINISTER.**

Reception to Whitelaw Reid, American Minister to France.

PARIS, May 21.—President Carnot to-day gave audience to Whitelaw Reid, the American minister, who presented his credentials. In his address he assured President Carnot that he would endeavor to maintain and stimulate the esteem which President Harrison and the whole American people held for France.

"It is my good fortune to represent America here when France is celebrating as important a centenary as lately celebrated in America. We do not forget that you helped in the success of our rebellion. This increases our interest in the magnificent display of art with which you nobly crown your centenary. My instructors inform me that there does not exist a shadow of difference between France and the United States capable of obscuring the century or old friendship of the two republics, which I hope will always endure."

**THE SAMOAN CONFERENCE.**

The Germans Refuse to Accede to the Demands of the U. S.

BERLIN, May 21.—A special correspondent of the associated press who is here has learned that a serious hitch has occurred in negotiations between the commissions to the conference in regard to Samoan affairs. The United States government insists that Malietoa Mataafa shall be restored as king, and this is the chief point at issue.

The German government is reluctant to agree to that proposition. Its representatives point out that Germany has pardoned Malietoa, and declare that they think that is the best their government can do as far as he is concerned.

### THE FIGHT CONTINUED.

The Interest in the Oregon & Transcontinental Does Not Abate.

NEW YORK, May 21.—The interest in the Oregon & Transcontinental fight continued on the wane to-day. Prices dropped 3 per cent from last night's closing. Last week's movement almost have been forgotten, but for the action of S. V. White in resenting some of the statements published about him. He appeared before the King county grand jury and obtained an indictment against the editor of an aggressive paper.

### MARRIAGE OF MRS. FOLSOM.

A Michigan Man Aged Sixty Years Leads Her to the Altar.

JACKSON, Mich., May 20.—Great interest was aroused in society circles yesterday when the rumor became current that Mrs. Emma C. Folsom, mother of Ex-President Cleveland's wife, was to be married to-day to Henry E. Perrine, a merchant, of Buffalo.

Mrs. Folsom came here on the 8th instant, and has been quietly stopping with her relatives since. Mr. Perrine has been at a hotel since Wednesday last.

The rumor was corroborated last evening by the arrival of Mrs. Cleveland, who proceeded to the residence of her aunt, Mrs. Codman, where Mrs. Folsom was stopping. Extraordinary precautions had been taken to keep the affair quiet, and very few were cognizant of it until the last moment.

The wedding was solemnized at 9 o'clock this evening, Rev. R. B. Balcom, of St. Paul's Episcopal church officiating.

The bride was attired in a traveling costume.

Mr. and Mrs. Perrine left on the night train for Chicago and the West for a trip, before returning to Buffalo to reside. Mrs. Cleveland will remain for a few days, the guest of Mrs. Codman, before leaving for home. The groom is about fifteen years the senior of the bride, who is a well preserved woman of 45.

### TAKING THE CENSUS.

Some Idea of the Work Which Mr. Porter Will Superintend.

Cleveland Leader.

The reports of the tenth census were but recently finished and put in print, and already preparations are being made for the eleventh census, which will be taken next year. Now that a Superintendent has been nominated—Mr. Robert P. Porter—a clerical force will be organized, a building rented for them to labor in and in a short time an immense force of men will be moving over the entire country in the work of gathering statistics. The schedules upon which the census will be based are to follow the general plan of the one of ten years ago, but very much modified in their scope.

After everything is in running order there will be about 40,000 enumerators through the country. There were 30,000 of these ten years ago. Over those 40,000 enumerators there will be 175 supervisors; there were 150 ten years ago. Congress has appropriated for the work \$6,400,000, which is to cover the entire census. Only \$3,000,000 were appropriated ten years ago, but since then liberal means have been voted by Congress to continue and complete the work, the original \$3,000,000 being found entirely inadequate.

There were employed in the main office here ten years ago 1400 clerks. It is thought that somewhere about the same number will be needed for the work to come, but they will not be employed so long at the task, because of the fact that much less is to be attempted.

Ten years ago, when the census was taken, data was taken on some fifty different subjects, but the magnitude of the work caused the projectors to abandon the compilation of statistics of over half the subjects, and as it was the last of the volumes was but recently issued from the Government Printing Office.

### EAGER OFFICE SEEKERS.

Letters Received by Mrs. Harrison Urging the Use of Her Influence.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—It seems that Mrs. Harrison, as well as the president, is not free from the annoyance of office seekers. Her mail contains every day appeals from office seekers to use her influence with her husband in the writers behalf.

Some of the correspondents request Mrs. Harrison to remind the president that their applications remained unanswered. They have heard nothing about them, and they fear that the president has inadvertently neglected to act upon them. They beg Mrs. Harrison to look around the office for the letters and petitions, and put them where General Harrison will be sure to see them.

Some of the letters are from women. One of them in a recent epistle wrote that she was a widow with three children, and that her husband was killed in the war, fighting on the Southern side, and there was an unconscious pathos in the details of a poor widow's struggles to maintain and bring up "in the fear of the Lord" these three girl children. She wanted a post-office paying only \$350 a year, and yet it would be a "God send" to her.

One man wrote recently eight letters to Mrs. Harrison, because he feared that three previous epistles of some length addressed to "your respected husband had failed to meet his eye." The letters breath the most devoted piety, trust republicanism and the most pronounced prohibition sentiments, and end up with the request for an office of some kind that would make life a little easier for a man with only one leg.

**SOMOAN AFFAIRS.**

A Famine Now Prevailing Among the Unfortunate Samoans.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—Commander Walker, who is acting secretary of the navy, to-day received the following dispatch from Captain Farquhar, who commanded the Trenton:

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20. Arrived: The Reckton, bound for Mare Island, with Captain Farquhar, Lieutenants Brown, Reamey and Scott, Passed Assistant Engineer Main, Galla and Matthews, Chaplain McAlister, Assistant Surgeon White, Boatswain McLaughlin, Carpenter Fernold, Railmaker Boutwell, of the Trenton; Lieutenants Conlin, Wilson and Culver, Ensigns Gibbons and Heath, Chief Engineer Greene, Passed Assistant Engineer Webster, Surgeon Harvey, of the Vandalia; Ensign Field, of the Neptis, and 383 men from the Trenton and 141 from the Vandalia. Seven officers and seventy-six men were left at Samoa to finish the work of wrecking.

The admiral wishes a steamer sent for them. The steamers from Auckland are convenient, if the department can arrange to have them call at Apia.

The admiral has issued a proclamation to the Samoans, advising peace. The armies are disbanding, to await the action of the Berlin conference. There is a famine among the natives, caused by the destruct on of the crops during the recent hurricane. The admiral requests authority to issue rations to them.

I am ordered to Washington, and will start as soon as possible.

### FARQUHAR.

Some time must elapse before the next mail steamer leaves for Samoa, and the authority necessary to enable Admiral Kimberly to issue rations cannot be sent immediately.

### A QUIET WEDDING.

Fannie Davenport, the Actress, and Her Leading Man Married.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Fannie Davenport and her leading man, Melbourne McDowell, were married privately last evening by Rev. C. H. Eaton, of the church of the Divine Paternity, East Forty-sixth street.

Mr. Eaton, a male relative of Miss Davenport, and the bride's niece, were the only witnesses. They are married under the Universalist form with a ring.

The couple will probably go abroad.

In May, 1888, Miss Davenport obtained a divorce from Edward F. Price in this city. Dr. Houghton refused to perform the ceremony, as McDowell and Miss Davenport were both divorced.
