ITS RECENT BOND ISSUE.

Forty Miles of Road Completed Through Malheur Valley—Information Concerning the Road.

The following official notice printed in the New York Times of May 17 contains some interesting information concerning the Oregon Pacific railroad: Subscription for \$5,000,000—Oregon Pacific railroad company—First mortgage 6 per cent. gold bonds, due October 1, 1900.

The Oregon Pacific railroad company is organized for the purpose of providing the state of Oregon with an urgently needed means of communication with other states and foreign countries by means of a railroad from Yaquina Bay on the Pacific coast, running through the central portion of the state to the eastern boundary thereof.
