

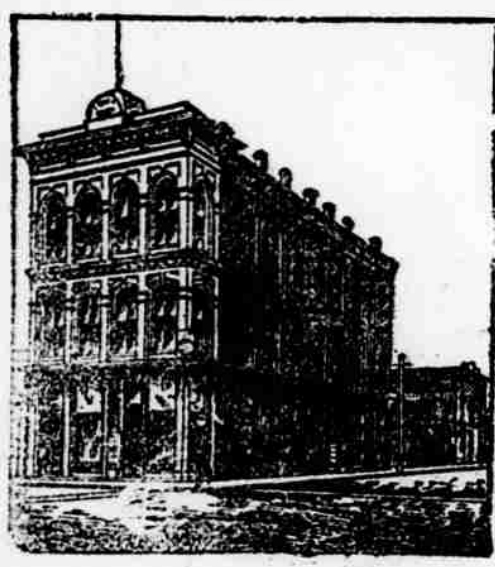

## NOT QUITE SO IBAD.

The Latest Report From the Johnstown Disaster.

## REVISED ESTIMATE OF DEATH

Less Than Five Thousand Dead—An Epidemic Not Feared Relief Work Going Steadily On.

JOHNSTOWN, June 11.—To day is the thirteenth since the disaster in the Conemaugh valley occurred, and the extent of the fatality can be approximately when it is known that bodies are still being found wherever men are at work. To day one of the Morgue directors was met and asked "the question. "How many bodies were recovered to-day?" "Oh, not very many," he replied. "There were fifty eight all together." The loss of life has been so great that fifty bodies found in one day, even if that were but thirteenth, was considered a light showing. The remains that are now being removed from the drift are far advanced in decomposition, and the physicians in charge are advocating their cremation as fast as found, as it is almost impossible to hold them safely. The work of clearing away the debris is progressing very encouragingly. The men were not required to proceed to day, out nine-tenths of them volunteered to continue, and, as a result, a large amount was made in the drift in the central portion of the city. Main street, which was the principal thoroughfare, and one vast blockade is now about cleared. Work on the wreckage above the stone bridge is going on rather slowly. The force is small and the difficulties great. Arthur Kerk, who has used dynamite blasts to separate the drifts, suspended operations to-day. A considerable force continued to use pike poles and cleared a few feet more. Ex Internal Revenue Collector Digger of the Western Pennsylvania district said to-day to an Associated Press reporter that if he were given permission he could bring in 200 practical cart-hoos men from the Clearfield district and clear the channel above the bridge in twenty days. The trouble with those at work here says an experienced. He mentioned the matter to Adjutant-General Hastings, but did not meet with very much encouragement.

The health of the valley is an usually good, notwithstanding the reports of threatened epidemics. The following bulletin, issued by the State Board of Health, speaks for itself, as follows: "The general condition of health in Johnstown and vicinity is excellent. No epidemic disease of any kind prevails, nor is it expected that any will arise. The whole region has been divided into districts and each placed under a competent sanitarian. The State Board of Health is prepared to meet all emergencies as they arise. The air is wholesome and the water generally pure. If the good people of the devastated district will go on as they have done for the past week in their efforts to clear up the wreckage, good health will certainly be maintained."

Dr. Groff, who signs the bulletin, says that the valley has been swept so clean by the great floods that the river water is purer than before the disaster. There is a difference in the contaminating power of decomposing organic matter and that from the bodies of the dead. The bodies in the river are generally covered by from one to six feet of mud and sand. This earthy matter absorbs all effluvia and acts as the best of disinfectants. There is no present danger to the water supply of Pittsburgh. At Johnstown the only present danger is from people being frightened into sickness by sensational reports. Dr. John Miller and Dr. F. M. Strouse are in charge of the Red Cross Corps, which is located in the very midst of the ruins. The flag of the Red Cross on a white field of tents waving upon the main tent is a welcome sign of refuge to many workmen who are suddenly stricken while at work on the ruins.

Several cases of vandalism and robbery were reported to-day. Last night a number of cars containing supplies were broken into and the contents carried off. What the thieves could not steal they tramped and ruined. The Masonic relief car was also entered and robbed. Twelve men were arrested for stealing to day, but were released on returning the goods. The military guards over in Cambria were kept busy last night arresting thieves.

The work of registering of the survivors of the flood is going steadily on. Up to this evening there were about 21,000 registered, and the list is still increasing. The number lost is placed now at 5000 by those who held that it would reach 10,000 a week ago. A conservative estimate is between 3500 and 4000. Up to date there have been 1500 bodies recovered.

The summary is as follows: Days taught, 60; days attendance, 2672; days absent, 265; times tardy, 10; pupils enrolled, 54; belonging, 49; daily average, 45; per cent. of attendance, 90.

The Military Reservation in Washington Territory.

## UMATILLA INDIAN AFFAIRS.

The Members Conting a Disturbance in Canada—The Ochie Case Before a Special Grand Jury.

The Herald's Special Dispatches. WASHINGTON, June 12.—By authority of an executive order the secretary of war has defined the military district of San Juan Island, Washington Territory, comprising part of sections five, seven and eight, making a tract of 640 acres.

In response to the secretary's instructions directing enforcement of the provisory order to remove intruders from the Umatilla Indian reservation in Oregon, the acting commissioner has transmitted a reply from the special agent at Umatilla Station that on May 23, last, a band of sheep and cattle led the reservation, much to the delight of the Indians. In all 40,000 sheep and 10,000 cattle were removed. The acting commissioner further reports that he instructed the new agent to adopt rigorous measures to prevent the return of any stragglers, and hereafter all trespassing cattle will be kept from the reservation.

## AT JOHNSTOWN.

A Gloomy State of Affairs—Sentinels on Guard.

JOHNSTOWN, (Pa.) June 12.—Johnstown and the surrounding towns are now under military rule. This morning General Hastings took charge and sentinels were placed on guard during all the working hours at the stations and the morgues.

A slight rain has been falling all morning and the city presents a most dismal appearance. Everything is confusion and turmoil. Little work is being done. General Hastings says he will have the men at work to-morrow. He thinks there will be very little left of the \$1,000,000 furnished by Pennsylvania by the time the work is done.

## BORNONS IN CANADA.

They Are Proving an Annoyance to the Dominion People.

WINNIPEG, June 12.—Papers are being circulated in Alberta Territory calling upon the dominion government to watch the Mormon colony founded near McLeod, by persons from Salt Lake City, and charging that they are practicing polygamy. It is feared that they will shortly control the elections. The government is being urged to sell them no more lands.

## The Cronin Case.

CHICAGO, June 12.—A special grand jury to deal with the Cronin case was impaneled this morning in Judge Shepard's court. In addressing the jury Judge Shepard said he expected a full, exhaustive and impartial investigation of the murder. The entire reserve of the country, he said, would be at the disposal of the jury, and witnesses who would not testify should be made to do so.

VIENNA, June 12.—The Tagblatt has information that a plot exists to dethrone young King Alexander and proclaim Prince Peter Carageorgiewitch as king.
