3 MILES A MINUTE.

Great Invention of a New Electric Railway Company.

TIME AND SPACE ANNIHILATED. Newspapers, Letters and Light Freight to Be Transported at a Wonderful Rate of Speed.

Baltimore Sun: The Western Railway system, incorporated under the name of the Electro Automatic Transit Co. of Baltimore, after about a year of carefully conducted and conclusive experiments, has patented its multiplicity of electrical and mechanical appliances in the United States and all over the world as a preliminary to putting the system regularly to work wherever required.

By this electro-automatic arrangement the morning papers may be delivered for the breakfast table and the evening papers before supper time at distant points. It will deliver letters almost with the promptitude of the telegraph sending a message. The mails between New York and Omaha will be carried in a night. It will handle perishable light freight from long distances, will deliver with celerity the mails and parcels in cities and suburban towns, and will multiply many times the business of the postoffice and express companies.

Its advantages are not alone in its speed, but the economy and frequency with which trains can be despatched. In addition to all these things it will save interest on remittances at long distances, will bring the people closer together, and will create new enterprises.

Doubtless, as in the case of the telegraph, its important uses can be anticipated in advance of its going into active operations. Its development will create new fields of usefulness not now thought of. Such, in brief, are what the persons interested in this invention claim for it.

The motor car is 18 feet long and 2 1/2 feet square at each end. It is pointed in front, and wedge or point being below the longitudinal centre, adjusting it to the air pressure, thus keeping the car down to the track. To reduce atmospheric friction to a minimum all wheels and electrical appliances are placed within the walls of the cars. The road is to be built on the surface of the ground, with track of twenty-four inches gauge, and will cost about \$5000 per mile. In thickly settled districts the road can be elevated, the varied length of the uprights being a cheap mode of covering irregularities in the surface of the ground over which the road passes. The mail and express cars are telescoped in forming a train, the former into the end of the motor car and the latter into that of the one preceding it, forming a flexible train of cars, offering an unbroken surface to the air. The rear end of the rear car is pointed in a similar manner to the front of the motor car, thus preventing any suction as the train rushes on its way. The motor may pull one car or a train of cars.

All trains will be controlled from a generating station, where will be placed an electrical generating plant. Electrical brakes are to be used, and trains are started, stopped, speed increased and backed at will from the station. Special appliances will inform the operator in charge of the generating station of the exact location of the train from the time it leaves or passes any given point until it reaches its destination. It has not yet been determined how far apart the generating stations shall be placed. Possibly 100 miles may not be out of range, as the current can be run for fifty miles each way from the station as a centre without much loss of electricity.

A series of experiments have been made at Laurel, Md., to show that the Weems railway system will do. This experimental line is a circuit of exactly two miles. Over this route there are twenty-nine changes of grade, some of them very heavy, even to the extent of 105 feet to the mile. The generating plant there contains all the electrical appliances necessary to the attainment of high speed by a railroad train. There is also special machinery for experimentation and the perfecting of all mechanical and electrical inventions tending to advance and improve the system. All tests of speed have been made upon heavy grades and curves combined, too great ever to be required in the construction of a commercial line, therefore the experiments demonstrate the high rate of speed which will be obtained upon lines built for business purposes. At this experiment station, two miles per minute are made around a heavy curve, or the equivalent of 180 miles an hour, or three miles a minute, on a level track. Prior to the inauguration of this system twenty miles per hour was the fastest time ever made by any kind of electrical railroad travel.

Oklahoma Boomers Ousted and Lands Opened.

FRENCH AFTER BOULANGER.

As Indian's Fate—The Weather—Advances on the Derwishes—Germany and Switzerland.

The Herald's Special Dispatches. GUTHRIE (Oklahoma) July 23.—A decision of the land office ousting "boomers," as those who entered Oklahoma before noon on April 22d are called, is causing much excitement throughout Oklahoma. Three hundred men were in line yesterday morning waiting for the land office to open. A large majority are waiting to file on claims already entered by men supposed to have been in the territory before noon on April 22d. The question now is whether the rule applies to 700 town lots in Guthrie occupied before noon on that day.

DEPRIVED OF CIVIL RIGHTS. French Government Rough on Boulanger.

PARIS, July 23.—The Republic Francis says that the committee of court has issued an order depriving General Boulanger, Count Dillon and Henry Rochefort of all political rights. This action is taken on the ground that they refused to comply with the summons to appear for trial. This decision will render them ineligible to election to any office in France, and makes any property they own in France liable to seizure.

CAPTAIN JIM. A Prominent Indian Official Killed by a Train.

YUMA (ARIZ.), July 23.—Captain Jim, a prominent official amongst the Yuma Indians, fell from a train near Maricopa last night. The wheels passed over his body, cutting it into two pieces. The captain was one of the delegates en route to participate in the annual harvest feast of the Maricopa Indians.

TREATY WILL NOT BE RENEWED. BERLIN, July 23.—Germany has notified Switzerland that the treaty between the two governments regarding the settlement of foreigners in Switzerland will not be renewed. The treaty will expire at the end of August.

FROM EGYPT. LONDON, July 23.—General Greenfield, the British commander in Egypt, reports to the war office that he intends to make a general advance against the Derwishes at the end of the present month.

GERMAN EMIGRATION. Nearly Two Million People Leave Their Native Country.

LONDON Times. A Berlin journal publishes a synopsis of German emigration since 1871. The total for the period is 1,769,297 persons. Of these emigrants, the destination of no fewer than 1,618,816 was the United States, 33,443 went to Brazil, 15,599 to other parts of South America, 16,341 to Australia, 4780 to British North America, 4047 to Africa and 1986 to Asia. There remain unaccounted for 74685 emigrants sailing from French ports, thought it is believed that nearly all of these went to the United States. The year of highest emigration was 1881, when 220,902 German left their Fatherland. The lowest number of emigrants during any year of the period is found in 1887, viz.: 22,898. Brazil received most of her Germans long ago, nearly 9000 going to that empire in 1872-73. Lately the tide has run much more strongly to other parts of South America, 1723 going there in 1888, for example, while only 1129 went to Brazil. The total emigration in 1886 amounted to 83,218, a lower figure than for the preceding seven years. In 1887 it was 141,659; in 1888, 98,568; and in the latter year the returns from Havre were missing.
