A COUPLE OF BILKS.

Their Advertising Swindle in This City, etc. A couple of swindlers, sailing under the euphonious title of Goodkind & Taylor, have alleged firm being composed of the late Milt B. Goodkind and his pal, H. C. Taylor, two notorious dead beats from Portland, have perpetrated their advertising swindle in this city, and business men generally aided their scheme, notwithstanding the fact that they have been exposed by nearly every newspaper in Oregon.

There is an old saw that people like to be swindled and it certainly seems true in this case. The very looks of these scoundrels should have been sufficient warning. One of them is a dark greasy looking shenney with a beak like a turkey buzzard, who was driven out of Portland as a dead beat, and the other is a big wild-eyed brute with an overgrown head, who butchers the English language at a 2:40 rate, and his victim will often give him an advertisement to get rid of him.

They can readily be recognized on sight and should be given a wide berth. They agreed to print 5000 copies of their poster here, but in fact they printed nearer 500 than 5000. The sheet they published is not as good as the Salvation Army Way Cry. Its alleged circulation is a fraud, and it amounts to worse than nothing as an advertisement.

Nothing better, however, could be expected of bilks who train with tin horn gamblers, opium fiends and fallen women. In Astoria and other places these fellows celebrated their success with a week in the gutter, and bowed in the business men's money in a drunken spree. It would behoove City Marshal Hoffman to keep an eye on them, as they are liable to show up drunk and fit subjects for the calaboose before leaving the city. It would also pay business men of other towns to look out for these bilks, and let them severely alone if they do not wish to be swindled.

Some of the business men of this city when they found out the swindle, refused to pay for the advertisements, and others who had paid threatened to have the fakirs arrested for obtaining money under false pretenses.

LATER—Since the above was written Taylor has resumed his old tricks, and was beasted drunk last evening. He created a disturbance in the store of LaForest & Thompson and was summarily ejected from the store.

Astoria Railway Surveys. The two corps of engineers in charge of Assistant E. E. Cooper and R. A. Habersham have completed the permanent location of the Astoria & South Coast railway from Astoria across the Coast range to Nehalem valley, at Jewell via the Seaside for forty-two miles, on which division eighteen miles have been constructed, waiting the rails to arrive at Portland on Saturday, and there are now working 257 white laborers on the grading to the Willamette valley. F. E. Habersham is the chief engineer, completed his preliminary survey from Jewell to Vernonia paralleled with the meanderings of the Nehalem river for thirty-two miles, but as this latter line is too long and is subject to winter freshets, which rise thirty-six to forty-two feet above the Nehalem river and will carry down the track, Mr. William Reid, the president, prefers a higher grade and a shorter line, and consequently ordered a new survey across the country from Jewell, via Deep Creek, and another from Jewell via Baxter's creek to Vernonia.

Bradstreet's Failure Statistics. For the month ending August 31, 1889, there were reported to the Portland office of the Bradstreet Mercantile agency eight failures in Oregon with total liabilities of \$50,121.93; total actual assets, \$27,093. In August, 1888, there were nine failures with total debts of \$41,188.94; total actual assets \$13,500. The number of failures reported for Washington in August, 1889, was five; total debts, \$17,205; total actual assets, \$8535. In August, 1888, there were two failures reported with total debts of \$4,428; total assets, \$1900. In the Washington totals for August, 1889, business embarrassments resulting exclusively from fires are excluded.

The Agricultural College. The executive committee of the agricultural college, composed of T. E. Cauthern, Wallis Nash, Corvallis; J. T. Apperson, Oregon City; H. E. Hayes, Oswego; and J. K. Weatherford, Albany, met in Corvallis yesterday to arrange matters with the faculty, previous to the opening of the college on the 12th. The new dormitory building will not be ready for use until October 1st, and in the meantime it has been arranged to use rooms over the reading room for the scholars from abroad, besides other rooms that can be secured elsewhere.

BUSINESS IMPROVING.

Houses Scarce and in Demand. Active Real Estate Transfers. "Business is growing better every day in Albany," said a permanent merchant to a Herald reporter yesterday. "Money is plentiful and all branches of trade are thriving." Real estate men also say that business in their line is steadily improving. There are more bona fide investors coming to Albany than at any time this year.

Now, houses in the city are occupied, not less than 150 new residences are going up, besides half a dozen business houses and public buildings. Immigrants are coming in constantly, and the hotels are full and there is a general scramble for corner lots in business, as well as residence property.

The woolen mills will start up about the first of the year with a force of 100 or more hands and enterprises are on foot for a material growth in the city during the next twelve months. The amount of money expended in new buildings this year will exceed \$500,000, and this growth is not merely for a month or a year, but is on a healthy, conservative basis that will be felt with each succeeding year.
