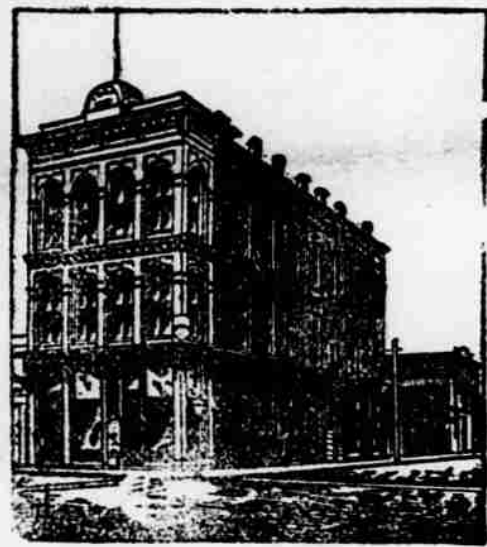

Another Gigantic Combination

of English Capital.

SEVERE FIGHTING IN SUMATRA.

The Olympia Convention Votes in Favor of a Railway Commission—Postmasters Appointed.

The Herald's Special Dispatchers.

FALL RIVER, (Mass.), August 3.—The evening papers will publish a letter from a committee representing an English syndicate addressed to the president of every cotton mill on Fall River. It proposes to form a cotton mill trust. It is stated that foreigners have subscribed more than enough capital to buy the entire cotton manufacturing plants of the country. The Fall River mills alone have a capital exceeding \$20,000,000, and investments of probably \$30,000,000 or more.

FIGHTING IN SUMATRA.

Nineteen Dutchmen Killed in a Fight With Natives.

AMSTERDAM, August 3.—Intelligence has been received of a fight in Acheen, Sumatra, between natives and a force of Dutch troops. Nineteen Dutchmen were killed and 22 wounded.

POSTMASTERS APPOINTED.

Changes Made at Spokane Falls and North Yakima.

WASHINGTON, August 3.—The following presidential postmasters have been appointed: Henry C. Kranz, Reno, Nev.; vice J. C. Hageman, removed; Robert Dunn, North Yakima, W. T.; vice G. W. Carr, resigned; Thomas B. Warren, Spokane Falls, vice J. L. Peel, resigned.

EMPEROR WILLIAM.

A Storm Prevents His Reviewing the British Fleet.

LONDON, August 3.—Emperor William was to have reviewed the British fleet in Spithead to-day, but the review was postponed until Monday on account of a heavy storm. There has been a steady rainfall all day, and the haze is so thick that the fleet could not be seen from the shore.

It is a holiday on the stock exchange, Monday will also be a holiday.

THE OLYMPIA CONVENTION.

Vote in Favor of Putting a Railroad Commission in the Constitution.

OLYMPIA, W. T., August 3.—The convention has just voted, yeas 29, in favor of putting a railroad commission in the constitution, made the whole subject special order for 2 o'clock Monday, and taken a recess to 2 this afternoon. Section 21 is still pending.

NO MORE WHEAT CORNERS.

Russia's Vast Fields Will Ever Effectually Prevent It.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The state department is in receipt of an exhaustive report upon Russian agriculture and the cereal trade from the United States by Consul General W. V. S. Petersburg. He says the export of cereals from Russia in the past two years shows an abnormal increase, due to three causes: First, the enormous crops gathered from both black lands and arable prairie; second, depreciation of the paper ruble, and third, the foolish practice of systems of "corners" in the United States.

The arable lands of Russia in Europe, Mr. Way says, excluding Poland, cover an area of 450,000 square miles. The wheat-grower of Kansas and Dakota will see at a glance the area of that fertile territory which, with the cheap labor of Russia, will always prove to be a formidable rival, and the merchants of Chicago and New York, who imagine that by controlling wheat that they will control the markets of the world, can always take into their calculations the product of this country as an eternal check to their operations. Every corner engineered in the United States makes an opportunity for Russia. Not one dollar is added to the import of wheat in America, but exports from our country, being stopped, Russia steps in and gets rid of her surplus at remunerative prices, but still far below the prohibitive values established in Chicago and New York. As long as Russia wheat exists, any attempt to force the western nations of Europe to pay artificial prices for American grain can but result in absolute failure. Perhaps it is this fact which, known, corners would become rare and intricate.

IMPORTATION OF LEAD ORES.

The Utah Association Calls Upon the Administration for Action.

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 1.—The Ore Producers' Association passed a resolution at a meeting to night reciting that the duty on lead ore, as provided by law, was evaded, and in 1888 50,000 tons of lead in ores was brought into the country duty free and that a still greater importation is threatened in 1889. The ruling which allows this was opposed in 1888 without avail, but when a hearing was fixed for May 15, it awakened a hope that the new administration would remedy the wrong; that nearly three months have passed without a decision and the importations continue piling up a surplus of lead ores and lead which will for a time depress prices; that many American mills are thrown out of employment; that continued delay in deciding will be nearly as fatal to American mining as an adverse decision. They therefore, call on the president and the treasury department for prompt and decisive action in the interest of the mining industry and to the advantage of the government revenue.

A STICK OF DYNAMITE.

Fed Into a Threshing Machine With Disastrous Results.

NEW YORK, July 31.—A special from Anderson, Ind., says: A stick of dynamite was fed into a threshing machine in the western part of this county yesterday. The machine was blown to pieces, three men and two teams killed. Latest advices indicate that an old feud had recently been renewed and some of the parties called the dynamite in a sheaf of wheat. It had been announced that there would be a contest between rival machines and a crowd assembled. Fortunately at the time the dynamite was put into the machine most of the people were some distance away. The report is not yet fully authenticated.

DIED FROM EXHAUSTION.

The Fate of Two Deserters From the Mexican Army.

SAN DIEGO, July 31.—A letter received in this city to-day from Escondido, Lower California, says that two soldiers who deserted from the Mexican post at that place a few days ago were followed by mounted police, and captured after they had succeeded in putting about forty miles between themselves and their irksome duties. They were tied with ropes to the saddles of their captors and obliged to follow at a rapid pace on foot. When they reached Escondido both sank to the ground from exhaustion and died in a few minutes.

SCRAPS OF SCIENCE.

Evidence is brought to prove that the antiquity of man cannot be less than 200,000 years.

In one of the French schools there is a natural magnet which is capable of lifting four times its own weight. A mixture of coal tar and plumbago, thinned with turpentine or benzene, is recommended as the best paint for an iron smoke-stack.

In forest beds near the delta of the Mississippi are found cypress trunks twenty-five feet in diameter, and one containing 5700 annual rings.

Remarkable transformations have been made in the Algeria Sahary irrigation. Under its operation a soil has been formed in which crops grow with great vigor.

The slopes of Etna and Vesuvius owe their richness to the fertilizing action of volcanic ashes, and reports from New Zealand indicate that the ashes from last year's eruptions have enriched the soil to a remarkable degree.

By an experiment made with a chestnut tree thirty-five years old, to calculate the amount of moisture evaporates from the leaves it was found to lose sixteen gallons of water in twenty-four hours.

To get at a good working speed for a turbine, allow the wheel to run free for awhile, and then reduce the speed one-third. Fifty per cent is an allowance that will only work where there is no hindrance to the flow of water or resistance through the wheel.

The vegetation on Behring Island is exceedingly luxuriant. The soil in the neighborhood is especially rich in algae. Forests of it from sixty to 100 feet high render dredging exceedingly difficult in some localities.

It is maintained by some scientists that the aroma of fruits increases with the latitude, while the sweetness decreases. Many herbs, such as sage, are richer in essential oils in Norway than in more southern regions. This effect is ascribed to the influence of the prolonged hours of the summer months.

A manufacturer of Roubaix has invented a very curious apparatus of electricity to looms. He adopted a rad cator which strikes when a thread breaks, and thus saves the weaver from the close attention to the quickly-moving threads which is so injurious to the sight.

There are three wicks to the lamp of a man's life: brain, blood and breath. Press the brain a little, light goes out, followed by both others. Stop the heart a minute and out goes all three of the wicks. Choke the air out of the lungs, and presently the fluid ceases to supply the other centres of flame, and soon stagnation, cold and darkness.

By a registering apparatus, devised for the purpose, the frequency of the strokes of the wings of different insects has been determined. It is found that while the common fly vibrates its wings 330 times per second, the honey-bee makes twenty strokes and the dragonfly twenty-eight.

Attempts have been made in Spain to substitute range for grape juice in wine making. Four kinds of wine, one a sparkling wine, have been successfully produced. They are of an attractive color, perfectly clear, of an agreeable sweet, slightly flavored, and of an alcoholic strength about fifteen per cent.

Prof. Haddon, of Dublin, describes that species of fish (Cephalopoda) of Torres Straits breathes large through a sail-fin. Though it is much out of water, it was not affected by prolonged submersion, but died when its tail had been variated.

The Society for the promotion of Industry, in Germany, has offered 21,000 marks in prizes for solutions of various problems. The largest prize, 6,000 marks and a silver medal, is to be given for the best essay on the extent to which the chemical composition of steel is a standard of the usefulness of edged tools.

M. A. Bule of Beaumont, France, has effected the direct electrochemical deposition of palladium on steel and other metals. The deposition is made directly and of any required thickness, and constitutes the last process in finishing the manufactured article.

The diameter of locomotives has been greatly increased to proportionate speed. The largest noted axle for a mammoth engine one of the French roads. This locomotive has six coupled wheels 8 1/2 feet in diameter, and the tender and cars to have wheels of the same dimensions, the calculation being that such a train of loaded about seven or eight miles an hour can be obtained. The cars will be swung inside of between several pairs of wheels.

The energy of chemists is now being largely directed to the development of improved methods of destruction, and in addition to the already described "bellie," many new explosives are under trial. The French "meline" is among them, and is to be as much superior to nitroglycerine as the latter is to gunpowder. Its destructive effects are especially terrible by the fact of bombs charged with it do not explode for some little time after penetrating a wall or other obstacle. In many a new shell contains two or three harmless substances, which
