OREGON FRUITS.

Our Fruits Are of Better Quality Than Those of California This Season.

The question if Oregon fruit can be shipped to Eastern markets is important, and where there may be an advantage in the climate of California that makes fruit more enduring and firmer for shipment.

The present season has been dry enough to secure us the best results to be expected. It seems to have been two weeks in advance of the season of 1888, which was also earlier than usual.

Barlett pears were ripe to ship, and carloads were shipped on July 6, 1889, so the present season is at least three weeks in advance of ordinary years.
