CITY COUNCIL.

The Usual Amount of Routine Business - Bills Ordered Paid.

On the bill of J. N. Hoffman for work against the property of F. Wood, the recorder was ordered to make a lien upon the property for the amount. On the bill of Savage was left in the hands of the committee. The committee on health and police reported that the waste water from the upper part of the Fremont block had become a nuisance, and that the agent or property owner within five days make the proper sewerage connection to abate the nuisance.

A sidewalk was ordered on the south side of block 29 lots 8 and 9, Hackleman's 2d addition, within 20 days. The saloon bond of John Giblin was approved. The time of collecting the taxes was extended to the next regular meeting.

On motion the committee on streets and public property was instructed to purchase nails and hardware for the city's use. The recorder was ordered to advertise for bids for a sewer across Washington street between blocks 26 and 27.

The city surveyor was instructed to give the grade for the sidewalk in front of Mrs. Thomas Monteith's property. On motion the property owners on First street were ordered to place the street on the established grade from Washington to Lyon street, to commence within 10 and complete it within 20 days. Washington street west of block 100 was ordered opened to the south limit of the city.

On motion the city marshal was instructed to abate the nuisance on lot 2, block 2, eastern addition, adjacent to the Waverly hotel, the same being a badly kept barn. Foreign Insurance Companies. There is some misunderstanding among foreign insurance companies as to the manner of complying with the law in relation to making deposits with the treasurer of state for the security of persons transacting business with such corporations. The old law provided for a deposit of \$50,000 in U. S. bonds, Oregon state bonds, county or school district bonds, but this law was so amended by the last legislature as to read, "or bonds or notes secured by first mortgage upon unincumbered real estate within the state of Oregon." Under the law passed by the last legislature some foreign insurance companies have offered to deposit \$50,000 in mortgages upon Oregon real estate, but refuse to assign the mortgages to the treasurer. State Treasurer Webb declines to accept them, unless assigned.

More Money for the State. It will be remembered that Secretary of State McBride collected from the United States and paid into the state treasury a few weeks since about \$38,000 on account of the claims of the state for indemnity for expenses of the Indian wars of 1877-78. It was thought at the time of that payment that the above sum was all that was claimed by the state on that account, but the Statesman is informed by the secretary of state that he is pressing the claim for more, and is now making efforts to secure evidence in further support of the claim. Secretary McBride is confident that he will be able to collect several thousand dollars more on account of this claim. -Statesman.

MORE COAL DISCOVERIES.

A Large Deposit Above Sweet Home Being Taken Out and Used.

Wm. McKinnon, who lives up the South Santiam several miles above Sweet Home, about 45 miles from Albany in the city. He has made what seems destined to prove a valuable coal discovery. The coal deposit, which has only been opened a few feet below the surface, is situated in Canyon Creek, and gives evidence of being an enormous vein. Mr. McKinnon who runs a blacksmith shop, and is familiar with coal, says it is better than the average blacksmith's coal bought in the market, and he has recently been taking it out and using it in his forge. He has taken out bushels of it and says it burns splendidly, makes a fine welding heat and leaves very little cinders. He now uses no other coal in his forge. The deposit is situated about 500 yards from the main wagon road, and Mr. McKinnon thinks is the most valuable coal discovery ever made in the Santiam region. Several coal deposits have been made in various places along the Santiam, but nothing that equals this in quantity or can excel it in quality. Should a good working coal mine be unearthed in that region it would be more valuable than a gold mine, and it would seem that this discovery of Mr. McKinnon's might be developed into such a mine.

SPECIMENS FOR EXHIBIT.

Linn County to be Represented in the Exhibit at Milwaukee. Department Commander McElroy has made all necessary preparations for the transportation and display of Oregon products at the National Encampment, G. A. R., at Milwaukee, next month. It now remains for the citizens to make up the display of products. The Oregon Land Company, of Albany, has kindly volunteered to receive all articles intended for exhibition, label them with the owner's name and care for them. Citizens of Linn county should take pride in gathering and placing in their hands specimens of our magnificent products, so that Linn county can be fully represented in the exhibit.

Bound Over. Sylvester Nicholls, the absconding street railway sub-contractor, who was arrested at Blair, Nebraska, by Constable C. G. Burkhardt, was arraigned before Justice Humphrey on a charge of the larceny of six horses, upon which he had given a chattel mortgage. He waived examination and was held in \$1000 bonds, in default of which he went to jail.

They Must Go. The fate of the green two-cent postage stamp has been settled by Postmaster-General Wanamaker. It must go, and its place must be taken by a stamp either carmine or metallic red in color. It is proposed also to reduce the size of the stamps, making them about one-third smaller than those now in use and of a much better "sticking" quality.

CRAWFORDSVILLE ITEMS. July 23, 1889. Everybody busy. Items are very scarce. Threshing will commence this week. Our blacksmiths are kept very busy now repairing harvesting machinery. Most all of the young men of the neighborhood are off harvesting on the prairie. The Glass brothers and others returned from Fish Lake on Saturday. They report having a good time, as fishing and hunting were fine. They brought home over 100 pounds of fish. They stopped at the Soda Springs, where they found a large crowd of people from all parts of the state. Mr. Samuel Glass met with a painful accident yesterday while raking hay. He had just finished raking and was drying to the shed with the rake when his mare which by the way is over 20 years old became frightened at a threshing machine and ran away. Mr. Glass was thrown from the rake, receiving some very severe bruises about the face; also one hand was badly jammed up. The rake was completely demolished. If any one has an old horse that can beat this record for running we would like to hear from him.

COAST NOTES.

Over \$100,000 has been paid for wool at Baker City since the middle of June. Seattle's police force has been reduced to 32 men, the same number as it was before the fire. The total receipts of Grant county for the current year amounted to \$76,820.04, and the expenditures were \$50,917.30. The old Parker and Dooley toll roads leading from Baker City into the interior, have been purchased by the county, and will be improved and kept in good condition. The superintendent of the Nelson mine has brought to Baker City four gold bricks weighing twenty-four pounds, and worth about \$23,000. Dr. T. J. Dean has recently located a mining claim in the mountains above the lake, about six miles from Joseph. A test of the ledge matter shows it to be free-milling, and there are at least 5000 tons of the ore in sight. A small fire was discovered in the Willamette bridge at Salem, but was extinguished before any damage was done. In some way fire caught in the crack between two planks, burning a hole about one and one-half feet in length and four inches wide. A Yakima paper says: "H. L. Neall, the representative of Philadelphia capitalists, has taken a party of six to the Tietan for purposes of looking into the feasibility of a big irrigating canal from that source to cover the vast bodies of bench land lying to the east and south. Sheriff McFarland, of Walla Walla, has returned from an unsuccessful chase after Wm. Anderson, a fugitive from justice. Anderson crossed the British line fifty miles ahead of the officer.
