SAMOA AND BEHRING SEA.

Death of Judge Washburn of Lane County
—A Steamboat Lost With All on Board.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.]
WASHINGTON, May 31.—The state department officials absolutely decline to discuss the Samoan conference or Behring sea matter. Of the former they admit that matters are in such shape as to warrant the expectation of the conclusion of the conference soon. Comparatively unimportant details yet remain to be adjusted. Upon prospects of a treaty they refuse to talk.
So far as can be learned there is no new phase in the Behring sea matter. The president's proclamation appears to have closed the history of the case and it cannot be learned that there has been any correspondence between the government of the United States and the Germans on the subject. According to the position taken by the United States government by congressional declaration, the jurisdiction of the United States over the waters on the Alaska side of the Behring sea is not admitted to be a subject for negotiations.

THE SAMOAN CONFERENCE.

It Will Not Meet Again for Several Days.
BERLIN, May 31.—The Samoan conference will not meet again for several days. The commissioners have agreed to the question at issue and have drawn up a protest. This has been telegraphed to the governments interested, and it is expected that replies will be received by wire, and on their arrival a formal and final sitting will be held.

HERE'S A STATE OF THINGS.

General Hypolite Proclaims Himself Ruler of Hayti.
LONDON, May 31.—A cable dispatch has been received from General Hypolite, the insurgent leader in Hayti, saying that he has defeated President Legitime, captured Port Au Prince and proclaimed himself president.

STEAMSHIP LOST.

The Ontario Goes Down With All on Board.
NEW YORK, May 31.—The Herald this afternoon printed the following special: There is a well authenticated rumor that the steamship Ontario has foundered in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and sunk, with all hands. She sailed on Wednesday for Liverpool with a full list of cabin passengers.

Death of Judge Washburn.

JUNCTION CITY, May 31.—Judge Geo. S. Washburn, died at the home of his parents in this city last night, after a protracted illness. He was a young man of ability and a prominent attorney of Lane county. He has held the office of county judge and was prominently identified with the political interests of his county. He was a graduate of the state university at Eugene, where he resided. He leaves a wife and child besides many relatives and friends to mourn his death.

THE FRENCH ADVENTURER.

The Rise of Boulanger and the Prospects of the Future.

Boulangism is only the expression of the dissatisfaction of all classes in France with the republic and its leaders, and another instance showing how easily the masses may be deceived and led astray. The prime causes for the establishment of Boulangism lie in the universal contempt in which all the Republican leaders, with the exception of Freycinet, are held in France, and every day the newspapers reassert that truth. To be ruled by men whom one would be afraid to receive in his house—by a Constans, convicted perjurer, and charged by the leading newspaper with malfeasance in office, and who was compelled for a few years to disappear from the political stage; by a Tirard, a time server, whose incapacity is not denied by his most intimate friends, and whose moral character may be compared with that of Boss Tweed; by a Jules Ferry, supporting his family out of the French Treasury and ready to sacrifice the world to his ambition; by a Fallieres; by a Reuquier, who barely escaped conviction by a majority of one voice after a protracted trial on a charge of the grossest and vilest immorality; by an Andrieux, the acknowledged protector of a well-known process of the Rue Dupont, in whose house he was arrested when it was raided, and whom he saved from prosecution and conviction; by a Floquet, another time server, who, after being basely insulting the Czar of Russia in 1867, became, when in power, his most exalted adulterator.

Boulanger's impudence, therefore, did not kill him, but increased his reputation, and his horse won the day. Boulanger's greatest popularity came from his horse; and if indeed he restores the consulate, as it is his avowed intention to do, and following Bonaparte's example, becomes first Consul of France, he owes to that horse at least the same honors that Darius bested on the one who won him the Persian empire. Boulanger is a graceful rider, and his horse is a thoroughbred. When he attended military reviews and parades, both horse and rider won the admiration of the lookers on, and the newspapers spoke about the graceful rider. Rival journalistic enterprise immediately published sketches of Boulanger and his horse, with their full history, and for the history of the latter it is needless to say that unlimited scope was given to the reporter's imagination. Illustrations of Boulanger were seen everywhere, in the store shops, in the stationery stores, and the more dissatisfied Parliament was with Boulanger the more popular he became with the people at large, who took that way to manifest their feelings of disgust and opposition to the course of affairs.

What are Boulanger's prospects? He may overthrow the present Cabinet, and he may even be elected President, if at the next general election no party secures a working majority. They may then combine for electing him, but only to wear him out, just as Gambetta was worn out and innumerable others have been and their usefulness impaired. Boulangism came from a horse and a song, and will finish in a song, as, according to Boulanger, everything in France commences and ends by a song.

RECLAIMING ARID LANDS.

Final arrangements for the survey of arid lands, looking toward their irrigation and utility, for which congress at its last session appropriated \$250,000, have been completed. The numerous conferences between Secretary Noble and Major J. W. Powell, superintendent of the geological survey, has resulted in the decision that Major Powell shall accompany the expedition, assisted by the following named gentlemen: State Engineer W. H. Hall, of California, will have charge of the work in California and the Pacific Coast west of the Sierras; in addition to this duty, he and Colonel E. B. Nettleton will be the supervising and consulting engineers on the expedition. Lyman Bridges will have charge of the work in Nevada and California west of the mountain crest, and Utah and the intermountain basin. Arthur P. Footo will have charge of Idaho, Herbert M. Wilson of Montana, Alexander O. Brodie of the Rio Grande district of El Paso, and Edward S. Nettleton of Colorado and the territory east of the Rocky mountains.

It is noticeable that no provision is made for Oregon in the assignment of districts. The fact is it is well known the country over that there are no arid lands in Oregon to reclaim. Every acre in the state is rich and productive.

DEADLY WORK

Of a Terrific Tornado on the Atlantic Coast.

MANY LIVES WERE LOST.

One of the Boats of the Eastern Climate
—In the Hurricane's Path—The Work of Destruction.

MARTINSBURG, (Va.) May 31.—A tornado struck a section of this country about ten miles east of here this afternoon, and after demolishing a vast amount of property passed down the Potomac river, uprooting trees, overturning stalls and playing havoc generally with small buildings near the banks of the stream. The storm traveled over an area of ten miles and then passed out to sea. Very few trees were left standing on the banks. Those that were left were twisted out of shape. The house of Martin Crown, which stood directly in the tornado's path, was lifted from its foundation. Two women who were in a little frame kitchen had their feet badly hurt and were otherwise injured. A barn in which George Vogle and J. Powell had taken refuge, was blown down and both men killed. Damage to crops is fearful.

DRUNK BY A CORPSE.

A Revolting Incident of Tenement Life.
NEW YORK, May 31.—One of the most revolting cases that ever came to the notice of the police is that of Bridget Hanrahan, who was found dead in her bed in a tenement house at 210 East Sixtieth street this afternoon. She had apparently been dead a week or ten days, while her son John, a young man 18 years old, had occupied the same room with the corpse in a drunken condition ever since his mother's death.

ELEVATORS FOR CANALS.

A New Invention Which Will Do Away With Locks.

A canal has just been constructed in Belgium in which, instead of locks, the boats are hoisted by elevators from one level to another. The canal extends from the coal region in the interior of Belgium to Brussels, crossing several other canals at the same grade, so that Belgian canal can be navigated directly by boats to Paris, as well as to all the principal towns in Belgium and Holland. As the line passes over a rather hilly country, various ascents and descents must be made, and to save the long delays incidental to passing locks, the change of grade is made by means of hydraulic elevators.

The boats, which measure about seventy tons, are towed at the low level into a immense tank with gates which is submerged in the canal. The gates are then closed and the tank, which rests on the pistons of a huge hydraulic elevator, is raised to the upper level, when connection is made with the next section of the canal by means of double gates, and the boat proceeds on its way.

The lift of the elevator No. 1, at Houdeng Goegnies, which is carefully described and illustrated in Le Genie Civil, is about fifty feet. The hydraulic apparatus is calculated to raise a weight of 1000.48 metric tons, or considerably more than the same number of our tons, and power is obtained by means of steam pumps, which force water from the canal into pressure tanks. The apparatus is double, so that two boats can be handled at once, and the ascent and descent, including all the operations of opening and shutting the gates and receiving and discharging the boats, occupies fifteen minutes. The cost of the apparatus, exclusive of earthwork and masonry, patents, engineering and purchase of land, was about \$175,000.
