Further Evidence in the Cronin Murder Case.

A FATA STABBING AFFRAY

A New Disease in Johnston—Strikers Killed and Wounded—Floods in France—Train Robbers Sentenced.

The Herald Special Dispatches.] CHICAGO, June 21.—The Cronin grand jury this morning heard the testimony of Mrs. Phibbin, an aunt of Martin Burke, the Winnipeg suspect. She scorned the idea that her nephew was a murderer, and described him as a weak, rickety-brained young man, who lacked courage to engage in a plot of such a character. She was unable to enlighten the jury as to Burke's movements a short time previous to the murder, as he had ceased living at her house.

RIOTOUS STRIKERS. The French Gendarmes Fire Into and Kill Several.

VIENNA, June 21.—The striking miners at Klade, Bohemia, engaged in a riot last night. Gendarmes fired on the rioters and killed two and wounded twelve. Further trouble is feared. Three battalions of troops have been sent to the scene.

The Yale Race.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 21.—The Yale University race will be pulled this evening at 6:30. The conditions now are favorable for a good race. From reliable sources it is learned that the Yale crew is not in the best of condition. Every Yale man talks discouragingly of the Yale-Harvard race. Interest in to-day's race centers wholly in the showing to be made by Yale.

More Trouble at Johnston.

JOHNSTOWN, June 21.—A species of lives has broken out among the people here. The ailment seems contagious. On account of the hot weather to day the suffering is intense. Five bodies were picked up near the bridge this morning, and 17 to noon to-day thirteen bodies were found.

Mails to Frisco.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 21.—The New South Wales government has decided to continue for a year from next November the contract for carrying mails between this port and San Francisco. In the time involved before the contract expires the government will consider what is the best route to use in transporting mails to the American continent.

Fatal Stabbing Affray.

MURFRES, Cal., June 21.—Thomas Dunster was fatally stabbed by George Marks last night on the Stanislaus river near Vallecito. Marks claims that the stabbing was done in self defense and has surrendered himself.

Boulogne Again.

PARIS, June 21.—The senate commission, which has been inquiring into the charges against Boulanger, has finished its work and forwarded all the documents to the public prosecutor.

Floods in France.

PARIS, June 21.—The rivers have overflowed their banks and partially submerged the town of Barledun and surrounding country. Many houses are destroyed and crops and vineyards ruined.

Train Robbers Sentenced.

PRESOTT, Ariz., June 21.—Chief Justice Wright yesterday sentenced Dan Harwick, William Stiren and James Halford, the Canted Diablo train robbers, to twenty-five years each in the penitentiary.

SONS OF AMERICA.

Plain Language from the President's Address.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The thirtieth annual national camp of the Patriotic Order of Sons of America began its sessions this morning. President Smith's annual address dwelt upon the necessity of committing to Americans the care and preservation of American principles and institutions. The control of the public schools should be a matter of deepest concern. The naturalization laws be denounced as a delusion, a snare and a fraud. By means of them in seventeen states and four territories, he asserted, it is possible to entirely overthrow a congressional act against alien landholders in this country.

The following sentiments upon subjects now foremost in the public mind were loudly applauded: "A few more Haymarket riots and Cronin murders, instigated by organized bodies of foreigners who have been permitted to become citizens of this free America, and who have shown their gratitude by sending messengers loaded with dynamite back to their native country for the purpose of destroying innocent people, and who have foully murdered their members when they failed to carry out their heinous plans, and there will not be in our Western country lamp posts or telegraph poles enough to hang the miscreants. I ask you, is there room in this country for societies like the Clan-na-Gael that are not in harmony with and are injurious to American institutions; that are dangerous to American order, disloyal to the American government, destructive to American principles; repugnant to American ideas and disgusting to all Americans who have any sense of justice, any regard for consistency and any respect for the sanctity of human life?"

"Have we room for societies whose officers contract with men to commit wholesale murder and then betray their tools that they themselves may have more money to spend for their own personal benefits? One-third of our entire population is of foreign birth or parentage. Alien flags and foreign emblems float from our public buildings, emblazon our streets and head processions of people. We are cursed with all kinds of foreign non-American issues. Vast un-American organizations are held together by issues of perpetuating foreign sentiments and corrupting the ideals of our fathers. Anarchy and destruction of all law are openly advocated. The right to enforce the discipline and principle of some of these orders is claimed by secret convales, even to the extent of taking human lives."

CHEAT AMERICAN MEAT.

A Syndicate That Will Give It to the English.

NEW YORK, June 18.—An amalgamation of the cattle and fresh meat interest of T. C. and Joseph Eastman, of this city, and John Ball & Sons, Limited, of London; Glasgow, Liverpool and other towns in Great Britain has been practically effected and the stock of the concern known as the "Eastern Limited" has been subscribed for in the London market. The capitalization is \$4,500,000. Both firms are among the largest dealers in cattle from the West. It is believed that the new arrangement will result in still lower prices for American meat in the English market, and will thus increase its already great popularity there.

BURNED WHEAT FIELDS.

Ranchers Laying Claim to Damages from the Southern Pacific.

FRESNO, Cal., June 20.—The Southern Pacific railroad company will pay out several thousand dollars, providing it allows the claims for the losses of grain by fire along its main line and branches.

The ranchers claim that sparks from the engines set the grain fields on fire. One man has put in a bill for 140 acres of wheat at \$1 per cental will make quite a claim in itself. It is estimated that there have been over a thousand acres of grain along the railroad tracks in this county destroyed by fire.

One of the New York papers published, not long since, a picture of a cowboy in full regalia, with long hair and spurs, who is recollecting in horror from a huge bear. The ferocious animal is one of these stuffed bruisers that are used by furriers as business signs in front of their stores.

There is a popular impression that the average cowboy is not really as dangerous as he would like to have people believe. A little affair occurred at Staten Island when Forestpaugh was exhibiting a Wild West show in connection with his menagerie.

Captain Bogardus, the champion off-hand shot, and Suspender Jack were rival attractions, the latter being a cowboy of the most pronounced type. They got into a dispute, when Bogardus suddenly seized Suspender Jack by his luxuriant switch and slammed him down on the hard ground with considerable force, after which Bogardus jolted the cowboy's tummy with several kicks from a well-developed brogan.

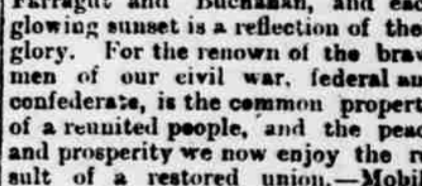
