EUGENE NOTES.

Everybody who can afford it has either gone to the mountains or coast, or is getting ready to go.

Mrs. McFarland, of Albany, has been visiting her sister, Mrs. Page, of this city, for several days.

Messrs. Patterson & Miller, butchers, are building a large barn preparatory to opening a livery and feed stable.

Forty or fifty land seekers have arrived in Eugene within the last ten days, and most of them are getting on timber claims.

The Northwestern Telephone Company have their switch board in their central office wires connected and will open regularly for business the first of next month.

A corps of surveyors and men left here on Wednesday last making the preliminary survey on the Siuslaw & Eastern railway. Our citizens have donated liberally to assist the company in its enterprise and it is hoped that success will attend their efforts and that the road will soon be built.

A government vessel is reported at the mouth of the river near Florence, taking the necessary observations for locating the new lighthouse, and making a complete survey of the bar and harbor of Siuslaw. The interests of this county demand its improvement, and everybody is expecting a favorable report and an appropriation from next congress for its aid.
