OVER THE WIRES.

The Latest Concerning the Fire at Ellensburg, W. T.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

President Harrison and Party Told of the Destruction—News East of the Rockies.

The Harker's Special Report.

ELLENSBURG, July 5.—The fire at Ellensburg swept the entire business portion of the city. Main street from Fifth to First, Fourth from Main to Pine, Third from Water to Sprague, Pearl from Fifth to Second, covering an area of ten blocks. The only brick buildings left are the Lynch block and the Ellensburg National bank. Two hundred homes were totally destroyed. The loss as far as can be ascertained is \$1,000,000. \$750,000 in buildings and \$250,000 in goods. Among the principal buildings destroyed are the Stone bank, Snips & Co., Ashler hotel, Oriental hotel, Masonic temple, Odd Fellows' hall, Geddes block, the postoffice, Localizer printing office, Dexter's stables, Shady's block and Davidson's block. The only stores left are those of Blumauer & Son, O'Connor & Hagan, Gatzert's shoe store and Collin's grocery store. There is not a restaurant, hotel or boarding house left and about 150 people are destitute. The city is under patrol and order prevails. The fire exhausted itself after burning five hours.

THE PRESIDENT AND PARTY.

They Are Told Repeated and Hearty Demonstrations.

New LONDON (Conn.) July 5.—President Harrison arrived shortly after 5 o'clock at Woodstock and, assisted by Secretaries Tracy, Grover, Bulkeley and other officials, planted a tree in the garden in front of the Bear House before breakfast. After breakfast the president was driven to Putnam, where he took a special train for New London. Crowds gathered along the way cheering. At Norfolk a large crowd surrounded the president. He made a brief speech of thanks. The train reached New London at 8:30, where there was another demonstration and another brief speech was made. Governor Ladd, of Rhode Island, met the party here and with President Harrison went on board the steamer Dispatch and started for Newport, which place he reached at 3 o'clock. Various demonstrations will take place in his honor.

A CRISIS IMMINENT.

PARIS, July 5.—The Gazette de France and Comptoir asserts that Dezanay, press-conference general, refuses to present Boulanger. That he has resigned and that DeFreycourt, minister of war, refuses to hold a court martial in the case of Boulanger. It is also said that there are other serious dissensions among the cabinet of France and that a crisis is imminent.

An Important Decision.

CHICAGO, July 5.—Judges Horon, Luley and Collins, sitting in chambers this morning, refused to grant a temporary injunction to prevent the board of trade from withholding its quotations from the board. The decision is made on the ground that the largest quotations are of such importance as to be published periodically, whereas, if the injunction were disturbed the tendency would be to create a monopoly of the big boards.

The American Eagle Abroad.

MADRID, July 5.—Palmer, the American minister, entertained Loring, the American minister to Portugal, who is en route to Lisbon, and a number of American residents at Madrid, at dinner last night in celebration of the 4th of July. Patriotic speeches were made and much enthusiasm shown.

AT WASHINGTON.

Incidents of the Day—Some Tragedies and a Downing Accident.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—A large public meeting was held at the suburban town, Tokoma park, and addressed by Hepburn, solicitor of the treasury, and by Lynch, fourth auditor.

As usual, however, with holidays here, the colored element contrived its regular tragedies. In the northern section of the city this afternoon, Joseph Shuter, in a quarrel over a game of cards, stabbed Edward Smith to death with a table fork. Shortly afterward, in the northeastern section of the city, the Jews, while under the influence of liquor, without provocation, fatally shot Win. Field with a parlor rifle. The victim is about 10 years of age, and it is expected to die. Both murderers were arrested. All the parties are colored. In West Washington, late this evening, Edwin Latham, white, aged 21, was drowned by the capsizing of a sloop. The body is not recovered.

DAMAGE BY FLAMES.

The Destroyer's Large Field of Heavy Summer-Fallow.

WOODLAND, Cal., July 4.—Another field fire occurred yesterday afternoon seven miles west of Davisville, on the ranch of E. A. McMillan, destroying 160 acres of heavy summer-fallow, valued at \$20 per acre. It was insured by Wannock & Co., of Winters, for \$10 per acre. The fire caught from an adjoining stubble field, where a threshing engine had been the previous day.

MILITARY SIGNALS.

The American Morse System to Be Used Hereafter.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—By a general order issued from army headquarters the American Morse code will hereafter be used by the army for all purposes of signaling, whether visual or acoustic, and the use of the English Morse, or continental code, will be discontinued. This action was taken upon recommendation of the chief Signal Officer, with a view to the simplification of the signaling system and to the ready employment and utilization in time of war of skilled civilian telegraphers for military purposes. There are several proposals to result from the use of the English system, but it is slower than the American system, and its continuance would involve the employment of specially trained experts, who could not be procured in sufficient numbers in an emergency.

AN UNUSUAL FEAT.

A Four-Story Structure to Be Moved Fifty Feet.

Chicago letter to Sanitary News.
A big contract has just been undertaken by a firm in this city to build the viaduct over the railroad tracks at the Twelfth street, it became necessary to widen the street, beginning at State street. At the southeast corner of State and Twelfth streets stands a four-story stone structure building with a frontage of 115 feet on State. This building will be moved fifty feet south of its present location, and a three-story building, 58,500 feet, on Twelfth street, will be moved seventy-eight feet west and seventy feet south. A bar, two stories high, 55x114 feet, also facing on Twelfth street will be moved 250 feet south of its present location. It is felt that such a large building as the first is moved, but the contractors have no fears that it will not be satisfactorily accomplished. The property is owned by the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway. Alfred Smith is the architect, and the contract for the moving has been let to Hollisworth & Coughlin at about \$13,000.

Pictures of the Seattle Fire.

With the June number of The West Shore Magazine is issued a splendid colored supplement giving scenes in Seattle immediately before, during and after the fire, showing the Tacoma relief tent, business tents, burning block, the train bearing the Portland fire engine, and the collection of engravings of that most memorable event, the destruction by fire of the business portion of the largest city on Puget sound, entailing a loss of fully \$15,000,000.00. It will become more and more valuable as time passes. Such total destruction of business and such courage, energy and quick recuperation as is being shown by Seattle are of the marvels of the age, and these engravings are a valuable souvenir of the event. CIVIL SERVICE REFORM.

Ministers Requested to Preach Sermons on the Subject.

NEW YORK, July 4.—It was suggested recently to George William Curtis and other leaders in the movement for civil service reform that in order to bring before a large number of people the question of reform every clergyman in charge of a parish or church be requested to preach on next Thanksgiving day a sermon in advocacy of reform. A circular letter was accordingly sent to the clergymen of the land, inviting them to preach reform sermons on Thanksgiving day, or such other day as might be convenient and agreeable to them. They were asked only to advocate civil service reform so far as it involved the fundamental principles of righteousness. Pamphlets on the question will also be sent out. Already answers have been received from several hundred, among them Howard Crosby, D. M. Cash, B. B. Whittaker of Passaic, N. J., B. W. Whipple of Minn. ex-conv., Phil G. Brooks, Bishop Hunt and George T. Fisher.
