UP THE SANTIAM.

News Notes Along the Line of the Oregon Pacific Railroad.

SAW-MILLS AND LUMBERING.

Work on the Albany Mining and Milling Company—Sketching for Harpers Weekly—A Branch Railroad.

GATESVILLE, Aug. 10.—The building of the Oregon Pacific railroad from Albany eastward has attracted much attention toward this region...

The growth of the towns along the line of the road has developed quite a traffic with Albany merchants, and the trains do a lively carrying business.

A new steam saw-mill is being built by J. W. Brown at the Narrows, so called because the Santiam river at that point is confined between high perpendicular bluffs.

A peculiar condition of the South Fork of the Santiam now exists, as it does every autumn. On the upper river are extensive chalk banks, which during the excessive dry weather crumble down into the river, giving it a milky whiteness.

This region is soon to be the subject of a series of illustrations in the Harpers Weekly. Wm. Davenport, one of the staff artists of that publication, has been up the river sketching some of the grand scenery during the past two weeks.

People do not appear to profit anything by experience in the way of fires in the woods. There is a state law on that subject, and every year the fire gets loose, burns up hundreds of cords of wood and destroys a great deal of valuable timber.

EARLY OREGON JOURNALISM.

A Faithful Idea Century Stage-Driver of 1868—The Suggestive Year on Record.

A copy of the American Unionist, published at Salem, and dated January 14, 1868, in the possession of Mr. Isaac Blinn, of this city, who has an interesting collection of Pacific Coast literature dating back 20 years or more, contains some interesting reminders of pioneer days in Oregon.

In the meadows the fire which started some weeks ago at the head of Sam's creek has been eating its way to the high divides at the head of Evans creek every since, destroying much timber and cleaning out the browse and undergrowth.
