THE COW ORDINANCE.

Provisions of the Law Which is Now in Effect—Keep Up Your Cows.

The new cow law, which went into effect Monday, prohibits all cattle from running at large within the city limits of Albany. Its principal provisions are as follows: SECTION 1. No cow, bull, steer, heifer, calf or cattle of any kind, shall be allowed to run at large or to be herded in or upon any of the streets, alleys, parks or public places in the corporate limits of the city of Albany or upon any private premises therein, except those of the owners of such animals (unless when being driven through the city for shipment or other purposes), unless the owner or owners, or person having in charge such animal or animals, shall first obtain permission of the owner or agent or occupant of said private premises, and then such animals must be securely fastened with a rope or herded in such a manner as to prevent them from getting upon or feeding from the sidewalk.

Sec. 2. Any of the animals described in section 1) one of this ordinance found running at large within the corporate limits of the city of Albany shall be taken up by any police officer, or by any person, and delivered to a police officer and kept in a good and safe place, and such animal so taken up shall be provided with proper food and water while so confined. Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the marshal, after the taking up of any of the above named animals, to immediately post up printed or written notices in at least three public places in the city of Albany for five successive days, giving a correct description as may be of such animal, including natural or artificial marks thereon, and its color, size and probable age. Such notice shall also state the time, place and terms, when, where and upon which such animal will be sold, if not claimed within the time and upon the terms herein provided for by section 4.)

Sec. 4. If at any time previous to the sale provided for in section 3) three of this ordinance, the owner shall prove the animal or animals so taken up to be his property, he shall be entitled to the same upon paying to the marshal the charges thereon, which shall be \$1 for taking up each animal, 75 cents per day for keeping the same, and his legal fees for posting the notices required in section 3) of this ordinance. The remainder of the ordinance relates to the manner of conducting the sale of bovines thus taken up.

STATE DISPATCHES.

A Woman and Children Drowned at Eugene While Feeding the Willamette River.

SPECIAL TO THE HERALD. EUGENE CITY, July 1.—Late last evening M. S. Hubble, a farmer wife and two children, attempted to ford the Willamette near here and were swept into deep water and the wagon overturned. The woman and children were drowned. The bodies were not recovered.

SUPREME COURT ADJOURNED.

SALEM, July 1.—The supreme court to-day adjourned until September 3, after disposing of the following cases: The Portland Lumbering and Manufacturing Company, app., vs. the city of East Portland, resp., appeal from Multnomah county; judgment of the lower court reversed and the cause remanded for further proceedings. Opinion by Strahan, J. Lord, J., wrote an opinion concurring. Petition for rehearing in the railroad commission case, denied. R. McDonald, app., vs. The American Mortgage Company of Portland, resp., appeal from Multnomah county; judgment of the lower court modified. Opinion by Thayer, C. J., Lord, J., concurred, except he thought the allowance of attorney fees reasonable and ought not to be disallowed.

Lowest daily range of thermometer on the 4 and 25, 59. Mean temperature at 7 a. m., 61.4. Mean temperature at 2 p. m., 80.2. Mean temperature at 9 p. m., 60.9. Prevailing direction of wind, north. Max. velocity or force, 4. Total rainfall or melted snow, 0.55. Depth of snow at end of month, 0. No. of days on which .01 or more rain fell, 3. No. of days of cloudiness average 8 scale of 10, 4. Of 60 observations 54 were clear, 11 cloudy, 7 fair, 0 foggy, 5 rain, 6 hazy, 4 overcast, 0 smoky. Light frost on the mornings of 0. Temperature plus 4.14 on average of 11 years. Rainfall, minus 0.014 on average of 11 years.

A Forged Check.

One R. J. Kippel presented a check for \$25 signed with the name of Ans. Marshall at the First National Bank Saturday. It was at once thought to be forged, and the cashier, Mr. Langdon, refused its payment. Kippel, as he called himself, then offered it for sale at Conrad Meyer's but it was also refused. He afterwards purchased \$25 worth of goods of Otto Sallinger and gave the check after endorsing it in payment. Mr. Marshall declared the check a forgery. The forger has made his escape. A young man by that name had been employed by Mr. Marshall in his livery stable, but he was considered straightforward and honest, and it is thought that the forger merely adopted his name.

Lots at a Bargain.

A plot of the town of Gatesville, a new and thriving town on the eastward line of the Oregon Pacific is on file at the office of Curran & Monteith in this city. This town is situated near the Santiam mines which are now being developed, and is destined to become a thriving trading town. Lots have been placed upon the market at the exceedingly low price of \$12 to \$40. Money invested in these lots now will bring a big return in a very short time. The Military Ball.

Owing to the large attendance expected at the grand ball to be given by F. Co. the evening of July 4th, it has been found necessary to hold it in the armory of the company, instead of the opera house, it being much larger and better suited for the accommodation of the dancers. The armory will be decorated and placed in line order. Grand march at 9:30 o'clock. This will in no wise change the arrangements for the benefit performance of Mattie Vickers at the opera house at 8 o'clock.

Squatters' Claims.

Unsurveyed lands up on the Santiam east of Meliama are being taken and held by squatters almost every day. There are some most desirable claims in that region and the parties who are holding them hope to be able to have the government make surveys soon. In this they will no doubt succeed as soon as a majority of the lands are located upon.

COAST NOTES.

The Evangelical church of Oregon has founded a school at Lafayette, Yamhill county, to be known as the Lafayette seminary.

The contract for erecting the addition to the Oregon State Normal school, has been let to Salem contractors. The building will be of brick 4 x 80 and will cost \$12,000.

Gold bearing quartz has been discovered in the mountains in the southern part of Morrow county. The assay shows \$163 61 to the ton. About thirty claims have been located in the vicinity of the Black mountain.

Jack Kelsay, foreman of the Oregon Land and Live Stock company, at Silver Lake, Lake county, was shot in the arm a short time ago, by a love-sick widow, because he refused to marry her. The wound was not dangerous.

While reports from many sections show that the wheat crop is not as good as usual, the entire fruit crop of the Northwest has been fine. Some of the farmers think of raising nothing but fruit in the future, arguing that it pays much better.

Rev. Lorenzo Waugh was in Salem on Sunday last. He is the oldest missionary in the West. He was born in Virginia in 1808, and has in his possession a military land warrant issued to his father in 1799. He attributes his long life to temperate habits.

An injunction has been granted by Judge Bird restraining the sheriff of Gilliam county from selling the lands of the Northern Pacific Railroad Company for taxes. The matter was argued in the Dalles last Tuesday by Judge Malbury and A. A. Jayne.

Prineville capitalists propose the formation of a stock company, the object of which shall be to take the water out of Crooked river and carry it to the flats north and west of that town for irrigating purposes. By this means 10,000 acres of good land could be brought into cultivation.

Mr. Partridge who was working on the Driver farm, a little southeast of Cottage Grove, had a narrow escape last Sunday. A Jersey bull attacked a little girl, when Partridge in attempting to rescue her was in turn attacked by the infuriated animal. The bull tossed him in the air and pinned him to the ground with his horns, not however, doing much injury.

The people of Silverton and Salem are agitating the question of building a motor line between those two places. The Silverton people have agreed to concede all that the promoters of the scheme demand, and a petition has been presented to Salem council asking a franchise granting the right of way into that city. As soon as the council consider the petition the surveyor will commence work.
