A special train, bearing the passengers who arrived yesterday on the Willamette Valley, arrived in this city last evening. John Duncan and family, of Prineville, have located in this city. Mr. Duncan will engage in the practice of law here. The new court house at Corvallis will cost the county nearly \$68,000, and the city is spending \$20,000 for a new school house. Dr. J. W. Starr has moved his office from his residence to the Pearce and Strahan block, upstairs in the rear rooms on the main hall. Several farmers of Linn county have commenced threshing, and the first new wheat of the season will probably be brought this city to-morrow. The cases of small-pox near Gervais are reported all well and the house has been thoroughly aired and the clothing burnt and all is out of danger. Mr. Charles Logus had 400 cords of wood destroyed by fire Thursday night, east of the Portland & Vancouver railroad. Other losses were also reported. James Dannals fell from a scaffold while working on the residence of W. R. Graham near this city yesterday, inflicting severe though not dangerous injuries. F. C. entertainment committee desire to express their heartfelt thanks to those who so kindly assisted in entertaining their guests while in this city July 4th. Committee. The rush to the seaside and the different summer resorts in the mountains is in full vogue. The Soda Springs of Linn county, and Yaquina, are thronged with pleasure seekers from all parts of Oregon. Twenty-one sacks of silver ore was shipped through this city from Euron & Childs at Prineville to San Francisco, where it will be tested. It was taken from a new mine discovered near that place, which is said to be very rich. After reading of the miserable fire apparatus in some of the towns of the coast, which have recently been burned, the people of this city should be proud of the Albany fire department. Three fire engines, a hook and ladder company and an inexhaustible water supply is something no other city of its size possesses. Professor John M. Maisch, of Philadelphia, well known to the medical fraternity, paid this city a visit yesterday, being the guest of Dr. Koldeway, veterinary surgeon. He was introduced by him to some of the druggists of this city, who were pleased to make his personal acquaintance. Prof. Maisch and Dr. Koldeway were old friends and had not met for many years. Prof. Maisch and wife leaves this morning for their home after a visit to the Sound and Yellowstone park.

BUILDING NOTES.

Work is progressing rapidly on several brick buildings in this city, and also on a large number of residences. In a quiet, steady way the city has been enjoying a marked growth, both in business houses and residences, during the past three years, and yet there are no vacant houses in the city. Work on the woolen mills is progressing rapidly. The main building will be fine three-story brick structure, with a stone basement and smaller buildings adjoining it. It will be the finest woolen mill on the coast. The brickwork on the new Masonic temple is nearly completed, and it will be a fine structure. The first floor, embracing large, double storerooms, has been leased by Messrs. Fortmiller & Irving, who will remove their furniture store into the same. The foundation of Fred Blumberg's new brick block is completed and the building is to be completed by Sept. 1st. One of the stores will be occupied by H. C. Hubbard as a drug store, and the other by Messrs Phillips & Son as a grocery store. Not less than 100 new residences will be added to the city before the end of the summer, some of them being elegant structures.

Mrs. Noyes was in Portland, headed towards the Sound, on July 2. Mr. Noyes has not heard of his mother since. The old lady was accustomed to travel and her disappearance is to her son a great mystery.

Another Race.

The Corvallis Gazette says: It is reported that Eph. Cameron, of this city, and H. H. Odell, a foot racer now of Albany, have signed an agreement to run a race of 75 yards, at the latter city, on Sunday, July 21. The amount to be run for is \$100 a side, with a forfeit of \$50 in case either party fails to appear at the time set.

Business Gossip.

In a circular issued by Dunn & Co.'s Mercantile Agency, reviewing the business of the country for the first six months of 1889, shows a vast improvement in the situation of Oregon, compared with the corresponding period a year ago. The number of failures is less by one-third, and the amount of liabilities is not one-sixth what it was a year ago.

YAQUINA BAY NOTES.

Yaquina Republican July 11. The Wright sailed early this morning for Siuslaw where she will survey the bar and harbor. We understand that Mr. W. T. Radr has sold his interest in the Deep Sea Fishing company. The north jetty is nearly out to low water mark. It is being built at the rate of twenty feet per day. A couple of large black fish came into the bay on Tuesday morning and disported for a couple of hours. They appeared to be forty to fifty feet in length. There are now probably four hundred visitors in and around Newport, enjoying the sea breezes and getting health and recreation. In two weeks from now this number promises to be increased to a thousand or fifteen hundred by the way the people are flocking in each day. Yesterday the Mischief took outside about thirty people on a fishing excursion. The result of the expedition was one hundred and one fine deep water fish, consisting of cod, kelp and red goopers. Many of the cod weighed 25 lbs each. The Mischief went out again this morning with about forty passengers.

A SUGGESTION.

To the Editor of the Herald: Permit a water consumer through your columns to offer a suggestion. The new rule adopted by the Water Company permits the use of hydrants for sprinkling lawns or gardens only from 5 to 8 A. M. and from 5 to 9 P. M. Could not the same number of hours be given for this purpose a little later in the morning?

TO WATER CONSUMERS.

ALBANY, July 11. Rule No. One: All parties are positively forbidden from sprinkling or wetting lawns, gardens or streets except from 5 to 8 o'clock A. M. and from 5 to 9 o'clock P. M. and sprinkling or wetting First street is positively forbidden at all times between 150 feet west of Washington and to Montgomery street. The penalty for breaking said rule is, the water will be shut off without notice and before you get it again it will cost you \$2 for shutting off and turning on said water. J. A. CRAWFORD.

COAST NOTES.

An Ashland man sold his strawberry product off a space 40x40 for \$60. Astoria has an electric fire alarm system and has purchased 2000 feet of new hose. Corvallis will have a steam ferry across the Willamette by the end of this month. Three cougars of large size have been killed near Cottage Grove within the last few days. S. M. Graham, of Marshland, Columbia county, raised a crop of hay yielding six tons to the acre. Up to date 16,575 sheep have been sheared in Wallowa county with 94,500 pounds of wool as a result. Wm. Schultz, while working on the jetty at Fort Stevens, had his foot severely injured by being run over by a car. A gentleman near Eugene has tried the experiment of dairying, and found that he cleared \$60 a month from twelve cows. Erastus Kidder, age 74, died at Stayton. He was a member of the order of Odd Fellows, and came to this state from Michigan. It is estimated that 1700 feet of pipe will be used in conducting the water from below the glacier to the hotel at Mount Hood. Two vehicles collided at Salem, and Mrs. John Knight and her daughter had a miraculous escape from dangerous injury. The horse was injured, and the buggy badly smashed.
