EAST OF THE ROCKIES
Appointments and Other News from Washington.

VOTING ON PROHIBITION.
A Widower Murders a Girl Who Rejects His Love 300 Mormon Converts Arrive at Castle Garden.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.
WASHINGTON, June 20.—Ex-Gov. Martrant, of Pennsylvania, has been appointed a member of the Oshrooke commission. This fills the commission.
The secretary of the navy has ordered an inquiry into the grounding of the steamer Constellation.
General A. C. Myers, late quartermaster general of the Confederate army, died this morning.

VOTING ON PROHIBITION.
Voting on the Question of Repealing the Law.

PROVIDENCE, June 20.—Rhode Island is to-day voting on the question of repealing the state prohibition law. A three-fifths vote is necessary, and the result is not at all certain. A huge vote is being polled. At 11 o'clock the vote stood in this city: For repeal, 352; against, 1317. The vote at 1 o'clock in this city stood: Appro, 5528; reject, 1718. News from other towns show majorities for approval. The returns from all over the state indicate that the amendment will be adopted by a good majority over the necessary three-fifths.

STRIKE AT JOHNSTOWN.

The Militia Ordered Out to Preserve Order.

JOHNSTOWN, (Pa.) June 20.—The strike among laboring men here is fairly on this morning. Not three men are at work. Dissatisfaction is spreading to other workmen. Overbearing bosses and short rations, for which they are made to pay liberally are the grievances. A company of the fifth regiment has been ordered out. While everything appears quiet on the surface there are fears that a riot will follow. A largely attended meeting of strikers were held this morning. A committee of striking Italians persuaded them not to leave the town until the trouble is settled. They were sidetracked and beset with strikers. All foreign workmen have quit work. Twenty-five bodies were recovered this morning. Among them was a mother and two children. The children were locked in their mother's arms.

MORE MORMON RECRUITS.

Over Three Hundred of Them Arrive at Castle Garden.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Three hundred and forty Mormon proselytes, under the guidance of Elders Ellis and Anderson landed at Castle Garden this morning. They go to Utah by way of Norfolk, Virginia.

DISASTROUS FLOODS.

Half a Million Dollars Worth of Crops Washed Away.

St. Louis, June 20.—Dispatches from South Mound, Kansas, state that the Neosho river is at flood height, and many thousands acres of wheat and other grain is destroyed. In Neosho county alone the damage to crops is estimated at over half a million dollars.

A FRIEND'S WORK.

He Murders a Girl Because She Rejects His Love.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 20.—This morning Alvin Park, a widower, aged 40 years, and a fisherman, murdered a girl named Lottie Field, aged 14, because she did not reciprocate his love. He shot her four times.

The Parnell Commission.

LONDON, June 20.—At a meeting of the Parnell commission to-day Thomas H. O'Connor, M. P., was examined. He stated that the turning point in the Agrarian struggle in Ireland was the rejection of the compensation for the improvement bill. Thereupon tenants were compelled to combine in accordance with Parnell's policy, which substitutes constitutional agitation for revolution and open for serious combinations. O'Connor denied that either he or the league sympathized with crime.

Damaging Evidence.
CHICAGO, June 20.—The books of the Chicago National Bank were called for by the Cronin grand jury to-day. An hour was spent in examining the accounts of Alexander Sullivan, and comparing dates of certain checks with the dates of Sullivan's operations while on the board. Evidence was given to show his intimacy with various suspects and to his frequently expressed animosity to Cronin.

Gold Exports.
NEW YORK, June 20.—Four million and a quarter of gold was taken for export to-day.

TWO WAR VESSELS.

Report on the Condition of the Yantic and Galena.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The board composed of Commanders Whiting, M. L. Menton, Naval Constructor Ira Latte and several other specialists, detailed to examine into the condition of the Yantic and Galena, and report as to what is necessary to fit them both for six months' service and also for a sea cruise, and also to give an estimate for the cost of a similar ship, recommends that they be reconstructed. The report with reference to the Galena discovered her to be in a rather serious general condition. The hull appears to be in a favorable state, but the deck is fairly out of gear, being in many places sprung and broken. The estimated cost for reconstruction, according to the recommendation, involves \$66,700. The estimated cost for a vessel of the same size and material is \$425,000. The board does not find the Yantic in a very bad state, some slight defectiveness in the small fittings being the only weakness. The cost of repairs is \$14,340, and the estimated cost for a vessel of similar size and material is \$205,000.

Criminal Libel.

NEW YORK, June 20.—O'Donovan Rossa and Wilbur H. Herdickson arrived at noon at the office of the United States circuit court, on complaint of Patrick Cassidy, charging them with criminal libel. The prisoners were locked up and bailed.

Yellow Fever.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Dr. R. W. H. Duncan, surgeon of the Pacific mail steamship Colon, from Aspinwall, seized with yellow fever, has been removed from Brooklyn to the quarantine steamer, and is very much worse.

The Cronin Case.

WINNIPEG, June 20.—Collins, the Chicago detective, arrived shortly after 1 o'clock to-day and is now with the chief of police and Burke, the suspected murderer. Collins has identified the man in custody here as Burke. Steps for his extradition will be taken at once.

Murderer Hanged.

MAYS LANDING, N. J., June 20.—Andy Grimes, colored, murderer of John Martin, mate of the schooner Annie Carl, at Atlanta City on Christmas day, was hanged at noon to-day.

Earthquake in California.

CHICO, June 20.—A slight earthquake shock was experienced here last evening about 10 o'clock. The vibrations were from east to west.

Three Men Drowned.

CHAMBERLYN BASIN, Ont., June 21.—Three men and a boy were fishing from a small boat this morning, when a heavy gale swamped them. Alex Ives, his son and Louis Howard were drowned.

Steamship Foundered.

LONDON, June 20.—The steamer St. Marc has foundered near Muros, Spain. The wreck was rescued.

King of Holland III.

THE HAGUE, June 20.—The king of Holland has had a serious relapse from his recent recovery.

THE NOBLE RED MEN.
They Are but Worthless Idlers Maintained by the Gov't.

THE INDIAN AS HE IS.
What It Costs to Keep Them—Millions of Acres of Land Occupied—Their Daily Life.

Omaha, Dec.
The Sioux Indians, as looked at from the Eastern view, are a race that is greatly abused by the government, but from the view taken by the Western people, who have had a chance to study their habits, the only good Indian is the dead one. At the Lower Brule agency there are about 1200 Indians supported in idleness by the government, costing annually \$150,000. The great reservation contains 24,000,000 acres of fine farming and grazing lands, an area nearly as large as the state of New York, and five times as great as Massachusetts, inhabited by about 26,000 Indians, or about as many people as live in two tenement blocks in New York city. These lands are not used at all by the Indians, as the government furnishes them with provisions, clothing, farm machinery (which they never use), cattle, horses and harness, and in fact almost everything. In the way of clothing the government furnishes fine woolen blankets, which cost about \$4.50 a piece. As soon as the noble red man gets his blanket he crosses the river to Chamberlain and sells it for from 75 cents to \$1. The same is also the fact with clothing, the most of the farmers dressing in waunkapoums, which is the Sioux for government goods.
Major Anderson, the agent at Crow Creek, is of the opinion that the Indians will never become civilized as long as the government supports them. He is decidedly in favor of the Indians taking their land in severalty and for the government to furnish each family with a complete farm outfit, then tell them they must support themselves, and he thinks that when they see that the government means business the Indian question will be settled.
The Indian buck scorns work and thinks that only the squaws are made to work. A pretty good illustration of this is told by one of the agency officials. I give it as it was told to me.
"Last winter, as I was on my way to Brule bottom, I ran across a team of ponies trying to pull a large lumber wagon up the hill, but it was too heavy for them, and the buck that was driving ordered his two squaws out to help the ponies, but still they could not make it. I asked him why he did not get out, and all the answer I received was a grunt. Finally, taking pity on the squaws, who were almost frozen, I added my muscle to that of the squaws and ponies, and we finally got the 'noble red man' and his wagon to the top of the hill."

BEHRING SEA.

Canada Wants a Settlement of Vexed Questions.

OTTAWA, June 17.—It is reported in official circles here that the Canadian government has impressed on the imperial authorities the urgent necessity of the early settlement of the Behring sea difficulty, and suggested that the British ambassador at Washington be instructed to learn from the government whether it is willing to agree to an appointment of an international commission to inquire fully into the whole question of the seal fisheries of Alaska. The government here is of the opinion that the question of the right of the United States to exclusive privileges in Behring sea could be satisfactorily gone into and decided upon such a commission and that the report of such a commission to the legislatures of both countries would be of incalculable value in tending toward a final settlement.
