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THE FOURTH IN ALBANY.

A Successful Celebration Truly Lively... Thousands Present.

At an early hour Thursday morning, long before old Sol had thought of rising from his saffron colored couch, the sleeping populace of Albany were awakened by the sonorous booming of the historic brass cannon, owned by the Oregon National Guard, giving notice to the small boy, armed with his annual firecrackers, and the patriotic people in general, that the day just dawning was to be glorious Fourth of July.

Promptly at 9:30 o'clock the procession formed on Second street, headed by the five southern militia companies of the Second regiment. Next came the Knights of Pythias in full uniform. The liberty car was universally procured, and the bands-most affairs of the kind ever seen in a procession. A large band was represented by G. W. Keeney, Miss Lily (daughter) representing the Goddess of Liberty, and Misses Lora Vance and Kate Barrett representing Peace and Plenty.

The procession was fully a mile long and formed a brilliant pageant as it moved in three divisions, head of respectively by the Albany, Taigant and the Chemawa Indian bands, through the principal streets to Hackleman's grove, where the exercises of the day were held.

Every available seat was occupied, and a vast crowd was present.

The exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. H. P. Webb, who, in the absence of Prof. W. T. Van Sloy also read the declaration of independence. The oration by Hon. M. George was an eloquent address, full of lofty and patriotic sentiment. The exercises were interspersed with excellent music by bands.

After dinner the military companies, headed by the Chemawa Indian band, marched to the open ground immediately south of the city, where the battle ground had been selected. The sham battle was not an entire success. Instead of proceeding at once with the fight, the regimental officers made a mistake by indulging in a battalion drill, which consumed two hours and kept the thousands who had assembled to witness the battle waiting in the hot sun.

The tender race between Albany and Salem was won by Albany in 18 1/2 seconds against 18 3/4. The 100 yard foot race was won by Bert Logan, of Scio. The steamer contest for a purse of \$100, between Albany Engine Co. No. 1 and the Salem Capital engine, the former using a Clapp & Jones fourth-class, and the latter a Clapp & Jones third-class engine, was won by Salem, the record being as follows: Salem, 268 feet, 8 1/2 inches; Albany, 258 feet, 8 1/2 inches.

The exercises of the day closed with a display of fireworks and a very successful entertainment at the opera house by the Mattie Vickers company as a benefit for F. C. and a grand military ball at their armory.

COUNTY COURT.

Calvert for the Stayton Bridge Lot for \$18,250 - 0-0-00 matters.

The county commissioners completed the business for the July term yesterday. Ten dollars per month was ordered placed in the hands of Sam May, of Harrisburg, for the aid of Charles Biggs.

The following bids were opened for building the Stayton bridge: Pacific Bridge Co., \$20,600 and \$18,500; Hoffman & Gates, wood \$16,800 and \$15,200; iron, \$18,250 and \$16,950. The contract was let to Hoffman & Gates for \$18,250, iron pier.

The application of J. T. Hooks and others for county road, granted, and John Denny, J. F. Hyde and Wm. Thompson were appointed viewers.

Material was ordered purchased for a culvert for the bridge at S. M. Miller's. The O. P. was granted permission to lay a water pipe in the county road.

The report of A. P. Flory and others for county road and fees was allowed. The application of B. Harliness and others for county road was granted and James Shelton, S. M. McLain and H. Phillips were appointed viewers.
