EAST OF THE ROCKIES

Wool Growers Urge an Extra Session of Congress.

THE SUNDAY POSTAL SERVICE.

The Latest Estimates Place the Number of the Death Roll of the Johnstown Disaster at 12,000 to 15,000.

The Herald's Special Despatches. WASHINGTON, June 5.—The president read letters from the committee of the national wool growers' association of the United States, dated at Columbus, Ohio, urging the necessity for an extra session of congress to be held on the earliest practicable day, for the purpose of enacting the necessary legislation in regard to wool growing and other industries of the country.

Postmaster General Wanamaker has sent a circular letter to the postoffices of 100 of the largest cities throughout the country with a view of ascertaining the relative importance of mails on Sunday as compared with the same on any other days of the week, in order to reduce the work on that day if it shall be found practicable. The information asked for covers the sale of stamps and wrappers, the number of callers, mails dispatched and received, number of letters, carrier collections, with the amount of matter collected and the number of employes on duty each Sunday compared with the week days during the same time.

The Prize Ring.

BENICIA, Cal., June 5.—The fight between Jim Corbett and Joe Choynski, which was interrupted by the sheriff last week, was resumed this morning on a barge off Dillon's Point, near Benicia, in the presence of about 200 spectators. Corbett wore two-ounce gloves, but Choynski's had been lost, and with Corbett's consent, he wore skin tight driving gloves, with the understanding that Corbett could do the same when he chose.

Old World Affairs.

BUDAPEST, June 5.—The leading members of the liberal party gave a banquet Monday night to Tiza, Hungarian prime minister. Tiza, in a speech, declared that those who were trying under a cloak of radicalism, to import a reactionary element into the government and intended ultimately to join the reactionary party and overthrow the existing state of affairs, would not succeed as long as the liberal party existed.

The Cronin Case.

CHICAGO, June 5.—The Cronin inquest was continued today. Patrick McGraw, a friend of Cronin, testified that Cronin told him that he expected to be killed for the part he performed in the investigation at Buffalo, and for the charges that Sullivan, while a member of the executive board of the Clan-Na-Gael, misappropriated a large amount of the society's funds and sent men to their death and to prisons to hide such misappropriations.

In France.

PARIS, June 5.—In a debate in the chamber of deputies yesterday on the conversion of the Egyptian debt Spullier, minister of foreign affairs, said: "Conversion, in order to be legal, must be submitted to the powers for their assent. The French government," he said, "considers that so important an act justifies an examination of the question of the evacuation of Egypt. Our conduct may differ according as we are treating with Egypt controlled by British forces or completely dependent."

The Latest from Johnstown.

JOHNSTOWN, June 5.—The best estimate this morning on the loss of life, based on the registry of the living and unofficial poll, is from 12,000 to 15,000.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

An American Steamer Fired at by a Haytian Steamer.

New York, June 5.—The steamer Caroline Miller arrived from St. Marc, Hayti, yesterday. She showed no signs of having been made a target, yet Captain Fred Miller, commander, asserted that such was the case. The Miller left Cape Haytien for a voyage to St. Marc on May 15th. When she had steamed some distance out to sea a steamer was seen in the distance. It was the Haytian iron-clad ram, Toussaint l'Ouverture. The ram was evidently trying to overhail her. The Miller's engineer was ordered to put on more steam and the vessel's speed soon increased perceptibly.

No sooner was this observed on the Toussaint that a shot came whistling over the water falling a few feet from the Miller's bow. Another shot followed, while the Toussaint increased her speed. Shots now began to fly thick and fast around the Miller, thought, strange to say, none of them struck her. Captain Miller ordered the American flag raised and the Stars and Stripes were unfurled at the Miller's peak. Still the firing continued. The Miller, however, was running fully eleven knots and gradually drew out of range of the guns. The Toussaint finally gave up the chase and the Miller ran into St. Marc on the 16th, unharmed. The firing continued for two hours.

Why Illinoisans Are Called Suckers

The first settlements of Illinois were made in the southern portion of the State. The land was new and rich, and yielded abundantly with but little cultivation. But there were no means of transportation, or markets, and money was scarce and hard to get, an old-fashioned picayune looking as big as the bottom of a half-bushel, and was carefully hoarded to meet some contingency. As a result of this state of things all the surplus population regularly every spring took up their line of march to the Galena lead mines, where they worked during the summer, and as regularly every fall, took up their line of march for their homes in the southern part of the State. This being the habit of that numerous family of fish called suckers, which then, as now, ascended the streams in the spring and descended in the fall, the bands of Illinois settlers fluctuating between their homes and the mines soon became known as suckers, and later on the name was generally applied, and Illinois became known as the Sucker State, and her people as suckers.

FOR AMERICANS.

Europe Must Not Dominate the Panama Canal.

COLOMBIA'S BIG BROTHER.

She Looks Upon the United States With Confidence and Respect—A Few Facts.

The Porvenir of Carthage, the Atlantic seaport of the republic of Colombia, prints an article which is supposed to have been written, if not by the President of the Colombian republic himself, then by somebody representing his views, with other articles urging Colombians to look to the completion of the Panama Canal, the De Lesseps concession for which will be forfeited in two years. An inspired article in the Porvenir says: "Since the news which was current some months ago was confirmed respecting the bankruptcy of the Panama Canal Company, we have thought of seriously alluding to the subject—not with the object of deploring it as a great misfortune and one which falls heaviest on our country, and which has happened owing to the anarchy and mismanagement which have been noticeable in the canal; but rather for the purpose of exciting the patriotism of those who lead the Regeneration party, and of doing so by the employment of truthful language, and in such a direction that ideas shall be ready for action when the failure of the contract made with M. De Lesseps shall be officially announced, and that thus it shall be possible to carry the work to a conclusion by means of a wiser administration, to be made with the person or government offering the best guarantee that the new work will be executed with that judgment and honor which are demanded by the great social and pecuniary interests involved in a work of this nature.

"It is time that we of the Southern nations, and who, relatively speaking, are feeble, should rely on no other assistance for the spread of our industries and to restrain the tendencies of the many of the European governments' sake that which can be given by our brothers of the north, since they are as interested as we are in the other parts of the two continents that only American interests should prevail throughout the breadth and length of the land, and that for these reasons the aspirations of the whole family should tend to affirm our rights and institutions by means of unity of action.

"There will be few who will not attach to this principle the importance it demands, since without doubt it will afford us the inestimable advantage of insuring that our form of government, which cost so much blood during our great war, will be respected as it should be by those who have converted colonization into a leading element of their well-being.

"We find the fact still evident as to the noble conduct of the Government of the United States towards Colombia during the war of 1855, and which was shown by the United States having dispatched upward of 1000 men to restrain the bandits who had seized Colon, and that these men were withdrawn the moment the work had been accomplished which had been imposed on them by friendship, and without having executed, during their permanence in Colombia territory, the slightest act of having manifested the most insignificant tendency to depress our nationality.

"It is our opinion that the Panama Canal will be opened, owing to the necessity felt by the commercial world for that commodious and cheap route, but in truth we must say that no other country save that of North America can carry to a happy conclusion that country possesses the requisites which are necessary to finish it, and which are: An abundance of money, fitting machinery, which cannot be found in other countries, and habits of work united to a reasonable economy in expenditures.

The Porvenir recalls that it said editorially in 1884, after quoting the existing treaty between the United States and that country: "With or without the treaty the Government of the United States can militarily occupy the isthmus. Has Great Britain not so done, and is it not so doing in Egypt, without the slightest trace of right derived from any prior agreement? Who has impeded this? Who has protested against it?

"There is not one country in all Europe which would dare to declare war against the United States.

"No fear need be felt of violent aggression by the United States, which fully understood that Washington and Bolivar were men of similar character, and that it is the duty of the North American people to exercise power by moral union and tuition, and never by crude egotism, in those regions which are studiously constructing a similar system of government."
