HARRISBURG ITEMS.

Harvest is being rapidly finished up, and wheat is coming in quite rapidly, although the hauling season has not yet reached its climax.

James Curtis is running two hundred cords of wood in the river from his place several miles up the river taking out by boom in the river here.

The ware houses will all be filled this year, and probably some of the grain will have to be shipped before the season is over to make room for the balance.

D. G. Coy intends to go east of the mountains in a few days to close up his business there, and on his return will greatly enlarge his stock of goods.

O. A. Hyde returned a few days ago from the big bend country and will remain here for the present. He reports the drought having greatly discouraged settlers in that region.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Brown and Mrs. Brown's brother, Mr. Morgan Houtt, who have been here for some time intend returning to Canyonville, Grant county in a few weeks.

Mrs. John Summerville and family and Mrs. C. M. Grimes and Winnie left last Saturday in company with Mrs. Summerville's niece from Missouri, to spend a few days at Yaquina bay.

C. A. McDonald and C. G. Garrison have got their large engine in position on their sawmill and a large stock of ash and maple logs in the boom and are preparing to ship large quantities of lumber to San Francisco.

James McNutt, on Saturday, while at work in a threshing crew, near Squire Wards, received quite a severe cut in the breast from a mislaid delivered by the hand cutters knife.

G. W. Hunt has purchased a half interest in the Pendleton roller mills, for which he paid \$34,000.

Grant's Pass shipped twelve car loads of watermelons last week which brought in about \$2000, besides fruit shipments.

The work on the Seattle & Northern railroad has been suspended and 750 employes paid off. It is understood no more work will be done the present year.

The bricklayers of Ellensburg struck work against a ten-hour schedule. The contractors exhibit a firm front and say they will have all the men they want in a few days.

It is estimated that there will be 250,000 bushels of wheat delivered at the Salem flouring mills this fall by wagon. It is now coming in at the rate of 5000 bushels per day.

A band of 1000 head of sheep which were on their way to cross the Columbia near Ellensburg last week were watered at a cold spring on the central ferry road and fifty of them died from the effects of the cold water.

A careful estimate of the number of mechanics and other laborers now employed exclusively on new business blocks and residence buildings in Seattle show: Laborers, 956; carpenters, 598; bricklayers, 254; stonemasons, 65; stonecutters, 46; painters, 52; plasterers, 79; total, 2012.

Ten citizens of Eugene have lost their lives by drowning during the past year. On August 5, 1888, Joe and Bennie Theimer were drowned in the Willamette above the Eugene bridge while bathing.

On October 12, 1888, Mrs. H. E. Keniston was drowned in a boat. May 18 Hamilton's bay, and June 5 little Mabel Smith were drowned in the mill race. June 30 Mrs. Hubble and two children were drowned in attempting to ford the Willamette, and August 4 Minnie Luckey and Albert Wilson were drowned in the Siuslaw.

A Fruit Car Burned. The Salem Journal says: This morning when the overland train was within a half mile of Chemawa smoke was seen issuing from a fruit car that was attached next to the engine. The train was quickly detached and the engine hurried with the car to Chemawa, where it was sidetracked. By this time the car, which was loaded with muskmelons, was pretty well on fire inside.
