GENERAL NEWS.

Chinese Merchants Not Allowed
to Land in San Francisco.

THREE SMUGGLERS ARRESTED.

News To Oughtout the Pacific Coast—
Warmer Weather Predicted The
Cronin Case.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—On the
arrival of the steamer Arcturion from
China yesterday Deputy Surveyor
Fogarty and his assistants made a
minute examination of the fifteen
Chinese destined for this city and
their credentials. They were all
handsomely dressed and all had
merchant's certificates with photo-
graphs attached excepting two who
had "Red Laborers" certificates,
issued at Astoria, Oregon, Novem-
ber 5, 1886. On these certificates
bearers were described as "mer-
chants." These two the deputy
surveyor denied landing pending
further investigation. The custom
house interpreter Richards exam-
ined the Chinese with the red cer-
tificates. To him they stated that
they had been merchants at Port-
land for three years. They stated
that when they left the surveyor of
customs at Portland had no white
merchant's certificates so they
were compelled to take "red" cer-
tificates with the word "merchants"
inserted. Although crestfallen at
being refused landing, they thought
that on investigation everything
would be found all right.

JAPANESE SMUGGLERS.
They Were Caught Flying Their
Trade in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—Three
Japanese members of the crew of
the steamer City of Peking left the
vessel last Friday evening to take
in the town. One of the night in-
spectors at the mail dock thought
it best to make a search to see if
the men had any contraband goods.
Wrapped in layers around their
arms and bodies were several
dozen silk handkerchiefs. A
search was made in the Japanese
quarters on the steamer and over
two dozen of the finest silk hand-
kerchiefs were found, valued at
over \$200. The offenders were
turned to the United States au-
thorities.

The Cronin Case.
CHICAGO, June 3.—Nothing of
importance developed to-day in
connection with the Cronin case.
The coroner's jury will begin the
inquest to-morrow.

THE GREAT FLOOD

The Latest Reports Are Still
More Appalling.

THE DEAD NUMBER 15,000.

A Calamity the Results of Which Will Not
Be Effaced in Years—The Govern-
ment Tenders Aid.

Special to the HERALD.
HARRISBURG, Penn., June 3.—
Adjutant-General Hastings has
telegraphed the following to the
manager of the telegraph company
in this city: Inform Governor
Beaver this morning that reports
given number the lost at Johns-
town between 12,000 and 15,000.
The greatest disorder prevails.
The place is infected with thieves
and vandals, who are robbing the
dead and appropriating everything
they can lay their hands on. These
people are eating up the provisions
in the shape of food supplies sent
here for the flood sufferers.
Two of these robbers were
lynched last evening by indignant
citizens and three others were
killed.

PROTECTED BY TROOPS.
Adjutant-General Hastings and
Major Sanger have assumed entire
charge of Johnstown and vicinity,
and strict discipline will be en-
forced from now on as much as
possible. General Hastings's head-
quarters are at the Pennsylvania
railroad depot. The supply depot
is established at this point, and
many needy people are being re-
lieved. Bodies that are dug out,
lie in the station until coffins can
be obtained. They are buried un-
identified on Prospect Hill.

A squad of battery under the
command of Lieutenant Brown,
the foreman of the whole battery,
arrived at the improvised telegraph
office at 6:30 o'clock. He went at
once to Adjutant-General Hastings
and arranged for proper protection.

AID FOR THE SUFFERERS.
Government and private aid has
been tendered to the sufferers, and
all are being well cared for. The
work of collecting and identifying
the dead, and the scenes are sick-
ening and horrible. Surgeons are
doing all in their power for the
wounded sufferers.
The devastation has been wide-
spread, and aside from the ap-
alling loss of life it will be the
work of years to restore the des-
tated country to its original con-
dition.

This calamity is one that must
go down in the history of the
world as the most terrible since
the days of old when Pompeii and
other cities were overthrown by
volcanoes and their thousands of
inhabitants killed.
