SULLIVAN ARRESTED.

He Is Handcuffed After a Fight With the Police.

A REVOLVER TAKES HIM.

News East of the Rockies—Sixty Dervishes Killed in Battle—The Cruiser Baltimore.

The Herald's Special Despatches.]

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 11.—When the Louisville and Nashville train pulled into this city this morning, the crowd surged around the car to see John L. Sullivan. A rumour soon obtained circulation that a requisition was in the hands of the police, several of whom had boarded the car. There was some discussing and finally a struggle was seen in the car. An officer reached over with the handcuffs, and seized the slogger's arms and pulled him out in the aisle. Sullivan resisted, and Muldoon put his head out of the window and cried out: "Gentlemen, I demand American protection." His patriotic wail was greeted with a variety of responses. Sullivan begged him to "knock the copper out" and others cried: "Hit him with your club," etc. After a brief struggle Sullivan was taken from the car to the carriage. In the scuffle Sullivan held back ready to knock down a policeman, when Chief Black held a revolver in his face and told him if he struck he (Black) would kill him. The officers next grabbed Charles Johnston, of Brooklyn, Sullivan's backer, who resisted vigorously, but finally cried out with pain. During all this scrimmage Muldoon sat quietly by and was undisturbed. Johnston and Sullivan's other second, hid in the excitement and Lynch jumped off the train. Only Johnston and Sullivan were detained, though others were wanted. The arrests were made by authority of a telegram from Governor Lowry, of Mississippi to the Nashville chief of police.

TWO STEAMSHIP DISASTERS.

One on the Lakes and One of the High Seas—Great Losses.

QUEBEC, July 11.—Quebec is in receipt of advices of a steamship disaster off the shoal above Cape Chat yesterday evening. The steamship Lenuira, bound for Montreal from Havana, bearing a cargo of sugar, was driven upon the shoals. Her cargo will be a total loss. It is doubtful if they will be able to get her off.

LOSS AT SEA.

LONDON, July 11.—The French steamer Anadyr was sunk in collision near the Aden bar. She sailed from Marseilles, her destination being China. The number of lives lost is not known, but will be large.

Sixty Dervishes Killed.

CAIRO, July 11.—A dispatch from the scene of hostilities between the Egyptians and Dervishes states that the Egyptians cut off 60 Dervishes from the main body and killed them all in the fight.

The Cruiser Baltimore.

PHILADELPHIA, July 11.—The cruiser Baltimore started on a three days' private trial trip. She is expected to develop 10,000-horse power, although the specifications only call for nine thousand.

The Burke Case.

OTTAWA, July 11.—The judge's report from Winnipeg in regard to the Burke case has not yet reached this city. The leading government officials say his extradition is inevitable.

A German Bombardment.

ZANZIBAR, July 11.—The Germans have bombarded and occupied Tonga, meeting with slight resistance. Captain Wissmann is still at Pangaini. One German was wounded.

A \$50,000 Fire.

CHICAGO, July 11.—The packing house of Bowler Bros. at Towlaka was damaged this morning by fire to the extent of \$50,000. Three firemen were suffocated while trying to check the progress of the flames.

Mrs. Tyler Dead.

RICHMOND, Va., July 11.—Mrs. John L. Tyler, widow of ex-President Tyler, died last evening, at the age of sixty years, from a congestive chill.
