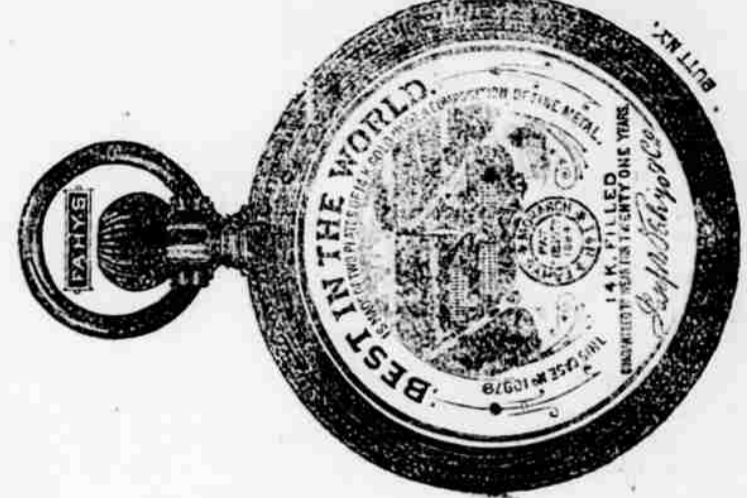

England Will Send Delegates to The Washington Convention.

FORGER ARRESTED IN W. T.

Attempted Suicide of a Physician at Seattle - Five Men Hanged for Murdering Women.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—In the house of commons this afternoon Michael Hicks Beach, president of the board of trade, said that England had accepted the invitation to send delegates to Maritime conference to be held in Washington, but that British delegates would not be empowered to take any engagement binding on England.

The Sheriff is After Him.

SANTA BARBARA, Aug. 23.—The sheriff of this county has gone to Washington territory for D. K. Stringfield, who is wanted here on a charge of forgery of the signature of his father, S. Stringfield, to two notes for \$400 and \$1000 respectively on local banks. It is believed here now that the signatures are genuine, and that Stringfield, who is 90 years old and childish, has forgotten that he signed them, as this happened in the case of another note which was known to be genuine.

Should Have Succeeded.

SEATTLE, Aug. 23.—A physician named Miller who came here two months ago from Sacramento with his family, to-day made three unsuccessful attempts to commit suicide by taking poison. He will recover.

A Forger Captured.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—D. K. Stringfield, mentioned in the dispatches from Santa Barbara as a fugitive for forgery, was arrested at Whetson, W. T., Wednesday by Sheriff Broughton, and is now on his way to the scene of the crime.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Four murderers of women, Patrick Pakenham, Jack Lewis, (colored), James Nolan and Fred Cartolin, were hanged in the yard of toms jail this morning.

## MARRIED BY FORCE.

Held by Detectives Until the Ceremony Was Performed.

The history of a mysterious marriage was filed with the clerk of the Superior Court recently, and the matter will come up in the usual way to be heard in the divorce court.

Robert B. Mitchell is the complainant, who claims to have been forced into a peculiar marriage. The story of the bill is this: On the 25th day of last August the plaintiff was at the depot to take a train for Evanston, when two detectives, accosted him and said there was a man at the Avenue House in Evanston who very much desired to see him. Against his will, the bill alleges, Mitchell was conducted to that place, where he met one McCord, who informed him that he would be compelled to return with the party to Chicago and marry a woman named Anna L. Callis.

To this proposition, it is claimed, the plaintiff objected strenuously, but in vain. The detectives claimed to have the power to arrest him, but upon what charge they did not say. Accordingly he returned to Chicago the same day with McCord and the detectives. He attempted to escape after leaving the train, but they held him and conducted him by force to the Clifton House, it is alleged. McCord then went with one of the detectives, as he said, for a marriage license and a minister.

The women was brought in, and for the first time, it is said, the plaintiff set eyes upon her. He ran to the other door to escape, but found a detective on guard. Presently the two who left returned with the minister and the license, and the ceremony, it is charged, was performed against Mitchell's will and in spite of his protestations. Then he was permitted to depart, which he did, never seeing the woman afterwards. An affidavit accompanying the bill gives the woman's residence as Martinsville, Ind. The prayer of the bill is that the Court declare the marriage null and void.
