A PROPER RECOGNITION.

Those who remember the valuable services rendered by King Mataafa of the Samoan islands during the recent hurricane there, and few will forget the heroic action of this heathen king and his natives, who used every exertion, not even sparing danger to their lives and actual death, in their efforts to save life and property, will be pleased to know that in recognition of these valuable services rendered by King Mataafa in saving life and property on the occasion of the hurricane in Samoa, the Navy Department has decided upon sending him a whaleboat of the latest improved model. It will be clinker built, of the finest material and fittings. It will be built at the navy yard at Mare Island, and when completed will be sent to King Mataafa, accompanied by an autograph letter from President Harrison, testifying in the highest possible manner to the bravery exhibited by Mataafa and his men in rescuing so many American sailors. The boat will be accompanied to Apia by a committee of the surviving officers. It is expected that the party will leave California about the middle of August.

The disposition of the wrecks of the Vandala and Trenton destroyed at Apia has been under consideration by the Navy Department. Admiral Kimberly has recommended that the ships be abandoned, and it is likely that they will be.

The delay in the transmission from Washington of the assent to the Samoan treaty originated the dispatches tell us, in rumors that Blaine desired a revision of several points. Inquiries at the Foreign office and the English Embassy elicited the information that nothing occurred that is likely to retard the exchange of signatures or requiring a further reference. Blaine has been in communication with Phelps regarding the verbal amendments to the protocols, which were submitted to Count Herbert and Sir Edward Malet, and accepted without comment. Official irritation over Blaine's cautious scrutiny of the protocols is abating, with the growing recognition of the value America places upon the final and decisive settlement of the Samoan question. The impatience of the Foreign office to close the matter has not hastened the action of Lord Salisbury any more than that it has that of Blaine. The English commissioners do not attach the slightest importance to the dilatory procedure of their Foreign office. As soon as the Washington government cables "sign" Lord Salisbury's assent will be ready. From the nature of the latest communications to the American commission it is expected that the conference will meet on Wednesday for the last time. Blaine has asked concerning the arrangements for the return of Malietoa. It is settled that the electoral decision of the natives will be taken some time after Malietoa is reinstated.

THE JOHNSTON DISASTER.

It takes some great misfortune usually to make the world realize that they are akin. All over the south now funds are being raised for the Johnstown sufferers. It will be remembered that when the yellow fever raged in the South, and when Charleston was shaken to pieces by an earthquake, the North and the whole country responded to the appeal. Now the South is coming to the aid of the stricken people of Pennsylvania. It is such things that teach us that we are one people with common sympathies and feelings. Concerning the flood itself it now appears that the disaster was largely due to official negligence. The dam was examined some time ago and officially declared to be unsafe. Nevertheless, no steps were taken to draw the water off or to compel the owners to make the dam safe. Having declared the dam to be dangerous, official

zeal quietly let the matter drop. The people endangered by it could do as they pleased about staying or going away out of danger, and the owners of the dam could repair it or let it break, just as it suited them. The disaster came and, of course, those who are responsible by reason of criminal negligence are very sorry. It could all have been averted, however, had either the officials or the owners of the dam done their duty. This kind of criminal neglect is too common in this country, and the Conemaugh horror will not have occurred entirely in vain if it shall cause a more rigid discharge of public and private duty.

This state weather bureau, through their weekly crop bulletin a few weeks ago told us that on account of a steady rain fall grain was going too much to straw and would not make a full crop. Now comes the cheerful intelligence that the recent few weeks of warm weather is causing fall grain to turn prematurely yellow in the stalk, and is not filling well. The facts are that the prospects were never better for an abundant crop throughout Linn county.
