BOULANGER GUILTY.

Matters Look Very Gloomy for the Lunaway Frenchman.

HIS ELECTION ANNULLED.

Mrs. E. English Grady Reported—The President at Bar Harbor. Queen's Palace Will Be Her Seat.

The Mayor's Special Disposition—Paris, Aug. 13.—The court this afternoon found Boulanger guilty of conspiracy.

HIS ELECTION ANNULLED.

The state council has annulled the elections for twelve counties in which Boulanger was elected to the council general on the ground that the general was not legally eligible for the position.

Boulanger has written a letter in which he states he gave the sums of money which he is accused of embezzling, to the chief clerk in the war office to be used for the relief of widows and orphans of soldiers.

Madame Poupres, former mistress of Boulanger, has sworn that the general was in Paris on July 15, 1887, the day on which it is alleged he visited the city in disguise.

AT BAR HARBOR.

A Warm Greeting Accorded to the President.

Bar Harbor, Aug. 13.—President Harrison received a warm greeting on his arrival here to-day on the return from Ellsworth by the midday boat. He breakfasted with Senator Hale this morning. Subsequently Senator Hale drove President Harrison and Secretaries Plaine and Tracy in a carriage to the depot. A special train for the ferry was taken at Bar Harbor wharf. A good sized crowd greeted the president and cheered as he passed to the carriage which was to take himself and friends to Sanwood. Tomorrow he will be accompanied to Bath by Secretary Tracy. Governor Burleigh will probably meet the presidential special at Augusta or Bath.

HE WOULDN'T PAY HIS TAXES

CHICAGO, August 12.—A special to the Inter-Ocean from Frankfort, Michigan, says: A terrible encounter occurred in Otter Creek this morning, in which Charles T. Wright, president of the Otter Creek Lumber Company, of Racine, Wisconsin, shot and instantly killed Deputy Sheriff Neal Marshall and Dr. Frank P. Thurber. Write had failed to pay certain taxes, and the sheriff attached a lot of his logs. It is thought that Wright with a force on men attempted to regain their possession, and that in the melee Thurber was killed and Marshall soon afterwards. It is rumored that over sixty men were engaged in the affray and others may have been wounded.

The propeller Deware with a force of officers is leaving for Otter Creek to capture Wright dead or alive. It is said that Wright has escaped on a barge, and departed for the Wisconsin shore.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Comments Concerning the Seizure of the Black Diamond.

ILLEGAL SEAL CATCHING.

Postmaster Commissioner Tanner Is All Right—Notes from the National Capital—Removals Etc.

Special Correspondence.]
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Postmaster General Wanamaker has issued an order extending the age limit governing the appointment of letter carriers in non civil service post offices from thirty-five to forty years. The age limitation does not apply to persons honorably discharged from Army or Navy.

The seizure of the Canadian sealer "Black Diamond" in Bering's sea by the U. S. Cutter "Rush" still continues to be talked about here. One thing may be set down as certain the administration is determined to carry out the law, and every vessel caught illegally taking seals in Behring's sea will be seized. Representative Farquhar, of New York, who was a prominent member of the Congressional committee which made the investigation of the seal fisheries that led to the enactment of the law under which this seizure was made, is now in Washington. Speaking of the seizure and its probable outcome he said: "This country will go right on asserting and maintaining its jurisdiction over the Behring Sea fisheries, and England can say a word in earnest about the matter. Russia stands ready to make good our title derived by purchase from her. Great Britain cannot afford to antagonize two great nations—Russia and the United States. There is no doubt about Russia's disposition in the matter. They guaranteed us a title and England cannot seriously question that title without antagonizing Russia. If she went into a fight she would have two antagonists. This is all well understood in England, as well as in Russia and America.

In answer to the charges made by certain papers that a certain pension attorney had been favored in having applications marked special, Commissioner Tanner has prepared a list of all the cases made special since he took charge of the Pension office. There are 952 cases. Of these 117 had no attorney, 95 were represented by Geo. E. Lemon, 5 by W. W. Dudley, 26 by M. B. Steves & Co., 22 by Fitzgerald & Co., 20 by J. W. Morris, 17 by T. W.
