FIRE AT TACOMA.

Two Business Blocks and Four or Five Residences Burned—Loss, \$60,000. Special to the Herald. TACOMA, (W. T.), Aug. 29.—The Denver House, a large four-story lodging house, occupied on the lower floors by Knapp, Burrell & Co., Johnson & Roberts' paint and paper house, R. W. Weisbach's music house; Rochester's dining parlors, Latham & Page, produce and commission store; the adjoining building, a two-story lodging house, occupied on the ground floor by Owens' frame factory, and four or five residences, were entirely destroyed by fire this forenoon.

The Western Union's wires are temporarily down. ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS. A fire broke out about 10:15 this morning in the Denver lodging house, a structure originally built for a skating rink. The building was a frame, 75x100 feet, located on Railroad and C streets, and was three stories in height. The lower story was occupied by Knapp, Burrell & Co.; R. Latham & Co. and Robertson & Co. On the Railroad street side, Robert Weisbach had a piano store in which he had about \$20,000 worth of stock, all of which was saved except one piano.

Next door was the leading dress-making establishment of the city. The building was saved, but many of the goods were ruined. The new engines had their first experience, and saved the city. The water pressure was not sufficient to put out a bad fire, but the engines were able, after getting up steam, to give a stream sufficient to confine the fire within short limits.

At the present time, 2:20, there is still fire smoldering, but the danger is past. One of the great difficulties of the fire was that there were four sick women in the Denver House who had to be carried out on stretchers. They are being cared for.

The loss will be about \$60,000. Sold at Sheriff's Sale. A considerable amount of real estate property belonging to the estate of Hiram Smith, deceased, at Harrisburg, has been sold at very low prices. The drug store, occupied by Damon Smith, was bought by the latter for \$400. The property occupied by Butler's saloon was bought by Mr. Butler for \$300. The Park property, consisting of 17 acres and two houses sold to Mrs. J. P. Schooling for \$1075. Two fractional lots and two warehouses sold to J. G. Senders for \$115. A parcel of twenty-two acres sold to Walter Brown for \$40. Dr. H. A. Davis purchased a small tract near the railroad and a few other small pieces were sold, the amount of the sales aggregating \$206. A portion of the property was wrongfully described and a new execution will have to be issued before it can be sold.

Oregon Fossils. A. M. Miller, a graduate of the Princeton college, is in this city, the guest of Dr. G. W. Gray. He is one of a party of twelve students and graduates, headed by Prof. Scott, occupying the chair of geology in the college, who have been on a tour through Eastern Oregon collecting geological specimens. Mr. Miller states that they secured several wagon loads of fossils remains of rare extinct animals, mineral and other specimens which will be shipped to Princeton and marked as Oregon specimens.

A Heavy Pull. Hon. I. D. Miller's threshing crew wound up the season's run yesterday, and the engineer thought he would give the engine a thorough test to see what it would do. He coupled it on to a large 26-inch separator and then trailed on behind the water tank, the cook wagon and eight grain wagons, and the engine hauled the whole train out of the stubble field without any difficulty. The engine was bought by Mr. Miller of Stewart & Sox and is a 12-horse traction engine, made by Russell & Co. of Massillon, Ohio.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT SHEDD.

It Sweeps Over Several Farms and Burns Considerable Property. Special to the Herald. SHEDD, Aug. 29.—An extensive and sweeping fire starting in the road two miles west of this place to-day, burned over the D. P. Porter farm and other places, consuming fences and burning a barn belonging to W. L. Vance and a separator for John W. Pugh. The fire is now under control.

BROWNSVILLE NOTES. BROWNSVILLE, Aug. 26. Our mail is beginning to arrive late again, owing to so much switching of grain cars below. The middle of next month our new school opens, and we look for a fine school the coming year. Mr. J. Knapp has purchased the property here formerly owned by E. Thompson, and will soon move into town.

Rev. H. B. Elworthy and family of this place, have gone down to Portland to attend conference at that place. The firm of Moyer Bros has been dissolved here, Mr. E. Moyer is going to move to Albany and Mr. H. B. Moyer will continue business at the old stand.

Mrs. M. E. Wilson left here last week for a three months' trip to see relatives in Dakota, Iowa and Minnesota. Her daughter, Mrs. D. Fields, accompanied her. The woolen mills are running on full time now, and turning out large quantities of the finest blankets and flannels ever made on this coast, or any other, for that matter.

Negotiations are now being made for a \$6000 fruit cannery here the coming season. The ground in many of our orchards around here is just covered with plums that are rotting for want of a market. There was a fine lot of peaches brought to town last Saturday, that are the finest ever seen in this part of Oregon. They were raised on the farm of Mr. Hugh Fields, near the head of the race, about one and one-half miles from this city.

Since the shower a few days ago the air is clear. The farmers are just about through threshing, or will wind up this week, and so far as the weather is concerned there never has been a finer harvest time in many years, and while the spring grain is rather light, the fall grain comes up both in quantity and quality to former years with the most of our farmers.

There is much complaint again about the financial affairs of the narrow gauge company. What ought to be said about, or done with a company who will issue checks in payment to its employees and then refuse to accept these same checks in payment for either freight or passage on their road? Yet this is the case with the narrow gauge company to-day.

A Lively Runaway. A team owned by Peter Riley ran away on Second street yesterday. The horses ran up past Mrs. Marshall's stable, and out toward the Calapooia bridge. A suggestive incident of the runaway was that Dr. I. N. Woodie, a veterinary surgeon, and A. J. Auslyn, a carriage maker, started in pursuit of the team. They were caught beyond the Calapooia bridge, no damage whatever having been done.
