EUROPEAN PEACE PROSPECTS

The prospects of an European
disruption and consequent war is
periodically the prevalent theme
in this country. The New York
Sun says that for some months, at
all events, the Paris Exposition
seems to have brought peace to
Europe. The Balkan peninsula
used to be the storm center of the
continent, but since the creation of
the triple alliance the Czar sees
that his hopes of southward
expansion depend upon the co-operation
of France. When, therefore,
the Paris shopkeepers dictate a
truce to the political factions in
their Chamber of Deputies, and
thus postpone the formation of a
stable and strong government in
their own country, they impose a
suspension of warlike purposes
throughout the European world.
How long the present peace will
last, however, is a question about
which even the most competent
observers differ. Prince Bismarck
said not long ago that Germans
must prepare themselves for war
in 1890. But he is accustomed to
cry, "Wolf!" when, as on this
occasion, he wants something
from the Reichstag. Besides,
since he uttered that note of warning
the situation in France has
somewhat changed. Then, no
doubt, he took for granted, as did
everybody else, that the Paris
Exposition would be closed before
the next election of the Chamber
of Deputies, which under the
French constitution must take
place on or before the last day of
October. But M. Constans, the
minister of the interior and the
ruling spirit of the Tirard cabinet,
remarking that the exposition has
temporarily at least extinguished
Boulangism, is said to have
decided to keep it open until after
the new Chamber is returned.
Then, on the plea that the
Boulangist electoral committees
were disturbing public order and
preventing the desired influx of foreign
visitors, he would everywhere
apply to them the summary process
of repression which has just
proved effectual in Angouleme. It
is by this time evident that M.
Constans is a formidable person, a
Jacobin of the Robespierre type,
who will not hesitate to employ in
the interest of the republic the
electroting methods of 1793 and
of the first and second empires. If
the programme believed to have
been formed by the Tirard cabinet
under the impulsion of its dominant
member can be carried out, and
the outcome of the next general
election shall be a republican
majority nearly as large as that
exhibited in the present Chamber
of Deputies, there seems to be no
reason why the peace of Europe
should not remain unbroken for a
year or two longer. For nothing
but the imminence of the appeal to
the people, the uncertainty about
the strength of Boulangism, and
the fear that the whole system of
parliamentary government may be
in jeopardy holds back the Radicals
and Opportunists from flying
at each others' throats. That was
shown by the reception which M.
Julius Ferry got the other day from
the followers of M. Clemenceau,
when he made the first speech
which he has ventured to deliver
in the Chamber since the Tonquin
fiasco broke up his cabinet. Should
the next cabinet be, like the present,
in disputable republican, we
shall witness the same strife of
factions and the same impossibility
of establishing a durable government.
A definite foreign policy
and a binding engagement with a
foreign power will therefore be no
less impracticable than they are
now. The triumph of Boulangism
seems a condition precedent to the
Franco-Russian league, without
which war in Europe is improbable.
When Bismarck predicted that
1890 would be a year of trouble, he
was either insane or he counted
on the downfall of the present
parliamentary regime in France.

the action of railroad companies
leading into Milwaukee, where the
annual national encampment is to
be held. A uniform rate of one
cent per mile was promised, but it
seems that the railroad companies
now decline to make the reduction
and the question of holding the
encampment elsewhere, is being
discussed. There will however
probably be no danger of any
change in the place of holding the
encampment, but the trouble over
the fare will undoubtedly reduce
the number attending the meeting
to the extent of more than making
up the difference in the amount
that would have been received by
the railroads had they made the
reduction promised, and the rail-
roads will be the losers.

According to the Lowell, Mass.,
Courier the striking mania in this
country is on the decline, whereat
thinking people will rejoice. It
says: During the first six months
of the present year there have been
about 200 strikes, involving about
75,000 men, against 400 strikes and
nearly 115,000 men in the same
period in 1888. In the first six
months of 1887, the strikes were
over 500 in number, and more than
2,000,000 men engaged in them.
