Thursday while her husband was in the country she took the little girl and came to this city, intending to go to Yaquina and take the steamer on her return to Sacramento, when she was arrested. She said she would sooner die than give up her child, and that her husband had threatened to kill both her and the child, and that she would not return to him. An officer will arrive this morning from Medford after her, but if her story is correct, it would seem difficult to hold her on a charge of stealing her own child; He Smiles; A smile and softly chuckled to himself and said, "I've got it at last. THE ASTORIA & S. C. RAILWAY.

The Company Means Business—Progress of the Work of Construction. In view of the work undertaken by the Albany & Astoria Railway Company of this city, the progress that is being made on the other end of the line will be of interest to the people here. Mr. William Reid, president of the Astoria & South Coast Railroad Company, informs an Oregonian reporter that the Pullman Car Company, of Illinois has completed the first five freight cars, standard gauge, twenty tons capacity, for the Astoria & South Coast road, which were shipped to St. Louis, there to be loaded with rails for Astoria. The other twenty freight cars, twenty-five tons capacity, are now under construction by the Pullman company, to be finished by the 28th of July and then sent to St. Louis for the rails there, and the remaining five flat cars will reach St. Louis from Pullman on the 8th of August. These cars are marked "Astoria & South Coast Railway," and will bring with them all the rails necessary to lay the track from Young's Bay to the Ocean house. The locomotive No. 1 was inspected at Danville, Ill., and will reach Astoria in fourteen or sixteen days. The company has now under consideration an offer of 1000 tons of fifty-pound steel rails from Chicago, to complete the road from Young's bay to the heart of the city of Astoria and extend the line southward from the ocean shores to a fine timber region. Two surveying parties have been formed by E. E. Habersham, the engineer. One to locate the line from the Ocean house, and the other to locate that portion from the Willamette Valley across the coast range to Astoria. The first excursion coach is to arrive at Astoria about the end of August, and whenever the first ten miles beyond the Ocean house have been surveyed by the engineers, the construction company will commence work—expected about the end of this month—on the grading. As the rails have to wait for the Astoria Railway Company's flat cars to be constructed at Pullman, in order to bring these rails overland in that company's own cars, it is not expected that tracklaying will be completed and the road in running operation to the Ocean house until the end of August. All of the ties, 41,000, for the fourteen miles are now lying delivered on the grade at Skippanon, ready to be laid down whenever the locomotive arrives. This weighs twenty-eight tons and is a Rogers make, cylinders 15x22, standard gauge. The contractors will commence work not later than the 5th of August, and will continue grading during the fall and winter seasons, and hope to reach a fine timber region tributary to Astoria, with track laid thereto, by the last week of January, unless work is stopped by severe rains or some unforeseen occurrence. Mr. Reid states that the contract has been let for and work commenced on one mile of the trestle work between the west shore of Young's bay and to the channel of that river, and when completed in six weeks another contract will be let for the east portion of that bridge from the channel, 2500 feet, to Smith's Point on the Astoria side and continued into the city, leaving the drawspan uncompleted and open until the iron work arrives from the East in October next. The site of the passenger depot in Astoria has not yet been determined, but a contract has been let for the construction of the Astoria terminus and passenger depot wherever located by the board of directors. Various liberal offers have been made for sites for a passenger depot at the south end of Astoria, below Elsmore's cannery, but the general opinion seems to be that the line should be extended into the city as far as Lafayette street, where a passenger depot will be built if the owners of property in that vicinity, to be improved by the depot, will vacate fifteen or twenty feet adjoining that street. STATE DISPATCHES.

The County Jail at Jacksonville Burned to the Ground. THREE PRISONERS CONSUMED. A Marion County Wheat Field Burned. Statistics from the Oregon Penitentiary at Salem. Special to the Herald. JACKSONVILLE, Or., July 12.—At an early hour this morning fire was discovered in the Jackson county jail at Jacksonville, Oregon, and the entire building was destroyed by the flames. In the jail were three prisoners, awaiting trial, F. Warner, Henry Hoover and Fred Cook. It was impossible to rescue them, and they were suffocated by the smoke and heat before they could be taken from the burning building. The coroner is conducting an inquest this afternoon. Robert Archibald, who resides near Whiteaker, yesterday set fire to a large tree and the fire rapidly spread and burned a few acres of slashing and afterwards traveled to his wheat field, burning up about twenty acres of it. This field of wheat, just ready to cut, is a great loss to Mr. Archibald. Small Fire at Lebanon. The Lebanon Express says: "On last Monday considerable excitement was caused by an alarm of fire, which caused our citizens to think of Seattle and Vancouver. It proved to be a small barn belonging to F. M. Miller, at the place now occupied by Mr. Burtonshaw. The fire was started by two little boys who were playing in the barn loft with some matches, when they set fire to the barn. The fire boys answered promptly and the engine was soon on the ground, and the hose laid, but lacked about two sections of having enough to reach the fire, the nearest being at Ralston's corner. The entire loss was about \$30. Blind Pianist Dead. A letter dated Council Bluffs, July 7, says: The celebrated blind pianist, and eldest daughter of Joseph and Madame Ida Heine, of the Heine Concert Company, died suddenly while on a visit to Union, Illinois, June 28.
