OVER THE WIRES.

Seizure of English Vessels in Behring Sea.

VICTORIANS ARE RAMPANT.

Earthquake in California—War in Egypt.

Values Found but Men Missing—Oa Trial for Murder.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.]

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Inquiry at the department of state this morning was met by the statement that no information had been received here respecting the seizure of the Triumph and Black Diamond except that contained in the associated press dispatches.

In conversation with a prominent official he said that whatever might have been the policy of the last administration it is evident that the present administration does not look with disfavor upon the seizure of British vessels suspected of poaching on U. S. fishing grounds. The seizure and search of the Triumph, afterwards released because no sealskins were found, this official contended, might be a more serious matter than the seizure and detention of the Black Diamond, for there is involved the right of the United States to seize and search suspected vessels outside of what is conceded to be the limits of her jurisdiction. Grant the said claims that right within the limit that has not yet been acknowledged by England, and the settlement of the question after all is to be one of jurisdiction.

THE BLACK DIAMOND.

Victorians Become Billed Because It was Seized for Illicit Sealing.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 31.—Great indignation is felt here over the seizure of the schooner Black Diamond, in Behring Sea, by the U. S. revenue cutter Richard H. Rush. A public meeting will probably be held and resolutions passed for transmission to the imperial parliament, asking that the imperial government interfere in behalf of British vessels engaged in sealing trade. It is believed here that a British man has been placed in charge of the Black Diamond her Captain will not obey the Rush's orders, and will sail for Victoria instead of Sitka.

BRITISH VESSELS.

Two to be Sent to Behring's Sea to Protect Sealers.

OTTAWA, July 31.—The cabinet yesterday considered the seizure of the British vessels by the U. S. cutter in Behring's sea. A demand will at once be made on the British port for two vessels to proceed to Behring's sea to protect Canada's vessels from the U. S. cutter. Bessell believes that several of the sealing schooners that sailed from Victoria are heavily armed and will be able to protect themselves, as they started with the intention of not being taken without a desperate struggle.

MAN DISAPPEARS.

From Victoria, B. C., and Foul Play Suspected.

VICTORIA, (B. C.), July 31.—Alex. Begg, of Seattle, who visited Victoria a week ago, has not been heard from since. His wife telegraphed to the authorities here yesterday concerning him. His valise containing some clothes and books was found cut open in Johnstown street ravine. The police suspect foul play.

WAR ON DERVISHES.

Several More Killed and Some Captured.

CAIRO, July 31.—Colonel Wadehouse reports that the main body of the insurgents are encamped on a hill three miles north of Aba Simbel. Active skirmishing still continues between the outposts. Dervishes who occupied the village of Tashi were driven out by the Egyptians, and 24 were killed and a number captured.

EARTHQUAKE.

San Francisco Receives Another Severe Shock.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—One of the heaviest shocks of earthquake felt in this city for years occurred here about 4:45 o'clock this morning. People were awakened by the rattling of windows and the shaking of buildings. No damage is reported.

THE MARKETS.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Charterers remain about as before noted.

Wheat—Owing to weak advices from Liverpool, shippers show less disposition to buy, and the market is weaker, with a tendency to still lower range of values. Offerings are moderate; No. 1 shipping, \$1.33 1/2 @ 1.35.

Flour—Weak and lower. Sales, foreign session, were 700 tons, buyer year at \$1.41 1/2; 700 tons at \$1.41 1/2. Buyer session sold at \$1.47 1/2. Afternoon session—Buyer year \$1.41 1/2 @ 1.41 1/2; seller year \$1.47.

Barley—Feed barley is slow of sale and prices favor buyers, although holders are not pressing

offerings to any great extent. Quite choice old feed, 70c; No. 1 feed, 67 1/2 @ 68 1/2; common feed, 62 1/2 @ 65.

Futures—Very quiet and prices lower. Buyer year, 83 1/2 @ 83 3/4; seller year, new, 76 1/2 @ 76.

Oats—Recent receipts include some liberal shipments, both new and old. Offerings are larger and the market is shaping more in favor of the buyer. Choice feed, \$1.10 @ 1.12 1/2; No. 1 feed, \$1.07 1/2 @ 1.10; milling, \$1.15 @ 1.20. Mills are steady with a fair demand and firm values; bran, Oregon, \$1.40 @ 1.50; middlings, \$1.45 @ 1.55.

Beans—Quite firm and moderate and prices 1/2 cent higher. California variety 1/2 cent higher from \$7.25 to \$7.50 per 100.

Wool—Transactions are smaller and the market presents a quiet appearance. Local dealers are well stocked and the future course of the market is awaited by most operators. Quote Oregon Valley, 21 1/2 @ 25c; Eastern, 14 @ 21c.

Hops—Little business passing on spot. Reports from the interior are of a dull character, growers being unwilling to accept bids of 14 @ 15c for new crop.

LIVERPOOL GRAIN MARKET.

LIVERPOOL, July 31.—Wheat—Easy, demand poor; holders offer freely; No. 1 California, 7s 2 1/2 @ 7s 3 1/2; red Western spring; 7s 3 1/2 @ 7s 4 1/2.

Corn—Steady, demand poor.

BRITISH GRAIN TRADE REVIEW.

LONDON, July 31.—Mark Lane Express: The tendency of English wheat is in favor of sellers, though business is inactive. The crop is well matured and new deliveries in fair milling character are expected in September. Foreign wheat is firm with an advance at Liverpool of 5d and at London of 6d. Russian, California and American red winter are most in request. Barley oats and corn are firm and round corn 6d dearer. At today's market, English and foreign wheats were inactive, but prices were maintained. Flour 6d higher. Oats, slow.

AMERICAN WHEAT.

London Grain Buyers say the American Product is in Demand.

POMONA, Cal., July 30.—Private letters received here to-day from M. G. Arnold, now in London, and who has great grain interests in the San Joaquin valley and Oregon, state that he has never known in the past thirty years so great interest in American and particularly in the Pacific coast wheat crop as prevails aboy this season.

London grain buyers, he writes, openly say the shortage of wheat in Russia and India will be greater than at any time within ten years, and that the American product will come into large demand.

Boulanger Reported a Suicide.

PARIS, July 31.—Reports were in circulation here to-day that General Boulanger had committed suicide in London, but the dispatches from that city pronounce the reports untrue.

Arraigned for Murder.

LIVERPOOL, July 31.—Mrs. Florence Elizabeth Maybrick, the American, charged with having poisoned her husband, was arraigned for trial to-day. The court room was crowded. The prisoner pleaded not guilty.

THE UNCIVILIZED EAST.

Two Women Brutally Beaten by Self-Appointed Regulators.

MARION (Ind.), July 28.—Last night a brutal outrage was perpetrated by about a half a dozen men upon Mr. Smithstreet and her daughter Clara. The two women live alone ten miles east of Marion in a secluded neighborhood. At the hour stated they were aroused, taken out, and after being stripped to the waist, were whipped with beech-roots until blood ran. They were then released and warned that severer treatment was in store for them if they did not cease talking about their neighbors. The "regulators" who committed this outrage are of unknown identity. It is alleged that the women were given to gossip, but the brutal manner of their punishment is denounced on all hands. The officers will make determined efforts to discover the authors of the outrage.

SOLDIERS IN AMERICA.

Minister Lincoln Assures the Englishmen of their Security.

LONDON, July 30.—The ancient and honorable artillery company gave a banquet to-night in honor of the Massachusetts riflemen, Major Jones presided, Mr. Lincoln, the United States minister, replying to the toast, "The President of the United States," dwelt upon the absence of the military element in America. Americans, he said, had learned to do without large armies.
