SCENES AT SEATTLE.

The Proud City Rising from Her Ashes.

PREPARATIONS FOR BUILDING.

The Leases Now Put Up About Fifteen Million Dollars—Notes from the Stricken City.

SEATTLE, June 10.—Four days have now elapsed since the disastrous fire which swept away the business portion of this city, and with it fifteen millions of dollars, and with it fifteen million people in one day of activity. On every side tents and improvised shelters under which the remnants of fine stores are being arranged for business.

Everything has now quieted down, and everybody is busy getting ready to start in business in temporary quarters.

The committee appointed has reported the burnt district, and will submit their report to the meeting of the city council and citizens tomorrow. The new platting provides for running Front and Second streets out to the water's edge, and Commercial to a junction with Front street. The new width of the streets is to be ninety feet, with thirty four foot alleys. This platting meets with the approval of all property owners.

The same military patrol is being kept up and will be enforced for several days. No trouble of any kind in the city has been reported, and everything so far has been quiet. Large crowds of people from the Sound towns have been viewing the ruins to-day.

The fire was nearly burned out, with the exception of half a dozen places, where the smoldering heaps are still blazing brightly.

Most of the day has been spent in recovering sites from the ruins and opening them. The site of Tokias, Singerman & Co. and its contents were found to be totally destroyed.

Carpenters and workmen have been busy all day in putting up temporary tents for business houses along Second street. Lawns and gardens are turned into places of business, and by the end of the week the major portion of Second street ruins will be recovered with tents and business places.

The same great confidence and cheerfulness is everywhere manifested, and the business men speak heartily of the future. Excavations have already been commenced for new brick buildings, and as soon as the new plat of the business streets is adopted, the erection of buildings will be commenced at once.

The work of blowing down walls standing is going on slowly to-night, but will be finished to-morrow evening. Large gangs of men will be put to work in the morning, clearing up the ruins, and this will give work to all men who are now wandering about the city in idleness.

The relief committees have provided for all who need assistance, and to-day led a large number. The number is decreasing some, however, and there is no longer any need for suffering. Telegrams containing money and offers of assistance still continue to pour in. The worst is over now, and with what is offered and now on hand, it is thought the wants will be supplied.

Mayor Moran has issued a proclamation to all citizens having goods in their possession belonging to unknown owners to return the same to the committee at the armory. Failing to do so by to-morrow evening will be treated as stealing, and the offenders promptly punished.

The front street road announces that it will commence running again on Tuesday.

The insurance adjusters are rapidly accomplishing the adjustment of losses and are paying insurance. The remarkable confidence of the heaviest losers for the future has been contagious, and there is very little discouragement expressed in the city.

The Oregon Improvement Company has commenced the work of repairing their docks and coal bunkers, and have men and pile-drivers now at work upon them. They expect to be ready for business again inside of three weeks. The estimated loss remains the same as reported, \$15,000,000.

WEATHER BULLETIN NO. 14.

Another Week of Very Fair Conditions to Growing Crops.

The following crop weather bulletin is compiled from reports received from the different counties named, by B. S. Paque, who is in charge of the central office of the Oregon state weather bureau at Portland, Or., for the week ending June 8:

The temperature has been above the average, in all sections, from 5 to 12 degrees.

The rainfall has been below the average, not any falling in the state during the past week. The sunshine has been above the average, few clouds being at all visible.

The conditions of the wheat crop has not been favorable, but to fruit and berries it has been very favorable.

The week was characterized by continued w. m. clouds, weather Sunday, June 2, being unusually warm, the thermometer marking in the nineties in most parts of the state, except along the coast.

In Southern Oregon no rain has fallen since May 19. In the Willamette valley none has fallen since May 21 except a few showers on May 28. In Eastern Oregon, in sections, rain fell copiously the last week of May. This shows a lack of moisture at the proper time.

Gentle showers during the first two weeks of June are necessary for the proper growth and maturity of the grain crop. Reports from all sections indicate a desire for more rain to insure the wheat crop.

The yield of wheat, notwithstanding the present dry spell, will be much above the average, while rain would insure a more bountiful yield.

The wheat has headed out well, and harvesting will be in full way in the course of the next two weeks. At Bandon, Coos county, one field of rye was cut for hay which yielded eight tons to the acre. In Weston, Umatilla county, one "stoo" of fall wheat proved to have 160 stalks in it, measuring 48 inches in length. Through Morrow county the orchards, garden and grain fields are thriving and promising. Unusual yields of crops of all kinds will be harvested in this region, as well as in other parts of the state. The strawberry and cherry crops continue to yield enormously. Wild blackberries are ripe in Polk county; wild and tame raspberries are becoming very plentiful in the markets. In Jackson county grapevines are in bloom with indication for a large yield. Hops are very promising in the Willamette valley.

Fruit culture has increased in interest through Union county, and the orchards are very promising. Notwithstanding the heavy showers through Umatilla county last week, a few good showers are again needed to continue the excellent prospects for the grain yield. Strong hot winds have prevailed through Baker county during the week.

Albany, Linn Co.—In consequence of the great amount of sunshine and an entire absence of rain the fall grain in this neighborhood is turning prematurely yellow in the stalk. Rain is wanted to fill the heads. Fruit is doing finely.

Another report from Linn county states that the wheat crop will be a little short; the meadows are not filling out satisfactorily.

Lebanon, Linn Co.—Crops of all kinds look well. Farmers are falling in progress.
