But says he can't say whether he will go against Peter Jackson or not.

PITTSBURG, July 15.—Jake Kilrain, the pugilist, and Mike Donovan, passed through this city on a limited train this morning. They remained locked in a state room.

JACKSON, Miss., July 15.—John Fitzpatrick, of New Orleans, referee in the Sullivan-Kilrain fight, arrived here last night, and went to the governor's office this morning and informed the governor or he had come to answer to whatever charges might be lodged against him for violation of the laws of Mississippi. Preliminary examination was waived and Fitzpatrick gave bonds in the sum of \$1000 to appear for trial on the 18th inst.

A BIG SALT TRUST.

English Capitalists Will Hold \$5,000,000 of Stock.

New York, July 15.—Edward Wheeler, of Milwaukee, Mich., one of the most prominent salt manufacturers of the West, is in the city, and gives out a line of the plans of the proposed international salt trust, soon to be organized, with a capital of \$30,000,000, to be incorporated under the laws of New York. The association will begin business on January 1st.

Beland, candidate for governor of Michigan, will be the first president of the trust. The amount of \$5,000,000 will be held by English capitalists.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Political Comments From the National Capital.

ENGLISH CAPITALISTS COMING

Secretary Blaine and Family Take an Outing, Which Gets the Tongue of Gossips Wagging.

Special Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The political conference held by leading republican Senators in Washington last week is to be followed at an early day by a caucus of all the republican Senators. The caucus will discuss the general policy of the republican party during the coming session of congress, but it is no open secret here that the principal object is to bring about a closer understanding between certain Senators, who feel somewhat aggrieved on account of the treatment they have met with at the administration, and the President. There has been a disposition in certain quarters to make it appear that Gen. Harrison is disposed to follow Cleveland's example in the matter of failing to consult with the party leaders before determining important matters of policy and in the making of important appointments. This idea is vigorously refuted by the President and his closest friends, who point to the fact that in no case where the entire delegation of a State was in harmony, has there been the least trouble or delay in the matter of making appointments. The whole matter has been thoroughly discussed from every standpoint by the President and Senators Allison, Culman, Dolph and Chandler. The President assured them that he was not only willing but was extremely desirous to have the advice of the party leaders at any and all times. The result of that conference will be reported to the caucus, which by the way, report says is to be held in New York City, and the result is expected to be harmony between the Senate and the administration.

It having been reported to the Secretary of the Treasury that twenty-five English glass-blowers were brought to this country under contract by a firm at Jeannette, Pennsylvania in April, he has directed the U. S. District attorney at Boston, where they land to investigate and report the facts.

Attorney General Stone of Iowa is here urging the Attorney General to bring suit in the name of the United States to set aside the title to the land granted the Des Moines River Navigation company. Two bills were passed by the last congress regarding the title to these lands, but they were both vetoed by Cleveland. The Attorney General has received a letter from C. A. Heermann, recently appointed assistant U. S. Attorney for the western district of Virginia, declining to accept that office because he thought he should have been appointed Attorney.

Superintendent Kimball of the Life-saving service has gone to select sites for the three new life saving stations on the coast of New England, provided for at the last session of Congress.

Secretary Blaine left with his family for Bar Harbor, Maine, last week, and considerable uneasiness was developed among the gentlemen who are anxious to serve the country abroad by a rumor to the effect that the secretary had retired before September. The rumor lacks foundation, although at the State department they say they don't know when Mr. Blaine will return.

Secretary Noble has directed Commissioner Tanner to refuse to take up applications for pensions out of their turn, except in cases of extreme destitution or danger of immediate death. He has also informed him that agents and attorneys who persist in assuring that cases shall be made special, other than those mentioned, should be disbarred from practice before the department. The Secretary is determined that "influence" shall not count in examining applications for pensions.

Mrs. Harrison her father and good children are comfortably settled in the cottage of ex-Senator Henry G. Davis of West Virginia at Deer Park, Maryland, which the President is leased for the summer. The President expects to join them the last of this week and to remain with them for several days.

Secretary Risk is taking unusual precautions to prevent the spread of Texas fever. He has issued a letter of instructions to all the railroad and transportation companies regulating the shipment of cattle from Texas and Arkansas, and notifying them that Government inspectors would see that the regulations are obeyed.

Secretary Ingalls was here last week. He refused to talk politics, but said he knew of no reason why all four of the new states should not be republican.

The New Hampton people in Washington gave Senator Chandler a most interesting reception to-night.

A TOWN BLOWN AWAY.

Thirty Houses Wiped Out of Existence by a Windstorm.

CINCINNATI, July 14.—The town of Princeton in Butler county, Ohio, and about seven miles from Hamilton, was blown away by a terrific windstorm that swept through that section Sunday afternoon. There were about thirty houses, including a sawmill and a schoolhouse, in the place. All are gone. The storm was general throughout that section and much damage is reported. No further particulars are yet obtainable, but it is believed no lives were lost, although several were injured.

ARIZONA'S SENSATION.

Over a Quarter of a Million Dollars Overdrawn From the Treasury.

PHOENIX, A. T., July 14.—Governor Wulley is examining into the expenses of the late democratic administration in this territory. He has made the discovery that nearly a quarter of a million dollars has been drawn from the general fund of the territory over and above the ordinary expenses of government, within the past two years. This discovery has made considerable of a sensation within political circles. The Herald says an investigation will be made, and an attempt made to fix the ways and means by which the thing was accomplished, as well as to fix the identity of the recipients of this great overdraft on the treasury.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—New post-offices have been established at the following places in Oregon: Bay City, Tillamook county, Onslow Young as postmaster, Hudson Douglas county, with Leary M. Perkins as postmaster.

Pensions have been granted to the following: Oregon—Reisner, John W. Graves. Washington territory—Original invalids, Edward B. C. Taylor, McKelvie J. Unger.

IN NEW YORK.

A Grand Reception and Concert—Letter from President Harrison.

New York, July 14.—French citizens of New York and vicinity today celebrated the 100th anniversary of the fall of the Bastille with a grand reception and concert, at Washington park. The large hall of been specially decorated with a profusion of tri-colored flags and banners. A letter from President Harrison was read, which concluded as follows: "May the homes of France be perpetually filled with prosperity, contentment and peace. May the French republic ever live in honor among the nations, and in the steadfast love of its citizens."

SULLIVAN IN CHICAGO.

He Makes Things Lively in a Saloon by Knocking Down Sailor Brown

CHICAGO, July 14.—John L. Sullivan made things rather lively for awhile in Tom Curley's saloon on the levee to-night. He had been drinking somewhat, and during the course of the evening Peter Jackson, of Astoria, and Sailor Brown, the Canadian slugger, came in for a drink. In the course of an animated discussion between all parties, Brown champion Sullivan a bar. The Boston champion promptly knocked him down before he could be seized by his friends. One Professor Conley attempted to interfere but was knocked down by the saloonkeeper, Curley. Sullivan not deigning to notice him, Sullivan was quickly hustled into a back room by his friends and the little unpleasantness was soon forgotten. To-night Sullivan and his friends are out in carriages doing the town, making frequent stops at various lively resorts.

A LAKE DISASTER.

Two Steam Propellers Collide and One Goes to the Bottom.

MARQUETTE, Mich., July 14.—The propeller Smith Moore, ore laden from this port for Cleveland, collided in a fog yesterday afternoon with the propeller James Peckans, also of Cleveland. An unknown steam barge picked up the Moore and attempted to tow her into harbor, but when within a short distance of land the disabled vessel was found to be sinking. The crew were rescued, and the Moore went down in seventy feet of water. She lies in a sheltered position; and can probably be raised. The Moore is valued at \$75,000, and is owned by Harvey Brown, J. F. Parkhurst and others.
