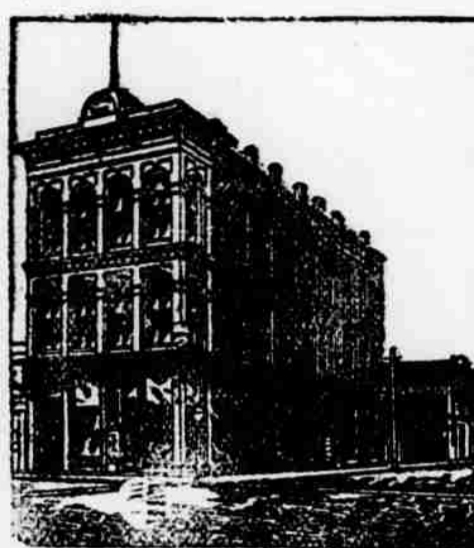

THE PRESIDENTIAL PARTY.

Today Wants to See Not to Land Troops or Incite Rebellion in Crete. Mrs. Maybrick to Be Executed on Aug. 26.

ENJOYING THEMSELVES.

The President and Party Enjoyed by Senator Hale.

ELLSWORTH, Me., Aug. 12.—President Harrison, the Blaines, Secretary Tracy and a number of other prominent people are the guests of Senator Hale, with whom they will dine to-day and stop overnight. A drive over the country will constitute the principal feature of the day's entertainment.

The president will be in Bar Harbor to-morrow in time for lunch, and will leave Wednesday morning for Bath, Me., and for Manchester, N. H., Thursday morning. He will visit Concord, and after a reception by the governor and legislature will begin his return trip to Washington.

A DEAD MAN.

Kills One Man, Shoots Two Others and is Badly Wounded Himself.

NEVADA, Cal., Aug. 12.—Last night at Rudolf Spiller's saloon, a mile from "You Bet" railroad station, a free fight occurred, in which an Italian shot Samuel Hodge in the neck, William Shea in the groin and also killed another Italian. Spiller escaped by hiding behind a beer keg. The crowd finally got the Italian from under the table, where he was while shooting, and kicked him so it is believed he will die. Sheriff Dunster has gone to the scene of the trouble.

### THE GRAND ARMY.

General Alger Likely to Be Chosen Commander.

WASHINGTON, August 12.—A great deal of interest is being taken here in Grand Army circles over the forthcoming election to be held at the annual encampment of the Grand Army at Milwaukee. It was supposed for some time that Commissioner Tanner would be a candidate for the post of Commander-in-Chief, but it is announced on authority now that the Commissioner has decided not to permit his name to be used, owing to his official position. While there are understood to be several candidates in the field for the honor it is current here that, with Tanner out of the way, ex-Governor Russell Alger of Michigan has the lead, and it is thought his prospects for election are better than those of any other man.

### HORSE STEALING.

A Gigantic Industry Said to Be Carried on Along the Missouri.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 10.—The Globe prints the following from La Moure, N. Dak.: A gigantic horse stealing industry is thought to have been established along the Missouri river. Different parties take old, decrepit horses out among the hills, which are totally uninhabitable, and any strays that may be around will come to these horses, when they are caught and sent to other parties connected with the gang, and soon they will have the horses a hundred miles away from where they were picked up, and then offer them for sale with safety. The facts lead to the belief that this organization leads from near Pierre, S. Dak., to Great Falls, Mont., and probably to the British possessions.

### A WARNING TO GREECE.

Turkey Says She Must Not Land Troops or Incite Rebellion.

LONDON, 12.—A dispatch from Constantinople says it is semi-officially stated that the sultan has notified Greece that he will regard any attempt by that country to land troops or incite rebellion in Crete as a casus belli. None of the flower, the telegram states, will support an aggressive prime minister. The grand vizier of Turkey charges Greece with fomenting riots in Monaster and Rethymon.

### A Murderer Arrested.

FRANKFORT, Mich., Aug. 12.—The steamer Denver returned from Otter creek yesterday with C. T. White, who killed Officers Marshall and Thurber Saturday. He was subsequently taken to the Manistee jail for safe keeping.

### A Village Destroyed by Fire.

BERRIS, Aug. 12.—A fire broke out Saturday in Sachsenberg Waldeck and burned until today. The village is entirely destroyed.

### WARM FOR MORMONS.

Tennessee People Threaten Serious Trouble.

NASHVILLE (Tenn.), Aug. 12.—Mormon troubles in Wilson county looked very threatening Sunday, but are believed to have temporarily quieted down now. The Mormons are on the alert, and the anti-Mormon party grows more indignant at every "revelation." Just now, however, the elders have hidden under fear of tar and feathers.

In preaching to one of the congregations Sunday, one of the elders told his sympathizers that this country belonged to them; that they were preparing to take it by force if necessary, and would have it if they had to take blood out of every man in the country, and that the church was preparing an army for that purpose.

"For," said he, "the blood of Joseph Smith must be avenged, and God commands us to overthrow this Government for its oppression of the saints. The great sinews of his wrath has not yet been trodden. We are to tread it, and tread it we will until we have pressed out the last drop of blood and the national and personal existence of this accursed people."

One sympathizer to whom this was spoken became alarmed at the excitement in the community and repeated the elder's words. Thereupon Rev. John Barrett instituted a "Peter the Hermit" crusade against the Mormons, who had succeeded in proselyting some of his flock. He preached Sunday at Friendship to a crowd.

He had a letter from a lady in Kentucky, who had joined the Mormons, gone to Utah and had seen their practices. She became disgusted, apostatized returned to her home and has the courage to tell the truth. She denounces the system as deceptive and rotten, and the priests and many laymen as a lot of scoundrels. Benjamin Bright, who was an active participant in the former Mormon revival, asserts that the elders deceived him and henceforth he is an "American and not a Mormon."

The people are determined to drive the Mormon elders from this part of the country.

### INDEPENDENCE NEWS.

A Field of Wheat Burned—Rumored Brewery Project.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., Aug. 10.—Two miles below town Wm. Mix lost about thirty acres of fine wheat in the shock this afternoon by a fire; origin unknown. He lost his barn only a short time ago.

Quite a number of sick persons have returned from Yaguna bay, much worse for the trip. Mrs. J. W. Kirkland was brought home today, it is thought, in a dying condition.

Washburne and Kriepel, of this city, have lately received a patent on a valuable invention connected with railroading.

It is rumored that a gentleman by the name of Bauer, who purchased 234 acres opposite town in Marion county, intends erecting a large brewery here soon.

The Southern Pacific railway has put the road in fine condition this summer.

He was discharged after examination.
